Key Messages

- 3) We are operating based on guidance from the MA Department of Elementary & Secondary Education while closely monitoring the latest information from medical experts and the evolving data regarding the pandemic both in Massachusetts and in Shrewsbury.

- Use common sense outside of school (socializing, travel, etc.)




Current Public Health Data MA 7-Day Positivity Rate = 1.02%

(Up from 0.64% two weeks ago)



Current Public Health Data Shrewsbury 14-Day Positive Test Rate (vs. 5.0% Benchmark) As of October 7






From the Department of Elementary & Secondary Education (October 2, 2020):

"The Department of Public Health (DPH) releases <u>weekly</u>, <u>color-coded health</u> <u>metric</u> for all municipalities in the Commonwealth. With each weekly update of the color-coded health metrics, we have seen municipalities falling in and out of the "red" and/or "yellow" designations. For this reason, we are reminding that you that it is critically important that school districts do not make decisions based on a single report from DPH. Instead, we recommend that school districts wait for color changes in either direction in <u>three consecutive weekly</u> <u>reports</u> before considering a change to an instructional model (remote, hybrid, in-person)."

Update to Decision-Making Process for Determining Change in Educational Program (i.e., Potential for Moving to Remote Learning): Observing Trends in Data

From the Department of Elementary & Secondary Education (October 2, 2020):

"This three-week time period of reports will represent four weeks of data and will be more reflective of a trend than one report. Furthermore, please remember that these color-coded designations are based on a single indicator (number of cases per 100,000 residents). In addition to this color-coded metric, we encourage districts and schools to work with their local boards of health to use all available information regarding COVID-19 trends in making these decisions. This could also include local test positivity rates and whether cases are increasing or decreasing in a municipality."

Contact tracing to date has shown no evidence of inschool transmission of COVID-19



How can we protect ourselves and others? A combination of strategies

- ➤ A combination of mitigation strategies is required; one will not work on its own
 - All students and staff must wear face masks consistently and in the proper manner
 - Everyone should do their best to avoid "close contact" by not being within 6 feet distance of others for 15 minutes at a time
 - O Students and staff should wash/sanitize their hands frequently
 - O Students and staff must stay home if they are sick
- ➤ We are all in this together and ask that staff and families partner in maintaining a safe school environment





IT – Tickets Since Start of Year








IT – 1:1 Device Ratios

1:1 Devices per Tier 1 Technician or ITS






IT – Staffing
