School Meal Account Charges and Collections

Key Responsibilities of Parents and Guardians

Parents and guardians are expected to encourage their child to eat breakfast and lunch offered at school. Parents and guardians are notified annually that breakfast and lunch meals are provided by the school at no charge to all students.

Meal Charges for Students

Students are not charged for meals. Breakfast and lunch are provided at no cost to all students. The District participates in the Community Eligibility Provision Program (CEP) offered by the USDA. Under the CEP program all students are allowed to eat at no charge.

Meal Charges for Non-Student Adults

Adults are not permitted to charge food or beverage items which would result in a negative balance at any time.

Consequences for Negative Balance Food Service Accounts for Non-Student Adults

School officials will address any possible abuse of the privilege of charging food service costs. The District may suspend these privileges if the District determines that there has been an abuse of the privilege.

Negative Account Balances

A negative balance is a debt that is owed by the non-student adult. The District will make an initial and follow-up attempt to collect the debt by providing with notice (e.g., by mail, email, telephone, or similar methods) of the amount owed. Payment is due immediately upon notice. If these attempts are not successful, a school official will attempt to make a person-to-person telephone contact or schedule an in-person meeting. The parties may discuss payment plan options. If a negative balance still has not been paid after the previous steps, at its discretion the District can disallow the adult from charging meals in the future.

Prepayment for Non-Student Adults

Adults are expected to setup a prepaid account for school meals prior to eating a school provided meal. The school secretary can collect the payment and inform the adult of the per meal costs. Guest adults can at the discretion of the Food Service Manager or District Administrator eat at no cost.
