

# REPORT TO BOARD OF TRUSTEES SUPERINTENDENT/PRESIDENT KEVIN TRUTNA, ED.D. SEPTEMBER 9, 2021

#### **1. DIXIE FIRE RESPONSE**

The FRC Rodeo team has been busy this fall! **Coach Tess Turk** sends that student athletes went to Sierraville to assist with the Junior Rodeo on August 28<sup>th</sup>, which was a huge success (picture on left). Rodeo athletes also volunteered in Greenville to help deliver 50 brand new refrigerators to community members that had been without power for over a month (middle). Finally, former rodeo coach, **Jesse Segura**, has collected and sent over a TON of camping supplies for the fire victims that the rodeo team has been able to disperse to help those in need (right).



FRC Baseball also responded to the call for volunteers to help deliver refrigerators to Greenville residents whose homes were still standing and were without power for over a month. FRC Volleyball team spent time volunteering for Project Camp, a free pop-up day camp for children impacted by the Dixie Fire.



**Dr. Derek Lerch** worked with CalFire to obtain a database of damaged and destroyed homes, and then searched these for FRC student addresses. To date, **Monica Potter** reached out to 42 students in Chester, Crescent Mills, Greenville, Meadow Valley and Taylorsville who evacuated and/or had residences damaged or destroyed. The goal is to help the individuals on a personal level and to see what support FRC can provide to help them continue with their education.

With the unique start for the school year, a fun "VIP" (Visiting Important Pet) featured daily visitors during the week leading up to the start of school. Below, **Archie Ryback** greeted people in the Business Office and FRC's own **Rowdy Yankee** met students and staff one morning. Kota entertained students as they waited in the Advising Center. **Kota Potter** is a rescue himself from last year's North Complex Fires.



In addition to providing dormitory housing for over 100 law enforcement patrols, FRC offered free showers at the Fitness Center for evacuees and fire personnel (below left). **Chef Sean Conry** was on speed dial, providing meals for front-line personnel when called upon. In the middle picture below, **Dr. Derek Lerch** and **Carlie McCarthy** assist a student in putting together dinners for Taylorsville evacuees. The FRC campus housed Red Cross volunteers as well as some out-of-town fire units.







Many staff also volunteered at local assistance shelters. For example, **Debbie Corsino** worked at the Plumas County Evacuee Distribution Center at the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints for 30 hours. **Anna Thompson** has spent countless hours at the Fairgrounds feeding, cleaning, and caring for evacuated animals (above right). Many others played a part as well.



#### 2. STUDENT AND EMPLOYEE ACCOMPLISHMENTS

**Monica Potter** engaged Spanish Peak Productions, who did a wonderful production of *Student Parents* video. Five FRC students allowed the company to come into their homes and share what being "non-traditional" community college scholar is like for them. **Dr. Will Lombardi** recently presented a paper entitled "Among Burnt Trees: A Cultural Natural History" at the <u>Association for the Study of Literature and Environment</u> biennial conference. He was part of a panel on "Ecocritical Pedagogies" sponsored by the <u>Western Literature Association</u>. Dr. Lombardi's talk focused on the public environmental humanities, local fire, and outreach work he has undertaken with <u>Friends of Plumas Wilderness</u>.

The Feather River College Horse Sale had a great year for the Feather River College Foundation this year! The high selling horse sold for \$28,000 with the average horse selling for \$12,400. Students receive a commission scholarship for all their hard work. This year, the scholarships totaled \$31,000 paid directly to the students. Horses sold to Montana, Oregon, Idaho, Nevada, and California. **Claire Guynes** was the student who sold this year's high selling horse *FRC Busy Playin Thor*.



The DSPS program is pleased to provide leashes this year to service animals that help our students at Feather River College. These unique leashes, imprinted with "FRC A Happy Place to Serve," are designed to honor the animals who work with our students, helping them along their educational journey.

**Jan Rennie** received the good news that the Educational Talent Search grant earned new funding for another five years. This is great news for the high school students served by the grant in exploring college and career options.



The Summer Bridge course was a success, bringing in students for an orientation and introduction to college before the official start of the semester. They learned about mental health, mathematics and English refresher courses, and navigating college expectations. COVID testing was implemented for participants prior to starting activities.

Last year was difficult and we saw an uptick in demand, particularly outside of normal business hours. Timely Care provides on-demand mental health support available 24/7 and appointment-based mental health counseling with access to a diverse network of providers. The organization acknowledged the added trauma the campus was experiencing as a result of the Dixie Fire and made the resource available FREE to employees during the month of September.





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
