

What is "Florida Connecting Kids to Coverage"?

Florida Connecting Kids to Coverage (CKC) is a statewide outreach and enrollment initiative led by the USF College of Public Health's Florida Covering Kids & Families program. CKC has five (5) regional partners located across the state that assist with outreach and enrollment services to eligible families, children, and pregnant individuals. The program is designed to assist with enrollment in Medicaid and the Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP) known as Florida KidCare. CKC provides support in increasing access to quality, affordable healthcare.

What do CKC Assisters do?

Assisters are individuals and/or organizations that provide outreach, education, and assistance to families to help them enroll in Medicaid and CHIP. They work to increase awareness of the programs and help families navigate the enrollment process. CKC Assisters are located in various settings and are trained to provide accurate and unbiased information to families.

When and Where can I sign up for coverage?

In Florida, enrollment in Medicaid and the Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP) or Florida KidCare is open year-round. Families may apply at any time by visiting https://www.healthykids.org/ or by contacting the CKC Program Manager to schedule assistance with the application process.
