Management Summary

This February we ended the month with some significant weather changes that have really stopped the growth for the most part in many of these sites. Not much change to sites other than water levels continuing to get lower. While water levels are lower, we are able to treat wild sides that are usually inaccessible due to higher water levels and even take our time with selective treatments for invasive growth throughout native vegetation. We are keeping an eye out for the start of erosion within sites due to the exposed banks and the steep grades of sites not having a root structure to help hold these pond banks together. Some of the native plants within the sites do look a little beat up from both the cold weather and the low water levels. We are looking forward to the warmer weather and seeing these beneficial native plants strong again.

One area of concern would be site S9. The erosion on the back of the left entrance sign is continuing up the bank. Its about 2-3 feet away from the bricks that hold the sign up. We predict with a few good rain showers this will push it back even further or up to the sign.

Structures throughout the community are checked on a monthly basis while treating.

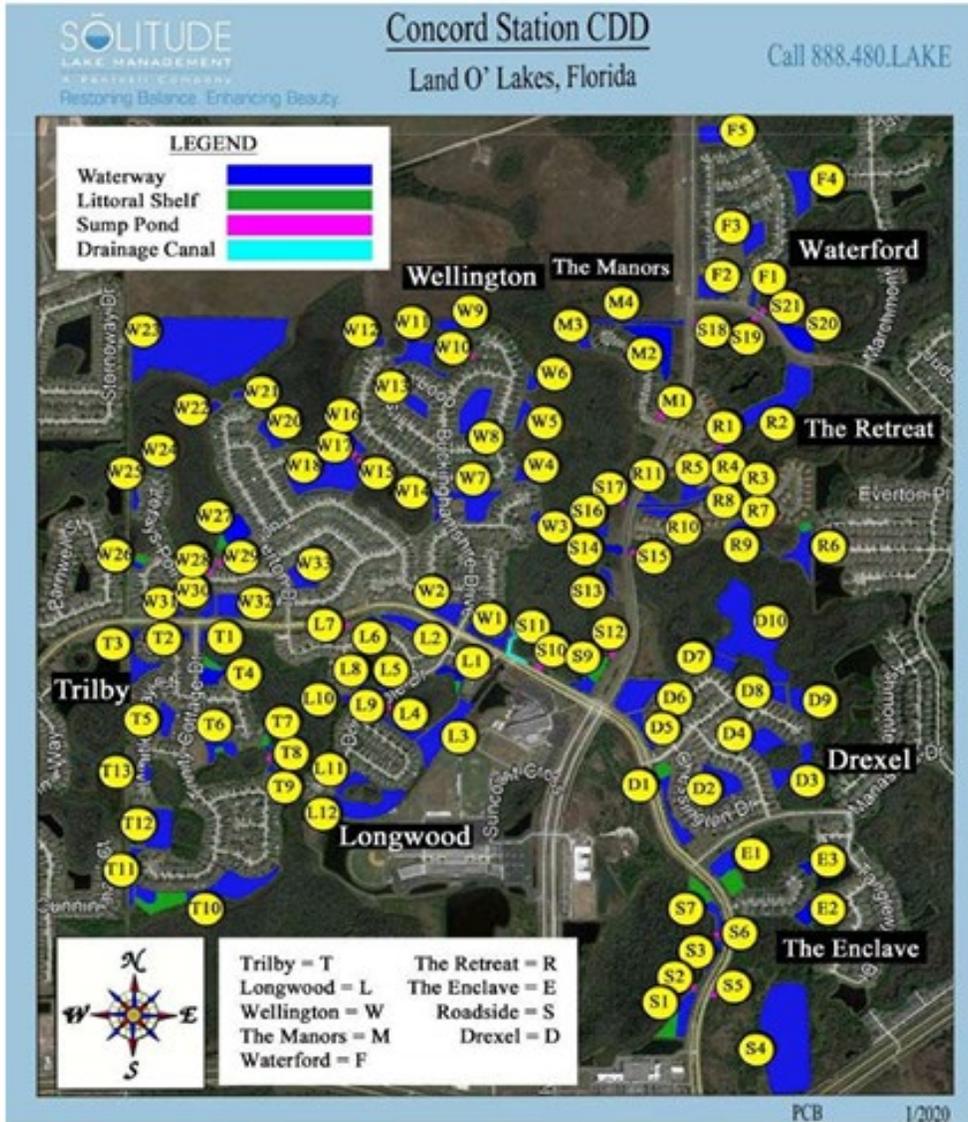

Opening Remarks and Attendance Notes

The Meeting was called to order. Establishing the quorum, Supervisors LaBarbera, Griffin, Cisternas, Wagner, and Berdeguez were present in person. Ms. Thibault attempted to connect with Ms. Moczynski before moving on to audience comments.

II. Audience Comments – Agenda Items (limited to 3 minutes per individual)

Members of the public were invited to speak. Chairwoman LaBarbera agreed to entertain the comments on non-agenda items. An audience member brought two concerns to the table. First, trash in the common areas in Trilby, the entrance of the Trilby subdivision and the Park. Resident stated there is a pond in the back where she has had to pick up tires, bicycle parts, and large pieces of Styrofoam. The resident expressed confusion as to why the trash is not being picked up if landscapers are frequently mowing. Board members agreed that it was a fair complaint. Second, there was a comment regarding motorized vehicles, the resident is still having an issue with kids cutting through her property. The resident claimed it disturbs the peace and the wildlife in the common area and requested to know what the plan to address the matter is. Chairwoman LaBarbera addressed the issue, stating that the board can send out a cease-and-desist but can't pursue further action if they are unable to identify the perpetrators, made difficult by the helmets. Chairwoman LaBarbera stated she spoke to the Pasco County Sheriff's, they reiterated that nothing can be done as they have a right to be there, as long as they are not destroying any property. Chairwoman LaBarbera also spoke to the Pasco County Sheriff's office about hosting a community safety event in reference to the scooters. The Sheriff Office agreed to speak to the adolescents about the laws and respecting other people's property. Chairwoman LaBarbera suggested to the resident to feel free to send a picture/proof if they knew who the individual is. Once identified, the board would be able to send a cease-and-desist letter through legal. The Sherriff's department suggests calling the non-emergency number if the kids/motorists are spotted on public roadways. Chairwoman LaBarbera reinforced that, stating that motorcycle licenses are required for dirt bikes, and all bike riders need to follow bicycle laws, including wearing a helmet, so it is best to report anything to the police.

47 Chairwoman LaBarbera also requested a stronger police presence in the community, which the department will
48 attempt to accommodate. Resident claimed to have seen the destruction of property herself, and have a video, which she
49 was advised to send to Chairwoman LaBarbera and Ms. Thibault to be dealt with through legal. The resident suggested
50 fences, but the board informed her that it would not be possible due to cost and how often they would need to be repaired.
51 Chairwoman LaBarbera reiterated that identification is needed to pursue any legal action and informed the resident that
52 if she has video of the kids trespassing, or if they are actively trespassing, she can call the police. Resident claimed she
53 is going to speak to the parents of the resident trespassing before taking the footage to the police. Ms. Moczynski joined
54 and informed the audience that any video submitted to the district would become a public record, something she warned
55 the audience to be cognizant of, especially regarding anything that depicts minors. Ms. Thibault made a last call for
56 audience comments; hearing none, the board moved on to the agenda items.

57 III. Professional Vendor Presentations

58 *Item addressed out of order.*

59 Presentation & Discussion of Responses to District Counsel Informal RFP

60 Chairwoman requested to move the order and bring up District Counsel matter before the vendor presentations.
61 Chairwoman LaBarbera referenced emails requests Ms. Thibault had sent, making a request for qualifications (RFQ) for
62 three district attorneys. One responded back, stating they were not taking on new clients, one responded stating they
63 would get back to the board and never did, and the law firm of Kutak Rock submitted.

64 Associate Kyle Magee began the Kutak Rock presentation, giving background information on the firm and himself.
65 Kutak Rock's Florida office focuses on District Counsel work for CDD's, with 19 attorneys and 5 paralegals dedicated
66 to this office, and 2 litigators on staff in Tallahassee. The firm also has litigators in Georgia who can provide backup if
67 needed. Mr. Magee explained the overall experience of the team using Partner Jonathan Johnson as he has been in the
68 industry a long time. Mr. Magee explained that most of the lower-level work gets pushed down to the assistants, saving
69 the Districts money in legal fees. Mr. Magee shared some of his own experience, having worked in government practice
70 for the last ten years: six with a state agency, and four with Kutak Rock.

71 **On a MOTION by Chairwoman LaBarbera, SECONDED by Supervisor Griffin, WITH ALL IN FAVOR, the Board**
72 **Approved to Engage Kutak Rock District Counsel for the Concord Station Community Development District.**

73 *Item addressed out of order.*

74 District Counsel – Kilinski Van Wyk

75 1. Employee Handbook – The complete red-line version of the employee handbook needed to be sent to the
76 Supervisors.

77 Ms. Moczynski explained what the red-line version would show, including removed provisions that would
78 not apply, and added provisions that would apply. There was a not-to-exceed (NTE) for \$1,250 with an hour
79 remaining. Supervisor Griffin questioned whether Ms. Moczynski reviewed the comments before forwarding them
80 to the Supervisors. Ms. Moczynski advised that she did not as she did not want to duplicate any work for the
81 District and was not experienced in employment counsel and just took what Mr. Looknanan and Ms. Thibault sent
82 over.

83 2. Thrive Hydration Therapy – District could not move forward before the vendor request for January 1st, as
84 insurance requirements were not satisfied. Some of the insurance requirements have since been obtained and
85 have been sent to Mr. Looknanan and management to be reviewed as the board sees fit. Ms. Thibault advised
86 the board that she sent the information to the district insurance carrier for their insight.

87 3. RedTree Invoice – Demand letter was not sent to the correct person, entity, or address. Kutak Rock will handle
88 the matter moving forward.

89 4. Kilinski Van Wyk - Letter of Resignation – Dated December 12th with an effective date of January 8th

90 On a MOTION by Chairwoman LaBarbera, SECONDED by Supervisor Cisternas, WITH ALL IN FAVOR, the Board
91 Approved the Resignation of Kilinski Van Wyk - District Counsel - for the Concord Station Community Development
92 District.

93 Ms. Moczynski requested an official motion for Kutak Rock to be retained for the remainder of the meeting and
94 confirmed that billing would end immediately.

95 On a MOTION by Chairwoman LaBarbera, SECONDED by Supervisor Berdeguez, WITH ALL IN FAVOR, the Board
96 Approved to Retain Kutak Rock for the Remainder of the Meeting at 6:54 pm for the Concord Station Community
97 Development District.

98 As to the tot lot transition, MS. Moczynski has not received confirmation that they would cover all the transfer costs.
99 New counsel will follow up. Ms. Moczynski and Mr. Webb communicated about the actions affiliated with the transfer,
100 i.e. a title search, documents, and an engineer to double-check the bill of sale for items left out. Mr. Webb received a
101 rough estimate of the hours and hourly rate, and he was going to go to his client to see if the terms were agreeable. Ms.
102 Moczynski has not heard from him since. She will send a copy of the email to Ms. Thibault.

103 **A. District Engineering Report – Stantec Project Manager Greg Woodcock**

104 **1. Update on Stormwater bids & Discussion of Seal Coating Clubhouse Parking Lot and Pothole Repair**

105 Item on hold until the drainage project is nailed down. Tentative estimate, as briefly mentioned during the meeting,
106 is between \$7,000-\$8,000.

107 **2. Update & Discussion of Tree Replacement Project; Arborist Walk**

108 On the matter of the tree removal project, a meeting was scheduled for Monday, January 12, 206 at 9:30 a.m, with
109 Arborist Aboard to review the area and provide expertise on the situation. The report from that meeting will be brought
110 back at the next Concord Station CDD meeting.

111 Mr. Looknanan is working with the county to get a permit (if needed). Chairwoman LaBarbera raised concerns as
112 the decision at the last meeting was to take no action towards removing the trees; she was reminded by Supervisor Wagner
113 of the board's motion to allow a professional arborist to conduct a review at \$400. Mr. Woodcock shared the arborist
114 findings, stating that he did not find any visible damage to any structures, and that the residents have an obligation and
115 right to maintain the tree roots on their own property. Mr. Woodcock was able to clarify that the board is paying for the
116 review but not the permit at this time. The board agreed that they are not removing the trees unless they are found to be
117 causing damage. Mr. Woodcock recommended waiting to submit anything for permitting to the county until after the
118 meeting on Monday to ensure all parties are on the same page. Mr. Looknanan mentioned Steve Valencio and his attempts
119 to come to the board with requests. The topic was wrapped up with a note that the residents are more than welcome to
120 be present at the arborist meeting to hear what the arborist has to say.

121 **3. Update on Drainage Project/Stormwater System Assessment**

122 *Item addressed first under Exhibit 1*

123 Drainage work from ADS would total \$82,329, associated with the previous priority 1 items. As this was not included
124 in the budget, Mr. Woodcock will go through the list and note emergency items and tailor the list by order of magnitude.

125 **4. Update on the Plats and Ownership Review: SR 54 Street Lights**

126 *Item addressed second under Exhibit 1*

127 On ownership of the parcels at ~~Mentmore~~ and Sun Lake, Mr. Woodcock requested Kutak Rock review the agreement
128 and dedication language with the lighting company. The streetlights are located outside of the right-of way. The CDD
129 pays for the streetlights through a lease option with Duke Energy. The District wants to validate their responsibility for
130 paying for lights on the country road. Mr. Magee agreed to investigate.

131 **B. Solitude Lake Management**

132 **1. Waterway Inspection Report**

133 Supervisor Cisternas stated that the board will have to go out for RFP on aquatic systems. Mr. Lookninan mentioned
134 a resident has been complaining about trash by the ponds. Supervisor Berdeguez noted that Mr. Hernandez has been
135 going down to pick up trash by the ponds but there are a lot of ponds. Ms. Thibault asked the board if they would like
136 Counsel to draft an RFP for the February meeting, to which the board said yes. Mr. Magee agreed to bring them back an
137 RFP to the next meeting.

138 **C. RedTree Landscape Maintenance**

139 **1. Landscape Maintenance Report**

140 Under landscape maintenance, the RedTree monthly maintenance report was included in the agenda materials.

141 **2. RedTree Irrigation Reports:**

142 A compiled set of all irrigation reports covering ~~RedTree's~~ entire tenure was included in the agenda materials. The
143 board wants irrigation reports included on the agenda every month. Mr. Lookninan advised that Mr. Hernandez opened
144 valve boxes, repaired and replaced 19 sprinkler heads and addressed 6 system leaks, starting at the clubhouse. Mr.
145 Lookninan noted that any visibly cracked sidewalk is because there is a water leak under it. Chairwoman LaBarbera
146 estimated current irrigation costs to be about \$12,000, before Ms. Thibault confirmed the precise number to be \$15,000.
147 The board discussed the issue, finding that most of the money spent thus far was on getting the systems to operate
148 correctly. It was mentioned that Mr. Hernandez could concentrate on the irrigation issue if he doesn't have any major
149 projects going on.

150 **D. Presentation & Discussion of Responses to District Counsel Informal RFP**

151 *Item addressed under Professional Vendor Presentation*

- 152 1. Erin McCormick, Esq – *currently not submitting*
- 153 2. Kutak Rock – *Motion by Chair, seconded by Griffin*
- 154 3. Persson, Cohen, Mooney, Fernandez & Jackson, P.A. – *no response*

155 **E. District Counsel – Kilinski Van Wyk**

156 *Item addressed under Professional Vendor Presentation*

- 157 1. Employee Handbook – Updated version needed to be sent to the Supervisors
- 158 2. Thrive Hydration Therapy – District could not move forward until proper insurance is in place.

159 **F. Presentation of Amenity Center Report**

160 Mr. Lookninan presented the Amenity Management Report:

161 The Pasco County Supervisor of Elections submitted a request to use the clubhouse to hold the primary and general
162 elections. Mr. Lookninan informed the board of the due date for the paperwork to be executed (the 18th of this month)
163 and inquired about the best District individual to execute. The election dates are August 18th and November 3rd.

164 On a MOTION by Chairwoman LaBarbera, SECONDED by Supervisor Wagner, WITH ALL IN FAVOR, the Board
165 Voted to Allow Pasco County Supervisor of Election the Use of the Clubhouse for the Primary and General Elections,
166 for the Concord Station Community Development District.

167 Mr. Lookninan provided the inspection of the backflows and dehydrating devices invoices to the District Manager.

168
169 Mr. Lookninan informed the Board that Mr. Hernandez is correcting the sign damage that he has come across. He
170 has already started on the clubhouse, repainted white poles that were bent, and straightened the stop signs. The Board
171 suggested taking pictures and noting the exact location of the misaligned signs.

172
173 **December Holiday Event** - The December holiday event was a success, with only two minor complaints that have
174 since been addressed. One complaint regarded the lines at the funnel cake station and the second regarded the face
175 painting station closing 20 minutes before the event ended, leaving a child declined. Mr. Lookninan stated his intent for
176 next time, namely, ensuring that vendors will stay for all hours, and monitoring the portions of funnel cake served and
177 purchased. Supervisor Cisternas thanked Mr. Lookninan, elaborating that she thought the event was a success and that
178 he did a great job. Supervisor Cisternas suggested an age limit for the train, which sparked a personal anecdote from
179 Chairwoman LaBarbera.

180
181 **Easter Event** - Regarding the Easter event, Mr. Lookninan has gathered two proposals: one estimate for March
182 22nd, and a second estimate for April 4th. Supervisor Cisternas shared concerns over holding the event the Saturday of
183 Easter, as she stated people are likely to be getting ready for Easter and may not be prepared to bring their kids dressed
184 up to see the Easter Bunny. She recommended the weekend before. Mr. Lookninan agreed to reach out to the company
185 for a new date.

186
187 **Small Business Expo** - The small business expo is scheduled for January 17th. Mr. Lookninan reported that thirteen
188 companies signed up but the expo only has room for ten. He told the last three companies that the next event will be
189 scheduled in the next couple of weeks (March 21st), and he wants to see how this first expo goes. Chairwoman LaBarbera
190 questioned the method of organization, to which Mr. Lookninan confirmed set-up. Supervisor Cisternas suggested
191 holding a second expo in February, as there were so many people interested in the January expo. Mr. Lookninan reiterated
192 that there are already three companies signed up for the next expo. The board agreed to hold an expo in February as well
193 (tentative date February 7th). Supervisor Cisternas raised a question to legal counsel as to the exchange of money. As per
194 a recommendation from the previous legal counsel, the board had noted that money could not be exchanged at the expo
195 tables, as there were concerns about CDD property being utilized for profit. A resident interested in participating in the
196 small business expo questioned why that is the case, as she does arts and crafts. After hearing the counsel's
197 recommendation, the resident raised a counter point to which Supervisor Cisternas asking how it is any different from
198 the food trucks that are allowed to park and sell food for profit in the community. She also referenced the bake sales in
199 the clubhouse i.e. Girl Scouts events that had been hosted in the past, questioning the difference between them and arts
200 and crafts as well. Mr. Magee answered, stating a liability waiver is needed for each vendor coming to use the property.
201 He stated he doesn't see a distinction between vendors who use the clubhouse and selling arts and crafts at the small
202 business expo.

203 Chairwoman LaBarbera suggested a dual indoor and outdoor expo, maybe a Saturday community craft fair/small
204 business fair. She suggested opening the overflow lot for vendors who want to set up shop. Supervisor Cisternas
205 recommended attempting this set up a couple of times to see what the traffic looks like. She expressed her own interest
206 in setting up a table. Chairwoman LaBarbera suggested informing the three vendors who have been pushed off to next
207 month that they are more than welcome to participate as long as they participate outside. Supervisor Griffin suggested
208 informing the three vendors that they can participate if they bring their own tables, as that is the only stipulation on space.
209 Supervisor Griffin asked Mr. Lookninan if he planned to do his own table for tango dancing. Mr. Lookninan advised no.
210 Supervisor Cisternas suggested having the January 17th and February expos indoors as they were advertised, allocating

211 for an outdoor expo if there is enough interest in the products and services being offered. It was suggested that vendors
212 could bring their own tents and tables.

213 Mr. Magee offered to raise the previous question at the monthly meeting with all the attorneys about general
214 concerns. The board was previously advised that they didn't need a liability waiver as the event is comprised of residents
215 so it's not any different from them coming to use the clubhouse in their own time. Chairwoman LaBarbera asked if there
216 is any clarification that these people are residents. Mr. Lookninan stated when they sign up online, they must verify that
217 they are residents. Mr. Magee would be more comfortable with a liability waiver in place, especially if there are going to
218 be transactions. Supervisor Cisternas, in full transparency, shared her tentative plan with the board, finding that it might
219 be easier for her to sell her items after the expo. However, she pointed out that that is not the case for all vendors selling
220 products, for example, baked goods, as that is usually more of an "impulse buy". Mr. Lookninan reiterated with
221 Supervisor Cisternas: finding that February 7th will be a small business expo. They will skip an expo in March and do it
222 again in April, which may be the outdoor expo. Mr. Magee will email the standard liability waiver so anyone who
223 participates in the upcoming months can fill it out before setting up a table. The board discussed advertising, which was
224 done through a newsletter, and posted on the community Facebook.

225 **Security Cameras Update** – After a lightning strike in August, control of the gates was lost. They have regained
226 access to the pool, tennis, and basketball courts. Access to the playground has not been restored. Mr. Lookninan's
227 proposed idea was to upgrade the cameras first. Mr. Lookninan needed to know the status of the proposal he submitted
228 in September. Ms. Thibault had established contact immediately with the vendor, finding that the District is still waiting
229 to review a final as there were some changes to the warrantee agreement and some verbiage that the vendor added. Ms.
230 Thibault has requested the final version; Chairwoman LaBarbera said as soon as she receives it, she'll sign it. Supervisor
231 Cisternas raised a point of concern regarding the board's previous decision to only allow two key fobs per family. She
232 inquired if the board would be interested in expanding that in the future, as she has had a few residents reach out and
233 inform her that two fobs are not enough for some families. Supervisor Cisternas commented for the sake of resident ease,
234 claiming that switching key fobs between family members is hard. She acknowledged that the 2-fob policy was initially
235 placed to keep checks and balances. Mr. Lookninan noted that the CDD makes a profit off the key fobs as they buy them
236 for \$7.50 and sell them for \$30.00. He stated that financially it would be a good idea, but it is up to the board to decide.
237 Chairwoman LaBarbera held her position, stating 2 fobs are fine, especially if kept in a universal area of the home rather
238 than a keychain. Supervisor Cisternas advised again on user friendly applications.

239 Mr. Lookninan informed the board that the center still allows people in without a fob, it's just a lengthy process of
240 bringing them inside to verify their information, i.e. their address. Mr. Lookninan advised that they can't deny residents
241 access if they can verify that they live there. Chairwoman LaBarbera claimed that they can deny them if they do not have
242 their key fob. Supervisor Cisternas advised the board what the manual says, stating if the resident doesn't have their fob,
243 but can verify that they live there, they can be let in. Chairwoman LaBarbera proposed a change to the manual, explaining
244 the issue that arises from enforcing that policy. She stated that now they opened themselves to dealing with unruly, rude
245 teenagers who can verify they live there, noting that at 16, some of them are disturbing the peace with foul language and
246 behavior. Supervisor Cisternas claimed them to be the outliers, with Chairwoman LaBarbera in disagreement, as she
247 claimed it is the norm. As the key fob works for everything on the premises, so does the rule in the manual apply to
248 everywhere on the premises. It was noted that everyone must be at least 16 years of age to use the fob alone, on top of
249 having proof of residence. The supervisors geared towards parental checks and balances along the lines of ensuring
250 teenagers must have permission from their parents to use the fob and subsequently the facilities rather than allocating
251 more fobs. Supervisor Cisternas included the board in the reasoning one of the residents gave her, stating that she (the
252 resident) wanted more key fobs because she has a teen daughter who wants to use the restroom when she is walking
253 home (to Trilby) from school. Chairwoman LaBarbera suggested she use the restroom at school. The board discovered
254 the girl does not have an ID, finding that she would not be allowed into the clubhouse alone even with a fob. Supervisor
255 Cisternas argued on the side of consideration. Chairwoman LaBarbera was reluctant to manage to the outlier. Supervisor
256 Cisternas was not in support of this decision.

257 Chairwoman LaBarbera argued increasing fobs will end in a slew of vandalism; Supervisor Cisternas claimed they
258 would have access to the cameras and fob information, and as such would be able to know who committed the vandalism.
259 Chairwoman LaBarbera voted for 2 fobs as they are not policing who uses it or when.

260 **On a MOTION by Supervisor Cisternas, SECONDED by No One, the Motion to Increase Key Fobs per Family to 3**
261 **Failed for the Concord Station Community Development District.**

262 **Waterford Pump Status** – The pump is back and the fountain was repaired at no cost; it was on the warrantee.
263 Supervisor Griffin applauded Mr. Looknanan, noting that it took him 3 hours there and back to drive up and pick up the
264 necessary equipment. Chairwoman LaBarbera noted it took 2 years and one right person to get this done. Thanks were
265 given to Mr. Looknanan. Mr. Looknanan noted the pig tail still needed to be replaced. SiteX will be sending a new one
266 free of charge.

267 **Contract with Steadfast** – The contract was initiated while Ms. Thibault was not with the district. When she reached
268 out to validate status and any changes they wanted to incorporate, Steadfast advised her that they had not received a
269 contract. Ms. Thibault promptly sent it to them, and they executed. It should be in the board's inboxes.

270 **Condition of the Grass** – Mr. Hernandez goes almost every morning, and he opens the valves manually; grass is
271 looking a lot better.

272 **Resident Complaints** – Parent complained about daughter not being able to use the clubhouse restroom, became a
273 nightmare to accommodate so Mr. Looknanan has been saying no to any student trying to use the restroom.

274 **Last Year** – After the board decided to hire their own staff, they have saved approximately \$70,000 on projects that
275 if they had sent to vendors would have cost the CDD well over \$70,000.

276 **New Projects in the Coming Year:**

- 277 1. Painting the splash pad – \$1,500

278 Supervisor Griffin questioned the type of paint used; Mr. Looknanan explained it is paint with
279 sealant specifically for splashpad and pool. He explained a bit of the process, stating they will
280 need to power wash the area, place a coat, let it dry, place a second coat, and then let that dry. The
281 paint comes with non-slip, and sealant. Chairwoman LaBarbera remembered two types of paint
282 can be used for splash pad, one is good, one wears down a lot faster. Mr. Looknanan guaranteed
283 he had done his research and is confident in the paint selection. The board debated the name of the
284 paint. Ms. Thibault shared that Long Lake just had done similar work and it cost them close to
285 \$3,000. Chairwoman LaBarbera stated that Mr. Looknanan has probably saved the community the
286 better part of a \$100,000; the board was in agreement.

- 287 2. Delamination of small section of the pool (plaster) - \$250

- 288 3. Painting interior and exterior of clubhouse –

289 Mr. Looknanan advised the board to match the color of the monuments; lighter color on top and
290 darker on the bottom (what was used for the trim). Supervisors discussed the color of the paint.
291 Supervisor Cisternas had made the original paint decision; Supervisor Griffin stated that shade of
292 white shows all the dirt and grime. Mr. Looknanan shared that he and Mr. Hernandez were looking
293 at the monuments and found that the same sprinkler system that stained the sidewalk has been
294 staining the monument as well. Supervisor Griffin cautioned that the light color would show bird
295 defecation and other grime. Supervisor Berdeguéz questioned if that would be the main color;
296 Supervisor Griffin suggested flipping the colors, so the dark would be on top and the light on the
297 bottom. Supervisor Cisternas requested an AI picture. Mr. Looknanan will provide a visual.

298 4. Lights on the tennis courts, basketball courts, the pool, and the playground –

299 Supervisor Wagner asked if there was an issue with the projects. Mr. Looknanan reiterated that he
300 would need his credit card paid off to cover the costs of working on a project a month. He
301 guaranteed the board that he is going to spend the least amount of money possible on the planned
302 projects.

303 Supervisor Cisternas asked about a pergola for the solar panel in Tuckerton. Amid board
304 discussion, Ms. Thibault shared intent to establish a formal vision project, noting these projects
305 will be incorporated on that list. She requested a high watermark budget per project from Mr.
306 Looknanan so they can bring back a budget amendment to establish a line item for these projects.
307 She wanted him to estimate a higher monetary figure rather than a lower one. Chairwoman
308 LaBarbera stated they have the 2025 Solar Panel. Supervisor Wagner Suggested prioritizing the
309 pool deck chairs as a project, as it is going to get hot out. Supervisor Berdeguez inquired if anyone
310 has turned on the bubblers. When Mr. Looknanan checked, he found them off. He stated he is
311 going to have to contact someone to check the system.

312 A resident present, asked Mr. Looknanan if they were putting lights on the courts, to which he
313 responded, stating he was glad to, but he wasn't sure if there was an ongoing conversation and
314 approval. Supervisor Cisternas advised that they did vote on it when they put it on the vision board.
315 Mr. Looknanan reminded the board that there was a conversation about controlling the time, to
316 which numerous Supervisors expressed concern. Supervisor Cisternas reminded the Board that
317 the lights would remain on the same schedule, rendering the same question: if they are on the same
318 schedule, why do they need the lights? She answered the question, advising that it is due to the
319 time change, as it gets darker earlier at different times of the year. She stated the dawn to dusk
320 setting was only for the pool, everything else should be following the clubhouse schedule. The
321 board wanted the lights to extend, but not too late.

322 **G. District Manager 8:01**

323 **1. Suncoast Pool Service – Updated COI**

324 They provided a COI, but it was dated incorrectly. Ms. Thibault requested a new COI that reflects the new
325 contract date. Ms. Thibault has informed them through numerous means to bring the COI directly to Mr.
326 Looknanan. Ms. Thibault can confirm her messages are being received, as she messaged to ensure he could receive
327 the billing information from the new email/address, and he replied affirmatively. Supervisor Griffin inquired if
328 Mr. Looknanan had been able to get in contact with him, to which he had. Mr. Looknanan's relayed message stated
329 that Suncoast Pool Service had provided the COI but an updated version was needed. Ms. Thibault reiterated her
330 request for a new COI. Supervisor Griffin advised Mr. Looknanan to inform him in person that this document is
331 urgently needed. Mr. Looknanan informed the board that the pool company that submitted a proposal months ago
332 swung by that day.

333 **2. Status of SR 54 LED Streetlight – Upgrade from Duke Energy**

334 Duke provided an estimate: existing rates are about \$1,085.42, to switch to solar it would be \$872.30, yielding
335 almost \$200 a month saved on utilities. Ms. Thibault elaborated that most of the charges are for lease of the pole
336 and the light fixture. Ms. Thibault asked for board approval to approve the lighting estimate. This estimate does
337 not take into account any of the research done by Mr. Woodcock in regard to the payment of the streetlights on
338 the county road. Mr. Magee is going to review the dedication language to make sure that Concord Station is
339 responsible for that. Supervisor Griffin questioned what was being changed. Ms. Thibault explained that they
340 would only be changing the bulbs, not the light fixtures. Upon the change, the LED lights will be brighter than the
341 old bulbs. Chairwoman LaBarbera elaborated further, informing the board that the purple lights are an issue with

342 the bulb, usually replaced by Duke once they are informed of them. Supervisors discussed the shade and intensity
343 of the lights before moving on.

344 On a MOTION by Supervisor Berdeguez, SECONDED by Chairwoman LaBarbera, WITH ALL IN FAVOR, the Board
345 Moved to Execute the Lighting Estimate Provided by Duke Energy, for the Concord Station Community Development
346 District.

347 **3. Update on Duke Energy Account *0087 Billing Surge**

348 They have not reached back out. Supervisor Berdeguez reiterated the quantity of the billing surge and questioned if
349 the cause had yet been found. Ms. Thibault confirmed that the charges were approximately \$1,000, followed by a couple
350 of months where the charge was around \$3,500, before dropping down to \$1.39 for 2 months before then jumping up to
351 \$1,000 again. Supervisor Griffin hypothesized possible reasons for the overcharge, such as the well pump or sprinklers.
352 Supervisor Wagner divided the \$3,547 by 3 months, finding that it comes out to be \$1,182, which is repeated a couple
353 lines down on the analysis. The board wondered if it is an overpayment or if it might be balancing out a billing issue
354 (wherein the CDD was underbilled previously and then overbilled to compensate). Ms. Thibault committed to checking
355 with Duke.

356 **4. Status of Sales Tax Reimbursed by Kai**

357 Ms. Thibault sent them an email on Tuesday and has not heard back from them. She had been told that the
358 reimbursement was sent, but she had yet to receive anything. Ms. Thibault informed the board that Haven Management
359 took over the same building that Anchor had, so they just transferred the mail. There was no check in the mail. Anchor
360 Stone advised they did make the previously discussed payment to the Department of Revenue by check.

361 **5. Status of Sales Tax Reimbursement from State –** The State has yet to confirm any refund amount and any
362 deliverable date.

363 **6. Board of Supervisors CDD Email License / Microsoft 365 Business Basic Subscription Renewal –**
364 Processed.

365 **7. Update on the USA Fence Case –**

366 Ms. Thibault advised the board that the check, with the final amount of \$2,300 was sent to them. Ms. Thibault and
367 Chairwoman LaBarbera reached out and spoke to USA Fence and spoke to David Manns, the contractor/administrator.
368 He advised that he cannot make any decisions based on their statement that they would like this to be the last payment.
369 Ms. Thibault broke down the charges, explaining that \$4,377 was from damage that was caused by the USA fence crew.
370 She moved on to mention that they also spoke to the owner, Greg, no last name provided. At this point Chairwoman
371 LaBarbera took over and shared that he told them he is going to send a notice of intent to remove the fence because the
372 fence is property of USA Fence until the invoice is paid in full. She advised him that they are in the process of switching
373 district counsel and would notify him tomorrow with the details of the new counsel and where he can send the notice of
374 intent. He advised them to pay the remaining \$4,300 to avoid having to cover the \$50 an hour corporate attorney for an
375 extended period of time to address the matter. Chairwoman LaBarbera continued, stating that Greg advised that he was
376 sure Concord Station had their own attorney as well, and that they were sure to be expensive, to which she agreed before
377 informing him that he would be covering District attorney charges under their contract. Chairwoman LaBarbera reiterated
378 their stance, that Concord did not properly prep the area, Concord's stance is that they damaged the area. The total charges
379 are \$23,000. The District has paid roughly \$18,000 at this point. Mr. Magee advised involving a litigator from the office.
380 Ms. Thibault was going to send them his and Mr. Earlywine's information so they can continue to address. Mr. Magee
381 to send a response to RedTree Invoice. Supervisor Cisternas found that there is a record indicating that they failed to
382 inform that there will be a cost for certain services. The board confirmed that there was no contract, nobody agreed to
383 pay an invoice.

384 **H. Public Hearings for Adopting Restated Rules of Procedure**

385 **1. Open the Public Hearing**

386 **On a MOTION by Supervisor Berdeguez, SECONDED by Supervisor Cisternas, WITH ALL IN FAVOR, the Board**
387 **Approved to Open the Public Hearing, for the Concord Station Community Development District.**

388 **2. Presentation of the Restated Rules of Procedure**

389 Ms. Thibault referred to the copies of the restated rules of procedure that had been advanced to the board by their
390 former District Counsel. She also referenced the red line copies she had sent through email.

391 **3. Public Comments on the Restated Rules of Procedure**

392 Ms. Thibault opened the floor to any public comments on the rules of procedure. There were no public comments
393 or questions.

394 **4. Close the Public Hearing**

395 **On a MOTION by Supervisor Wagner, SECONDED by Supervisor Berdeguez, WITH ALL IN FAVOR, the Board**
396 **Approved to Close the Public Hearing, for the Concord Station Community Development District.**

397 Mr. Magee questioned the content on the red line copies, as he had not received his own. Ms. Thibault committed to
398 sending him the document at a later time.

399 **5. Consideration for Adoption Resolution 2026-09, Adopting Amended & Restated Rules of Procedure**

400 **On a MOTION by Supervisor Wagner, SECONDED by Supervisor Berdeguez, WITH ALL IN FAVOR, the Board**
401 **Adopted Resolution 2026-09, Adopting Amended & Restated rules of Procedure, for the Concord Station Community**
402 **Development District.**

403 Mr. Magee informed Ms. Thibault that a rule number 2026-01 needs to be assigned as a requirement under new
404 legislation. This would need to be included at the top, by the effective date, and in the resolution as well.

405 **1. Administrative Items**

406 **A. Consideration for Acceptance: November 2025 Unaudited Financial Report**

407 Ms. Thibault alerted the board to the fact that several projects are running grossly over budget, primarily due to not
408 having a budget amendment in place. This was regarding the \$70,000 project Mr. Woodcock was overseeing. As the
409 billing came in afterward, the budget amendment can be moved to next month. She informed the board that other than
410 that, everything was on track. Supervisor Berdeguez expressed concern over having only received the report yesterday.
411 Ms. Thibault explained the delay, stating the report was shuffled between the prior district manager and herself for
412 numerous rounds of revision. Haven Management didn't receive the revised copy until the day before the meeting.
413 Supervisor Berdeguez reiterated the need to have these documents available sooner. Chairwoman LaBarbera voiced her
414 thoughts on the matter, explaining that it was not Ms. Thibault's fault. Chairwoman LaBarbera vouched for the back-
415 and-forth process, claiming it as a "whole lesson" in accounting principles. In regard to the invoice check details, the
416 report was recompiled, as the original report did not include about \$28,000 in disbursements that Ms. Thibault's team
417 isolated when they took over on January 1st. After one more review, Ms. Thibault will distribute the report. Starting
418 Tuesday, the board will have access to last week's detailed report, continuing on a weekly basis. Ms. Thibault clarified
419 that the report they are discussing is for December, not November. Supervisor Griffin had a question about the date, to
420 which Ms. Thibault and Supervisor Wagner provided the answer.

421 **On a MOTION by Supervisor Berdeguez, SECONDED by Supervisor Griffin, WITH ALL IN FAVOR, the Board**
422 **Accepted the September Unaudited Financial Report, for the Concord Station Community Development District.**

423 **B. Consideration for Approval – Brought back – The minutes of the Concord Station October 9, 2025 Regular**
424 **Meeting of the Board of Supervisors**

425 Ms. Thibault sent the redline version of the minutes to the board members, followed by the red-line revisions from
426 prior District Counsel. Supervisor Cisternas expressed concern over the use of “another supervisor stated” and would
427 prefer to have the Supervisor identified. See line 435 of October minutes for reference. Chairwoman agreed. Supervisor
428 Berdeguez requested the minutes include the end of meeting time, as they were missing from the October and December
429 minutes. Ms. Thibault agreed to try and identify by voice which supervisor is speaking and to include meeting end times
430 in the minutes.

431 **On a MOTION by Supervisor Berdeguez, SECONDED by Supervisor Cisternas, WITH ALL IN FAVOR, the Board**
432 **Approved the Minutes of Concord Station October 9, 2025 Regular Meeting of the Board of Supervisors, for the Concord**
433 **Station Community Development District.**

434 **C. Consideration for Approval – Brought back – The Minutes of the Concord Station November 13, 2025**
435 **Regular Meeting of the Board of Supervisors**

436 **On a MOTION by Supervisor Berdeguez, SECONDED by Supervisor Cisternas, WITH ALL IN FAVOR, the Board**
437 **Approved the Minutes of Concord Station November 13, 2025 Regular Meeting of the Board of Supervisors, for the**
438 **Concord Station Community Development District.**

439 **D. Consideration for Approval – Brought back – The Minutes of the Concord Station December 2, 2025**
440 **Regular Meeting of the Board of Supervisors**

441 Supervisor Berdeguez reiterated incorporating the end time in the minutes moving forward. Supervisor Cisternas
442 was only present for a portion of the meeting.

443 **On a MOTION by Supervisor Berdeguez, SECONDED by Chairwoman LaBarbera, WITH ALL IN FAVOR, the Board**
444 **Approved the Minutes of Concord Station December 2, 2025 Regular Meeting of the Board of Supervisors, for the**
445 **Concord Station Community Development District.**

446 **E. Consideration for Approval – The Minutes of the Concord Station December 11, 2025 Regular Meeting of**
447 **the Board of Supervisors**

448 **On a MOTION by Chairwoman LaBarbera, SECONDED by Supervisor Wagner, WITH ALL IN FAVOR, the Board**
449 **Approved the Minutes of Concord Station December 11, 2025 Regular Meeting of the Board of Supervisors, for the**
450 **Concord Station Community Development District.**

451 **F. Presentation & Ratification of Steadfast Contract for Landscaping Services**

452 Ms. Thibault had sent the executed copy of the contract earlier that day; the Chairwoman can execute upon the
453 Board’s final approval. There were no changes to the contract. The only thing noted for change by Chairwoman
454 LaBarbera was the District Counsel listed on the contract. Board agreed to change it and have them resign it. Chairwoman
455 LaBarbera issued a new rule: moving forward, any contract that is signed electronically, by vendors or members of the
456 board, will require the DocuSign or Adobe certificates or would need to be a live, wet signature.

457 **On a MOTION by Chairwoman LaBarbera, SECONDED by Supervisor Cisternas, WITH ALL IN FAVOR, the Board**
458 **Approved Ratification of the Steadfast Contract for Landscaping Services, for the Concord Station Community**
459 **Development District.**

460 Chairwoman LaBarbera noticed Steadfast irrigation was charging \$85.00 an hour and initiated a re-execution of the
461 contract to bring billing down to \$60. Chairwoman LaBarbera requested a new contract on principle. Ms. Thibault
462 reached out to Steadfast associate during the meeting but did not receive a response. She posed a question to the board,

463 asking what they would like to do about negotiating if Steadfast does not agree to the \$60.00 an hour. The board decided
464 they would like the Chairperson to negotiate.

465 - Mr. Looknman raised concerns to Ms. Thibault about the irrigation charges per year in the contract under
466 landscaping. Ms. Thibault explained that the monthly irrigation wet check is included in the contract, but it does not
467 include repairs. The Board found that the hourly would only apply if there was an active work authorization for
468 repairs.

469 - Mr. Looknman reiterated, what the Board would need from Steadfast is the report, as part of the contract and in case
470 they need to go through it to measure a repair. He would require reports to be accurate and true. As a matter of
471 principle, Chairwoman LaBarbera would like for the contract to reflect \$60.00 per hour for irrigation repairs

472 - Ms. Thibault advised that the mulch is too high and shouldn't be more than 4 inches high.

473 **On a MOTION by Chairwoman LaBarbera, SECONDED by Supervisor Wagner, WITH ALL IN FAVOR, the Board**
474 **will Allow the Chairperson to Negotiate on Behalf of the District for the Irrigation Labor Rate, for the Concord Station**
475 **Community Development District.**

476 **G. Presentation & Ratification of Haven Management Solutions Contract for District Management Services**
477 **effective January 1, 2026**

478 Board stated new counsel needed to be listed.

479 **On a MOTION by Chairwoman LaBarbera, SECONDED by Supervisor Wagner, WITH ALL IN FAVOR, the Board**
480 **Approved Ratification of the Haven Management Solutions Contract for District Management Services effective January**
481 **1, 2026, for the Concord Station Community Development District.**

482 **H. Other Items to be Introduced**

483 **1. Consideration of Trespass Agreement with Pasco County Sherrif**

484 Ms. Thibault advised on behalf of the Pasco County Sherrif, that the trespass agreement is to be renewed annually.
485 The prior trespass agreement has not been received yet, and as such, a current trespass agreement is not in place.
486 Supervisor Cisternas suggested reviewing the prior agreement with the identified parcels, to determine if a list of all
487 Board members had been maintained and whether verbal confirmation from any Board member could be obtained to
488 determine whether someone was trespassing. Ms. Thibault is going to ask for last year's trespass agreement so they can
489 see what needs to be changed.

490 **2. Discussion of Process for Allowing Vendors to Utilize Amenity Center Parkin & Other Areas**

491 Ms. Thibault raised a question to the board: do they want to establish a process or set of rules to maintain and control
492 amenity center parking when being used by vendors? The question was brought up considering the Thrive ~~situation~~.
493 Chairwoman LaBarbera reiterated Ms. Thibault's question, explaining that it could be good to have a process in place to
494 limit the amount of people who can use the space, ideally to keep order. Supervisor Cisternas noted that a system like
495 that already exists organically, as it is already the board's prerogative whether to allow vendors like the Big Red Bus on
496 the property. She expressed if the vendors are interested, they can reach out to Mr. Looknman and put themselves on the
497 list for the next event. Mr. Magee informed the board that Kutak Rock does have a standard liability waiver for vendors
498 who are using district property, and they do prefer the districts use it. The Italian ice guy needs to sign a liability waiver.
499 Supervisor Wagner suggested putting the individuals attending the expo in the overflow parking so the residents can use
500 resident parking. Chairwoman LaBarbera clarified that she was speaking about oversized vehicles Mr. Magee to bring
501 language to the next meeting.

502 Board discussed Kutak Rock billing, namely how much they will be charged for travel. Mr. Magee informed the
503 board they will only be charged for 30 minutes to and 30 minutes from.

504 Supervisor Cisternas inquired as to what the realistic turnaround time is for Kutak Rock, noting that previous counsel
505 did not have a quick turn-around time. Mr. Magee answered a week, week and a half at most.

506 **Mr. Looknman has been working in the irrigation system for the HOA playground outside of his normal CDD hours.**

507 **I. Audience Comments – New Business – (limited to 3 minutes per individual)**

508 Resident complained of streetlights behind his home that are constantly shining in his backyard. He requested the
509 shield cost be researched. Ms. Thibault offered to call Duke, the Board decided to think on it and get back to the resident.

510 **2. Supervisor Request**

511 Supervisor Cisternas wanted to know if there are plans to clean the clubhouse floors again. Supervisor Cisternas
512 wanted to ask Mr. Looknman to reach out to Rhino to get the floors steamed. The water pump for the pool was fixed.
513 The health department came by and the district passed with hits on maximum depth signage and the section of the pool
514 that needs to be repatched.

515 Supervisor Berdeguez requested the lights on the fountain be repaired. Board brainstormed color combinations per
516 holiday/month. Supervisor Cisternas recommended making the fountain lights pink for the week of Valentine's day rather
517 than the entire month. Supervisor Cisternas also asked if Mr. Looknman knows where the remote for lights are.

518 **3. Adjournment**

519 With no further business, a motion to adjourn was made and seconded. Upon unanimous consent, the Chair
520 concluded the meeting.

521 **On a MOTION by Chairwoman LaBarbera, SECONDED by Supervisor Cisternas, WITH ALL IN FAVOR, the Board**
522 **Adjourned the Meeting for the Concord Station Community Development District at 9:02pm.**

4 The Regular Meeting of the Board of Supervisors of the Concord Station Community Development District was held
5 Thursday, February 12th, 2026, at 6:30 p.m. at the Concord Station Amenity Center, 18636 Mentmore Blvd., Land O’Lakes,
6 Florida 34638. The public was able to listen and/or participate in person or live via Zoom.
7

8 **I. Call to Order / Roll Call**

9 The meeting was called to order by Ms. Thibault. Roll was called, and a quorum was confirmed with the following
10 Supervisors present:

24 **Opening Remarks and Attendance Notes**

25 The Meeting was called to order. Establishing the quorum, Supervisors LaBarbera, Griffin, Cisternas, Wagner, and
26 Berdeguez were present in person.

27 **II. Audience Comments – Agenda Items (limited to 3 minutes per individual)**

28 Mr. Saffer introduced himself and provided his address (3875 Round Table Court) to the Board. He raised three
29 concerns. First, the white PVC fencing on Buckinghamshire is moldy and dirty. Mr. Saffer stated he went to an HOA
30 meeting, but they were unclear as to whose responsibility the fencing is. He asked if something can be done to clean it
31 occasionally. Second, Mr. Saffer asked for guidance contacting someone to clean up the wall/strip in the middle of
32 Mentmore off of 54. Third, the resident suggested putting a clock in the tower at Sunlake and Mentmore. The Board
33 informed him that a clock used to be there, to which he replied that he hadn’t seen it. Chairwoman LaBarbera commented
34 that anything is up for discussion, they’d just have to talk about what would go into making it functional and maintaining
35 it. Supervisor Berdeguez noted the clock was removed about six years ago because it stopped working. Supervisor
36 Wagner informed Mr. Saffer that the county takes care of the area coming off 54, occasionally. Supervisor Griffin
37 suggested reaching out to the County Commissioner. Mr. Woodcock agreed and recommended giving them a call if the
38 Public Works Department doesn’t get back to him. The confirmed area of PVC fencing he was referring to was
39 Buckinghamshire. Chairwoman LaBarbera noted to Mr. Looknanan that that area is homeowner fencing, something that
40 has been up in the air about who it belongs to. She noted that they had spoken about this before, and if the homeowner
41 doesn’t want to maintain the property, then the CDD would just remove it because they aren’t going to maintain it. She
42 also mentioned being open to discussing it but stated that her position would be to send them a letter requesting them to
43 respond in 30 days if they don’t want the fence, otherwise their silence will be taken as acceptance. Supervisor Berdeguez
44 commented that he thought the HOA had said that if a resident wanted their fences cleaned, they would have to prove
45 that it’s on their property. Otherwise, if it’s CDD property, they [the Board] have the option of telling them. Chairwoman
46 LaBarbera commented that the HOA hadn’t communicated that to the Board. Supervisor Berdeguez explained that the
47 HOA is supposed to follow up with the homeowners to see if the fence is on their property, as it would be their

48 responsibility. He noted that a lot of owners said they couldn't get around to the other side of the fence. Chairwoman
49 LaBarbera agreed that it is inconvenient, stating that if the resident accepted and use the fence then they maintain the
50 fence, otherwise the CDD will remove it, and the resident can put a fence up on their property. Ms. Thibault asked Mr.
51 Magee what his thoughts were on that, to which he responded, if it's not on CDD property and is on private property, it
52 sounds more like an HOA/private homeowner issue. He expressed his agreement, noting that if the CDD is not going to
53 maintain the fence and the homeowner isn't either, then taking it down would probably be the way to go.

54 Supervisor Berdeguez discussed his earlier statements, reiterating that the HOA required a property survey to prove
55 who the property belonged to. Supervisor Cisternas commented that the information Supervisor Berdeguez shared was
56 outdated, noting that since she and Supervisor Wagner had been on the board, this topic had been discussed. She
57 commented that the HOA had confirmed they were going to start sending letters to residents about the fences, as they
58 had established that it is homeowner property, even though the homeowner didn't put up the fence and might not consider
59 it theirs. Supervisor Cisternas also reported that the property manager has started to send out letters but has run into an
60 issue determining which addresses own the dirty fences when she is driving around to check, making it difficult to know
61 who to send the letters to. She urged anyone who knows which addresses have dirty fences to share that information so
62 the property manager can send the letters out. Supervisor Griffin suggested counting the houses on the other side.
63 Chairwoman LaBarbera recommended pulling up maps and pin dropping the location. Supervisor Cisternas shared some
64 of the limits on the role of the property manager, noting that the property manager is not allowed to get out of her car,
65 and per the HOA, everything has to be documented from her vehicle. The Board discussed the date of the last HOA
66 meeting, with Mr. Looknanan noting it was the Tuesday earlier that week, and the HOA president was in attendance.

67 Supervisor Cisternas reported that the property manager had shared a product called Spray and Forget It, which had
68 been recommended by Supervisor Cisternas, to the residents in their newsletter. She went on to explain that the product
69 would work as a do-it-yourself option for residents, as they would just have to spray it on their fences and let the rain
70 wash away the green gunk. It was noted that it would work best in the rainy season. Supervisor Cisternas shared that
71 nothing came of the recommendation. She noted that even though it's not a CDD issue to maintain the fences, as a
72 homeowner she feels it is distasteful to be driving or walking down Mentmore or Buckinghamshire and be able to see
73 people's backyards and their trampolines, playgrounds and various yard items. Chairwoman LaBarbera commented that
74 if she had a fence for 15 years and then one day it was removed, she would feel largely motivated to get a fence again.
75 She stated she was in favor of removing the fence versus having the moldy fence and having to maintain it because that
76 sets a precedent. Supervisor Cisternas claimed she, as a homeowner, would rather keep the fence and deal with the
77 occasional inconvenience of cleaning it. The Board and Chairwoman LaBarbera expressed their agreement, also noting
78 that thus far the residents have not been thinking that way. Chairwoman LaBarbera reiterated her position, stating that
79 residents can keep their fences if they are going to maintain them, but if they are not and have not acknowledged that
80 they don't want the fence, the CDD should remove the fence. Supervisor Cisternas indicated that would be hurting the
81 other homeowners, to which Chairwoman LaBarbera countered by stating the fence is still dirty and ugly, making it
82 distasteful either way. The Board and Mr. Magee agreed that the fence would be an HOA issue and recommended taking
83 it to the HOA to Mr. Saffer.

84

85 **III. Professional Vendor Presentations**

86 **A. Presentation & Discussion of Solitude Lake Report – Kyle Wilson**

87 Mr. Wilson presented the Solitude Lake Report, noting this month they did ponds T9 through T13, L1 through L13,
88 and E1 and E2. He noted that most of the sites look good and that some are going almost completely dry. He confirmed
89 that they are going to treat those sites with a pre-emergent, so any future growth shouldn't be too bad, and that they'll
90 maintain it so it remains looking nice. Mr. Wilson confirmed that he had spoken with Mr. Looknanan about the trash
91 around the ponds they were concerned with, and expressed his own concern for W25, assuring the Board that he is going
92 to have a guy come out tomorrow and pick up as much trash as he can from around the ponds. He noted the banks root

93 systems are drying out so they might see some erosion once the rainy season hits, and suggested the Board be proactive
94 and start thinking about the possible erosion expenses in the next couple of months. Mr. Wilson advised that homeowners
95 overwatering their lawns won't help the situation. He informed the Board that he had asked his guys to let him know the
96 pond number of any of the ponds that have a lot of saturated water, so that he can bring it to their attention and keep track
97 of which ponds have received a lot of sprinkler water. He also noted that the ponds that have received a lot of sprinkler
98 water will be green while the others would remain brown. Chairwoman LaBarbera confirmed with Mr. Wilson that he
99 did check all of the ponds, to which he agreed and reported that they had addressed all 108 ponds and 39 wetlands.
100 Supervisor Cisternas asked about people using the dryer ponds for e-bikes and motocross. Mr. Wilson responded that
101 there is nothing they can do about it, but people ramping off the sides of the banks won't help their erosion situation
102 either. Though he, or his guys, don't have the authority to tell anyone to leave, Mr. Wilson did confirm that they could
103 notify the Board. He reported that W25 was one of the areas people were using like a NASCAR track. Chairwoman
104 LaBarbera asked if he could notify their staff, to which Mr. Wilson asked if she wanted him to secretly snap a picture.
105 Chairwoman LaBarbera confirmed that would be extremely helpful and would aid the Board in sending out cease-and-
106 desist letters and holding the community accountable.

107 **B. Steadfast Environmental Services – Jason Aleman**

108 **1. Irrigation Maintenance Report**

109 Mr. Aleman presented the Steadfast Irrigation report. He informed the Board that January 5th is when they started
110 shutting off all of the working irrigation, to get ahead of the freeze. He stated he tripped the breaker about a week ago to
111 make sure everything was working again before turning it back off. February 3rd is when the initial irrigation inspection,
112 including the mapping and breaking down per zone was started. Supervisor Griffin noted the report states they [the
113 maintenance team] do sprinkler repairs, leading to his question, what can they [the maintenance team] repair versus
114 what she [Yovani] is repairing. Mr. Aleman responded, informing Supervisor Griffin that they have identified the roles,
115 noting that Mr. Looknanan takes care of e-bikes, kids playing, etc., wire tracking, valves, clocks, the more in-depth
116 knowledge of the irrigation will probably fall back onto Steadfast. Mr. Aleman confirmed that when she [Yovani] gets
117 back, they are going to have a meeting regarding what they have identified as repairs and which responsible party will
118 handle. Supervisor Griffin also raised a rhetorical question, asking what RedTree did, versus what was found. He stated
119 if they were to look at everything they did with RedTree, the assumption was a lot of it was already taken care of, but
120 now they're almost back to where they were before they started. He asked if there was anything they could do, or if this
121 is a financial battle not worth taking, because the Board spent so much money (\$50,000) with RedTree and does not feel
122 they have seen results. Mr. Aleman noted the apparent lack of results might be because there are a lot of areas and trees,
123 that are mature. He advised that Yovani could answer the question a lot better than he could, but maybe some areas could
124 be eliminated. Supervisor Griffin and Chairwoman LaBarbera reminded the Board that they had spent a lot of money on
125 Dunstable Drive, the clubhouse area, and were not satisfied with the results. Chairwoman LaBarbera also reminded the
126 Board that a significant amount of money had been spent in attempts to make the arrangement work. She noted that once
127 RedTree was informed that the contract had expired, they were no longer authorized to return to the property to perform
128 irrigation work. However, they were back on the property doing irrigation work after the contract ended, so the concern
129 over money spent remained. Chairwoman LaBarbera complimented the detail in the report, and Supervisor Wagner
130 questioned if Mr. Looknanan could compare the reports to see what was done and what wasn't. Supervisor Wagner
131 advised not to move forward with legal until they can have staff check the tasks. He suggested they try and do the tick
132 and tie entirely regarding invoices before asking the question from a legal standpoint. Mr. Magee agreed, if the money
133 has already been paid out, getting it back would be difficult and would require extremely thorough documentation that
134 the work was not done to specs. They would need to know what was and wasn't done before making any kind of
135 assumptions. When asked, Mr. Looknanan shared his opinion that they would just be wasting their time. He countered
136 by mentioning that RedTree provided a report after the fact that identified the same issues that were found. He advised
137 that they didn't need Steadfast' report and could rely on RedTree's report, which included the information, to figure out
138 what was and was not fixed. Chairwoman LaBarbera reminded the Board that RedTree claimed Yellowstone didn't so
139 something that they did. Supervisor Berdeguez noted that the other irrigation specialist had provided them with a map,

140 where they can see what was spent, and where. Ms. Thibault informed the Board that \$15,000 was spent in one area,
141 with \$21,000 or \$23,000 spent on the conduit line. Mr. Looknanan suggested they use RedTree's last report and the new
142 one to compare it to what they said needed to be fixed. He confirmed that he'll take on this task. Supervisor Griffin
143 suggested getting Yovani involved. Ms. Thibault explained the plan to Mr. Magee, noting that they plan to use RedTree's
144 own report against RedTree. Mr. Magee noted he would be happy to loop in the Kutak Rock litigators once everything
145 is identified and determine the cost benefit.

146 Supervisor Berdeguez asked if any of the water was turned back on, to which Mr. Aleman responded, informing him
147 that a lot of it is on and the report details which ones were on, that the first clock has 13 valves, that 6 were working, and
148 if the other 7 aren't, an explanation as to why. Mr. Looknanan informed Supervisor Berdeguez that aside from what
149 Steadfast does, they go and open it manually because it doesn't work. He confirmed that once a week they go and water
150 the grass, noting that turning on the pump to water the grass is why they saw the leak. He also confirmed that the pipe is
151 exposed and the ground was saturated. They turned off that pump and went to check it once he was informed it was still
152 leaking. Mr. Looknanan shared that some of the pipes are cross connected with shifting pumps. He explained that this
153 can happen when a repair was done a long time ago for a broken connected pipe break and then were connected to a
154 different pump. Mr. Looknanan informed the Board that Juan is buying parts to fix it tomorrow. Mr. Aleman discussed
155 the draught. He also presented Yovani's map, explaining that she mapped the property, so even someone with limited
156 irrigation knowledge can find the right route to go to. Chairwoman LaBarber asked for confirmation that the map was
157 the entire irrigation system, which Mr. Aleman confirmed, although it was noted that Yovani is still in the discovery
158 mapping phase.

159 Mr. Aleman informed the Board that they do similar reporting for maintenance, including a daily log anytime they
160 are there, which will help keep track of what the guys have done. He noted a small hiccup for a week or two, when the
161 other guys [RedTree] were still there. Mr. Aleman outlined the next week for the Board, stating that they are planning to
162 cut back the Brazilian Pepper and stay off cutting the grass area. He explained that if they were to hit hard and cut it, and
163 if the temperature dropped again, it would definitely affect the head of the root, likely killing it. He advised that their
164 best bet is to focus on the hard edge, soft edge, weed control, and moss. Mr. Aleman also noted that there is a
165 guardrail/handrail across the street that has vegetation coming through, confirming that he and his team have cut it back,
166 but it will take more than one visit. Supervisor Berdeguez clarified that they don't have any flowers, questioning whether
167 they were supposed to receive something in December, though it was also noted that this company was not with the
168 District at that time. Mr. Aleman advised they should be getting flowers in the spring, usually in March/April.

169 **2. Landscape Daily Logs**

170 Mr. Aleman reported the turf treatment details including, the blanket treatment throughout the property of fungicide,
171 micronutrients, and Bifin for insects. He confirmed they had started at the clubhouse, trimmed trees, and cleaned up the
172 dead branches everywhere, also worked on the walkway toward Publix. Mr. Aleman explained that they had broken up
173 the map into sections for detail and efficiency. He reported they do it in quarters, so by the fourth week when they are
174 back to week one, they don't get lost in the property. They always know what section they're supposed to be in. The
175 Board and Ms. Thibault commended Steadfast on their report, with emphasis on the map.

176 **C. Presentation of Team Deliverable Listing**

177 Ms. Thibault presented the new team deliverable listing, organized by responsibility. The list started with Mr.
178 Woodcock from Stantec, followed by Mr. Magee from Kutak Rock, on to Ms. Thibault from Haven Management
179 Solutions, and finally onto Mr. Looknanan for the district. Ideally, she stated, this would expedite the meetings and make
180 the standing of each project clearer to the Board.

181 Chairwoman LaBarbera asked if there was any way for them to have a shareable document where they would be
182 able to make edits or notes. She explained that she likes to see real-time updates and would like the ability to filter it, etc.
183 Mr. Woodcock confirmed he can attempt to create a document as a test. Mr. Magee recommended the Board members
184 have read-only access, as dropping notes could potentially lead to a Sunshine violation. Chairwoman LaBarbera clarified,

185 stating that she would like to be able to filter tasks as by completed or complete date or something similar. Ms. Thibault
186 confirmed they will check on a shareable document.

187 **D. Stantec – Project Manager Greg Woodcock**

188 **1. Discussion of Pond Bank Remediation**

189 Mr. Woodcock presented his summary of emergency repairs, noting that he took the list and deterred any item that
190 he thought would make it through the next rainy season without any incident. If it wouldn't make it through the rainy
191 season, his advice was to do it now or pay more later. He was able to get the list down to \$37,654 from ADS and received
192 a second proposal of \$39,200 from Finn Outdoor. Mr. Woodcock advised the Board to budget for next year's stormwater
193 repairs and confirmed that he'll try to provide an estimate at that time of what he thinks it should be. He assured the
194 Board that once these repairs are done, especially as they are using riprap, they should not have to come back to fix those
195 locations again. Mr. Woodcock recommended moving forward with the ADS proposal. He commented that if they do
196 these items, then he is almost certain that he can guarantee they are operating per the permit, as per O&M Certifications.

197 On a MOTION by Chairwoman LaBarbera, SECONDED by Supervisor Wagner, WITH ALL IN FAVOR, the Board
198 Approved the ADS Proposal of \$37,654 for the Concord Station Community Development District.

199 **3. Discussion of Arborist Report for Tree Replacement Project – Sunlake**

200 Mr. Woodcock presented the highlights of the arborist's report. Supervisor Griffin questioned which trees he was
201 about to discuss, to which Mr. Woodcock responded, with input from Mr. Looknanan, the 12 trees. According to the
202 report, the project was likely permitted under the land development code, meaning they would need a permit to remove
203 and replace. The permit submittal fee is \$1,800, non-refundable and it does not guarantee that the permit will be approved.
204 He continued, explaining that while the claim can be made to the county of possible future impact to the houses, Mark,
205 the Arborist, noted that generally the county would likely counter with root pruning the trees rather than removing them.
206 Mark the Arborist also noted to Mr. Woodcock that the owner has an obligation to maintain and protect their property.
207 The root pruning would be done on the homeowner's property, not the CDD's. Supervisor Cisternas mentioned an email
208 she has received regarding the resident, claiming the Board had said they would absorb this cost in the spirit of being a
209 good neighbor. She noted that she doesn't recall committing to that, rather that in the spirit of being a good neighbor,
210 they were going to look into it. Supervisor Cisternas advised the Board to come to the decision they do not want to absorb
211 this cost and craft the communication to the homeowner to inform them that they've looked into it and cannot absorb the
212 cost. Mr. Woodcock suggested adding that the arborist recommended root pruning. Supervisor Berdeguez mentioned a
213 specific spot that looked bad, to which Mr. Woodcock responded that he hadn't been there. Chairwoman LaBarbera
214 informed the Board that they do have a responsibility to remove trees once they are dead or showing rot, especially when
215 hurricane season comes around. She elaborated further, noting that if they had received confirmation of a dead tree or
216 knew about a dead tree and a hurricane or storm came and blew the trees onto someone's property, they would have been
217 negligent and would then be responsible for the damage. Ms. Thibault confirmed she had forwarded images and an email
218 from the resident, who was under the impression that the Board would absorb the costs regarding the trees encroaching
219 onto his property. Supervisor Berdeguez reinforced that the resident was still responsible for trimming the trees on the
220 inside of his property. Ms. Thibault sent him a letter with the UF/IFAS report stating if it's on your property, it's your
221 responsibility, and the Board has expended some dollars in hiring an arborist; the Board requested she send it again.

222 **E. Kutak Rock – District Counsel – Kyle Magee**

223 **1. Presentation for Discussion – Request for Proposal for Lake Management Services**

224 Mr. Magee presented his items, beginning with an initial draft of the project manual to potentially go to RFP for
225 aquatic maintenance services. He noted that it's a very comprehensive first draft, allowing for a deep dive into financials,
226 staffing, and comparable projects. Through the form, the Board could get a good idea of whether a bidder would be able
227 to handle the workload. He also included a draft scoring sheet, though he recommended not tweaking as it follows their

228 standard scoring, keeping in mind statutorily required categories. Mr. Magee noted the size of the contract is not expected
229 to trigger the statutory threshold that would require the district to seek formal RFP, advising that they can use this form
230 informally, meaning the bidders wouldn't have any protest rights in an informal RFP. He explained that the scope of
231 services included is based on the scope of services in their contract, noting that he would be happy to make any
232 adjustments or additions the Board may have. Ms. Thibault confirmed that this form needs to be out ASAP as their
233 Solitude contract is about to be up and they require a 30-day termination notice. Mr. Magee confirmed he can do that.
234 He advised the Board that he had included mandatory pre-bid meeting language in the project manual, explaining that
235 it's not something they typically do every time or something that is required, and it would require Mr. Looknanan and
236 the field staff to meet with vendors at a specific time prior to them submitting their bids. He noted that it can sometimes
237 be helpful during a complex project, so each bidder has an understanding of the scope of the project. He suggested to
238 Ms. Thibault and Mr. Looknanan that he could take that stipulation out if it is overkill, which might help get the final
239 form out in a month. Chairwoman LaBarbera informed Mr. Looknanan that they are doing RFP to check the pricing,
240 noting that they are looking to make sure they are getting a fair, marketable value for what they have. The Board members
241 agreed they do not have an issue with Solitude, they just want to see if the pricing is fair. Mr. Looknanan agreed to a pre-
242 bid meeting.

243 Ms. Thibault informed the Board that Mr. Looknanan received a proposal from Solitude today, but they can't accept
244 it once they are going through the RFP process. They'll have to get another proposal from them. Supervisor Berdeguez
245 shared his belief that they had already received a proposal, which Ms. Thibault confirmed but going out for RFP had to
246 change their proceedings. Chairwoman LaBarbera reminded the Board that they were going to lower their proposal by
247 around \$5,000 but also get rid of a report, which the Board did not agree with. They had also included a termination
248 disclosure clause, where the Board would need to buy out the rest of the contract, which the Board also did not agree to.
249 Chairwoman LaBarbera noted the contract states they increase 3% every year, but that might change now that they are
250 going out for RFP. Ms. Thibault informed Mr. Magee that, when confronted by her other districts, Solitude agreed to take
251 the buy-out clause out of their contract. She noted they are holding true to it now, and asked Mr. Magee what his
252 experience with his other [Kutak Rock] attorneys was. He reported not having seen this in any of his districts.
253 Chairwoman LaBarbera suggested letting their contract with Solitude auto-renew, as, hypothetically, it should just auto-
254 renew at 3% and they wouldn't be bound to the termination clause. Ms. Thibault countered, noting that the clause is
255 under the current. Chairwoman LaBarbera continued, suggesting they would not have to abide by that clause if they don't
256 sign a new contract, until Ms. Thibault informed her that it is in their current contract as well. The Board discussed the
257 March date that their contract with Solitude is set to expire. Supervisor Cisternas advised it was March 31st, which Mr.
258 Magee confirmed. The 30-day termination clause means the Board would have to give Solitude notice on/by March 1st.
259 Ms. Thibault asked if they could issue a termination notice and then rehire, which was not a favorable suggestion.
260 Chairwoman LaBarbera questioned if they could ask Solitude, in good faith, to allow them to hear other bids and forego
261 the 30-day termination or allow an extension on the contract for 30 days at the same price they have. Mr. Magee noted
262 that it's worth raising the question. Chairwoman LaBarbera noted that Solitude probably wants their business as they had
263 already submitted a proposal before RFP and said they wanted to keep them happy. Supervisor Wagner and Chairwoman
264 LaBarbera agreed that they should express to Solitude that they are only trying to make sure they're getting a fair market
265 price, something they assumed Solitude would respect. Ms. Thibault confirmed that she can organize a call with them to
266 ask for an extension on the additional 30 days in their contract. Supervisor Wagner questioned what would happen if they
267 just wanted to renew for one year. Ms. Thibault advised that Solitude submitted a proposal in advance of the RFP issuance
268 and inquired whether the proposal may be opened to review its contents and assess their position since there is no motion
269 to finalize RFP yet. Mr. Magee noted if the Board wanted to auto-renew for one year, the document is basically done,
270 meaning they could do it next year to check the prices. The Solitude proposal was \$94,074, with monthly invoices of
271 \$7,839. Ms. Thibault emphasized to the Board that this proposal is below their budget of \$120,000. Supervisor Griffin
272 suggested they check the clause of the contract, and Chairwoman LaBarbera agreed, noting that they need to make sure
273 the work price clears out and they would be getting the same amount of time and scope of services. It was pointed out
274 that the proposal from solitude does not include the reports, as they took them out, which was noted as a possible price
275 inflator. The report stated customers will be provided with a GoForms report detailing 19 sites a month, including a

276 picture and description of each site. The description would note any recent treatments, relative observations, and any
277 deficiencies. Supervisor Griffin asked the Board how they would feel about clarifying the issues with the reports and the
278 clause. Ms. Thibault found the termination clause, which did not contain an extra buy-out clause. Supervisor Griffin
279 agreed with Supervisor Wagner's idea of renewing the contract for one year.

280 Supervisor Wagner questioned how they would go about getting out of their current contract, not renewing it, and
281 entering the proposed contract they had sent. Chairwoman LaBarbera countered, explaining that they haven't gone to
282 RFP yet. Mr. Magee informed the Board they have several options, one of which is adding an amendment to the current
283 agreement, which was his recommendation. Ms. Thibault checked to make sure Solitude would come out the same
284 number of times a month, which she confirmed to be the case. Supervisor Griffin asked for confirmation that Mr. Magee
285 is going to look at the new contract, which Ms. Thibault provided. Supervisor Berdeguez suggested calling Solitude and
286 asking what the changes between the contracts were, which Chairwoman LaBarbera countered by asking if he thought
287 they'd be honest. Ms. Thibault advised a page-by-page comparison. Supervisor Wagner agreed with the page-by-page
288 comparison before listing the potential next steps. First, he noted, the Board could do the amendment based on the
289 analysis of where there is a cheaper option, or they could auto-renew for another year if there are things missing that they
290 want. Or, as a third option, the Board could still consider RFP. Ms. Thibault expressed worry about time if they were to
291 continue with RFP. Mr. Magee asked Ms. Thibault what she was referring to regarding the buyout clause. She responded,
292 stating that it wasn't really a buyout, and it's not in the termination clause but was buried somewhere else. Mr. Looknanan
293 mentioned the buyout clause was not in the proposed 2024 contract. Ms. Thibault confirmed the buyout clause was in
294 the 2025 contract when they organized the three contracts. Mr. Magee reported not seeing anything about the buyout
295 clause in the 2024 contract, but Ms. Thibault reiterated it wasn't called a buyout, and the clause was hidden in the
296 document. Supervisor Cisternas agreed with Mr. Magee, stating the buyout clause was not in their 2024 contract, but was
297 added when the Board asked them to do anything financially better in the off-cycle proposal.

298 Supervisor Berdeguez noted the buyout clause appeared when they had three contracts they had narrowed down to
299 one and Ms. Thibault confirmed that to be true. Supervisor Wagner reiterated the Board's options, finding the worst-case
300 scenario to be auto-renewing. Supervisor Griffin posed a hypothetical, asking if they will have enough time to fix the
301 language on the contract if they get to the meeting on March 12th and don't like the verbiage. Supervisor Cisternas
302 suggested two alternative ideas, one, Mr. Magee will come back with a contract for the March meeting that they 100%
303 agree with, or the contract contains language they don't want, they make the amendment and approve it before presenting
304 it to Solitude. Supervisor Griffin reiterated his question, if they are that close to the 12th, and Solitude does not agree with
305 the language, what do they do? Chairwoman LaBarbera noted the only thing the Board and Solitude would have to agree
306 on is the new price. She suggested they have Mr. Magee look at and compare the contracts so they can present prior to
307 the meeting. She recommended asking Mr. Magee to have it done by next Friday, allowing three weeks for negotiations.
308 In the case of a standstill at the next meeting, the Board would at least know where they stand. Supervisor Berdeguez
309 reminded the Chair that they needed to decide by March 1st, to which she suggested Ms. Thibault communicate between
310 the Board and Solitude. Chairwoman LaBarbera asked if they would have enough time to gather proposals if Solitude
311 won't accept the contract without certain verbiage. Mr. Magee confirmed that they would not have time to start RFP at
312 the next meeting if they decide to walk away from Solitude. Supervisor Cisternas questioned if the Board could accept
313 the proposal to auto-renew under the new price, as he did not find the buyout language in the contract. Mr. Magee
314 confirmed that they could move in that direction, recommending that the Board just add an amendment to the current
315 agreement, changing the scope and the price. Chairwoman LaBarbera asked if Ms. Thibault could reach out to them
316 quickly, but Ms. Thibault explained Solitude does not give out their phone numbers, they would have to call another
317 number and wait for someone to call back. Supervisor Griffin shared his confidence that Solitude would decide not to go
318 with their amendment.

319 Ms. Thibault found the buyout clause and sent it to Mr. Magee. She confirmed the new document does not have that
320 clause.

321 On a MOTION by Supervisor Griffin, SECONDED by Supervisor Cisternas, WITH ALL IN FAVOR, the Board Agreed
322 to Make an Amendment to the Agreement to Match the New Numbers, Remove the Clause, and Issue the Agreement to
323 Solitude as Soon as Possible for the Concord Station Community Development District.

324 Mr. Magee agreed to get it done ASAP.

325 **2. Updated Status (if any):**

326 **RedTree Map Invoice:** Patrick O'Brien, one of the litigators at Kutak Rock sent communication to RedTree,
327 informing them that the district did not approve that map, and they are disputing the payment. Mr. Magee noted they had
328 not heard back from them, and until they do his assumption is that they are letting it go.

329 **USA Fence:** USA Fence had threatened to come and take the installed fence. Mr. O'Brien sent a letter to them as
330 well, letting them know they can't place a lien on a government entity. They also notified them that if they were to come
331 and take down the fence the district had installed and paid for, that would be considered trespassing and theft. Mr. Magee
332 confirmed they hadn't heard anything from them either.

333 **HOA Tot Lot Transfer:** Mr. Magee had reached out to the HOA's attorney, and he was able to confirm that the
334 HOA would pay for the engineering and legal fees, the title search, and everything regarding the transaction. Mr. Magee
335 confirmed that the HOA agreed to cover the legal fees for themselves and the CDD.

336 On a MOTION by Chairwoman LaBarbera, SECONDED by Supervisor Cisternas, WITH ALL IN FAVOR, the Board
337 Agreed to Have Mr. Magee Send a Letter of Understanding to the HOA for the Concord Station Community Development
338 District.

339 Mr. Magee reported he did look into whether the district is responsible for the streetlights and found that the district
340 is responsible for the lights.

341 **F. District Manager (8:04pm)**

342 **1. Discussion of Suncoast Pool Certificate of Insurance**

343 Ms. Thibault reported they have not been able to acquire a new certificate of insurance for them, though she has
344 reached out numerous times by various means. She noted that Mr. Looknanan was a part of the communication in an
345 effort to make the process easier for the vendor, that did not work. Though the vendor has the old certificate of insurance,
346 Ms. Thibault advised that it does not align with the contract dates because of the new contract. She noted that she has
347 explained that numerous times, and even received responses, but that is it. Mr. Looknanan confirmed he shows up to do
348 the pool work. Supervisor Griffin questioned if there was a particular coverage he might not have, if he might be afraid
349 to have to show it. Ms. Thibault could not confirm, instead noting the danger lies in the general liability. Supervisor
350 Griffin asked if he has other districts, to which Mr. Looknanan replied that he used to be bigger. Ms. Thibault estimated
351 the liability insurance would be about \$4,000-\$5,000 a year. The Board hypothesized he might not want to spend the
352 money since he has so few jobs. They agreed to have Mr. Magee send him a letter. Ms. Thibault noted he is late on the
353 invoices as well.

354 **2. Presentation & Consideration for Adoption Resolution 2026-10, Adopting Exhibit 6 A Budget amendment**
355 **for FY 2025/2026 & Discussion of Vision Project Listing**

356 Ms. Thibault presented the resolution, informing the Board that they can bring \$200,000 into the current fiscal year.
357 She spoke with Mr. Looknanan to confirm the projects listed on the vision project list, which was the interior painting,
358 exterior painting, splash pad painting, pool plaster repair, tennis court lights, pool deck furniture, clubhouse furniture,
359 basketball fence, volleyball court benches, signposts around the district, and the pergola at Tuckerton. She noted Mr.
360 Looknanan expressed confidence that as long as the amenity team can do it, the \$200,000 should cover the list. Ms.
361 Thibault reviewed the unassigned fund balance with the Board, unaudited, informing them they would have \$331,100,

362 which is their two-month operating reserves. She also reported that their unassigned would remain at \$287,000, meaning
363 it would remain available to the Board to be spent as they deem necessary. The \$200,000 would then be moved into their
364 budget for Mr. Lookninan and his team to accomplish the vision projects.

365 Supervisor Cisternas noted that she didn't see the lights for the playground or the two Tuckerton field benches on
366 the approved list. She commented that the benches were approved already, citing emails with estimates to Mr. Lookninan.
367 She asked if the items would fit within the \$200,000 budget if they are added to the list. She also advocated that those
368 items should have been on the list all along. Ms. Thibault speculated that the lighting projects would likely be the most
369 expensive, so they will investigate the cost. Ms. Thibault asked about the type of lighting Supervisor Cisternas was
370 proposing, which she confirmed to be solar lights. Mr. Lookninan confirmed that these items were approved on the list
371 for the last year's proposal. Supervisor Cisternas suggested solar lights on a timer, that remain motion activated to be
372 able to catch people jumping the fence at night. Chairwoman LaBarbera expressed her concerns over a motion activated
373 light, noting the kids who play basketball at night will flag it so they can keep playing. She also reported to the Board
374 that the HOA deputy will let kids play on the playground after the clubhouse has closed. Supervisor Cisternas reiterated
375 an earlier conversation, finding that the Board had decided on motion solar lights because there are times of the year
376 when it gets dark before the clubhouse closes, but that does not mean people can use the amenities after hours.
377 Chairwoman LaBarbera stressed the importance of having someone to enforce the rules and hours set for the amenities,
378 because the police patrols are not doing anything about it. Supervisor Cisternas noted that with the lights installed they
379 will be able to see the people who are out after hours and collect evidence against them. She shared a moment from the
380 other day where she could not identify the people who were out after hours. Supervisor Wagner shared a recommendation
381 from ECS to install a motion light that goes above the camera, so when there's motion, it will help the camera catch it.

382 Supervisor Griffin questioned the \$41,760 amended for law enforcement, wondering why there is so much allocated
383 for that. Ms. Thibault and Supervisor Wagner informed him that amount is always there, in case the Board wanted to hire
384 security for certain events. Ms. Thibault confirmed that she'll have Mr. Lookninan work with ECS to look at the lights
385 for the playground and the basketball court and figure out the benches for the Tuckerton field.

386 Supervisor Wagner opened discussion about the unassigned line of fund balance over the last three years. He reported
387 it went from \$833,000 down to \$487,000, down to \$287,000, noting that they are more limited in what they can do for
388 the community now. Supervisor Griffin advocated for an open discussion so any community members who aren't
389 budgeters would be able to understand it better. Ms. Thibault commented, informing the Board that they are contributing
390 \$50,000 a year to the reserve study, but at this time, the reserve study is underfunded. She also noted that the Board is in
391 a position to pay as they go versus pulling from the reserve study, meaning they might be overfunded in some cases. Ms.
392 Thibault assured she could get another reserve study based on where they're funded now, or she could make a sheet in
393 Excel, documenting where they are and where they are underfunded. She informed the Board that if they pull the
394 \$287,000, they'll have about \$150,000 in different account lines like miscellaneous contingency. She noted before the
395 \$200,000 they had \$250,000, and they had another \$150,000 for pond erosion and other projects. Ms. Thibault confirmed
396 that these funds are available to the Board because they have not been expending those amounts. At this time, the only
397 project to be expended was Mr. Woodcock's \$32,000 that was brought forward earlier. Supervisor Wagner used the
398 \$41,000 as an example, noting that they're only really talking about the operating fund for the year, which is listed at
399 \$1.7 million. He noted it will be very important for them to feed the \$287,000 this year or put it towards other unaccounted
400 for items. Supervisor Wagner reiterated that their opportunities are lessening unless they start pulling from the reserves.
401 Ms. Thibault provided the Board with another option, informing them that they could assign a certain amount every year
402 for capital projects and stick to that. The funds would be invested in a money market account. Supervisor Griffin
403 expressed his concern at the thought of being back in an unstable budget. Supervisor Cisternas expressed doubt about
404 acquiring the new furniture, questioning if it needs to be done now. Supervisor Griffin stated he would like to see it.
405 Chairwoman LaBarbera agreed the furniture does not need to be done immediately, especially because the couches are
406 very popular. Supervisor Cisternas suggested a good cleaning rather than replacing the furniture. Supervisor Griffin
407 expressed his concern for the residents, noting that people freak out when their payment increases. The Board had
408 discussed raising prices by 1% or 2%, but after doing the math, it just wouldn't be worth it. Supervisor Wagner agreed

409 with Supervisor Griffin but noted that there is an inevitability to these conversations. Mr. Looknanan stated the re-
410 strapping could be written off as they are stained but not damaged.

411 Ms. Thibault requested the Board set up a new budget line, titled Vision 2026 Projects, so the \$200,000 can be
412 isolated and tracked more efficiently. She noted they would be able to track the spending and savings if the budget
413 remains isolated. Supervisor Wagner agreed as long as they can track it by the line.

414 On a MOTION by Supervisor Cisternas, SECONDED by Chairwoman LaBarbera, WITH ALL IN FAVOR, the Board
415 Adopted the Resolution 2026-10, Adopting the Budget Amendment for the FY2025-2026 Budget for the Concord Station
416 Community Development District.

417 **G. Clubhouse & Amenity Manager**

418 Mr. Looknanan noted they only had two lights out and they needed ballasts. The ballasts should arrive tomorrow.
419 He noted they changed the lights in the restroom, fixed the faucet, did the hinges on the doors throughout the clubhouse,
420 tightened the toilet seats, replaced the hydraulic doors that were slamming, ordered the hydraulic gate closure for the
421 pool, which arrived today, worked on the volleyball benches, replacing all the wood on the benches, and oiled the swing
422 sets on the playground. Mr. Looknanan noted they're going to continue working on the irrigation and painting jobs.

423 Mr. Looknanan explained he would like to order three new TVs for the gym. Two of them crashed and needed to be
424 replaced so he bought three so they would match. He had been looking at Best Buy, but the Board suggested looking at
425 the Walmart no-brand TVs instead (ONN) as they are usually less than \$100. Chairwoman LaBarbera noted Vizio TVs
426 were on sale for \$78 at Walmart.

427 On a MOTION by Supervisor Wagner, SECONDED by Supervisor Cisternas, WITH ALL IN FAVOR, the Board
428 Approved Three TVs Not to Exceed \$400 for the Concord Station Community Development District.

429 **1. Presentation & Consideration of Final Version of Employment Policy Handbook**

430 Mr. Looknanan included the red-line version provided by the employee lawyer in the manual.

431 On a MOTION by Supervisor Cisternas, SECONDED by Supervisor Griffin, WITH ALL IN FAVOR, the Board
432 Accepted the Final Version of the Employment Policy Handbook for the Concord Station Community Development
433 District.

434 **Business Expo & Spring Event – March 28th**

435 The Business Expo event on February 6th was not as successful as the first, with only three resident vendors showing
436 up. He noted that it may have been due to Superbowl weekend. He noted to the Board that they were thinking about
437 setting up the tables for the business expo during the spring event. Supervisor Wagner expressed concern over people
438 being out of town for spring break during the Business Expo. Supervisor Cisternas countered that they would not be able
439 to change the date as they already have vendors scheduled and the following weekend is Easter so it's unlikely they'll
440 find a completely free weekend. She raised concerns over where the vendors for the March expo would be placed during
441 the spring event. Mr. Looknanan suggested putting them outside with umbrellas, and those who need shade for their
442 products could be placed indoors. He reported the only things going on inside will be the Easter Bunny in one corner,
443 face painting in another, and the balloon twister could be outside. The food will also be outside.

444 Mr. Looknanan requested a level of authority to make decisions involving approved events. He requested the district
445 hold four events a year, one in spring, one in summer, one in fall, and one in winter/December. He would like to be given
446 an amount not to exceed once they agree on an event, giving him some authority to tell vendors yes or no. He assured
447 the Board he would be responsible with the funds and not go overboard. Supervisor Cisternas stated she thought they
448 had talked about a dollar amount, \$10,000 being the number she thought of. She noted remembering speaking to
449 Supervisor Wagner about not being limited to four events a year because the budget shifts at the end of the year, allowing

450 more leeway. Ms. Thibault stated the budgeted amount is \$25,000, and they've spent about \$1,500 so far, though they
451 haven't received all the billing yet. Chairwoman LaBarbera estimated there is at least \$21,000 left in the event budget
452 and expressed her support for allowing Mr. Looknanan more authority. Supervisor Cisternas reminded the Board that
453 that dollar amount needs to cover the big four events, the senior social, the adult social, the family night, and other events.
454 The Board discussed setting a limit, for example spending less than \$3,000 and bringing the excess to the Board. Mr.
455 Looknanan raised his concerns, questioning who he would ask in the moment if he needed more money. Chairwoman
456 LaBarbera suggested bringing the excess to the next meeting, which Mr. Looknanan claimed would work, as vendors
457 usually ask for 50% up front, giving him time to get approval from the Board if needed. Supervisor Cisternas raised
458 concerns over the possibility of over-committing funds before having the Board's approval. She believed Mr. Looknanan
459 doesn't need a limit and should be able to spend as he sees appropriate. If a situation were to arise where he over-
460 committed or went a little overboard, the Board could correct that then. Chairwoman LaBarbera agreed that Mr.
461 Looknanan should have the authority to spend. The Board expressed their trust in Mr. Looknanan.

462 **Issues With the Children at the Playground and Basketball and Tennis Courts**

463 Mr. Looknanan reported they are hoping to gain control in the next week. ECS ordered cameras and the first thing
464 they plan to do is drop the three new poles for the new cameras, upgrade the clubhouse cameras, start the outdoor cameras,
465 and then restore access to the three different areas. Supervisor Griffin enquired why the access took so long to get fixed,
466 to which Mr. Looknanan responded, they were delayed until the cameras arrived. He noted they are getting 24 cameras.
467 Supervisor Cisternas questioned if there was any way to establish a do not exceed for the \$200,000 set aside for 2026.
468 She questioned whether they could put aside a certain amount so that for every camera installed, a light is installed right
469 above it. The cameras are/have night vision and are motion detected. The Board noted it will be easier to track down
470 trespassers with the new cameras. Supervisor Wagner asked Ms. Thibault if any of her other districts have their
471 playgrounds locked like they do. She replied yes, they all have access control, and they all have the same issue. The
472 Board suggested stronger magnets to keep the access points from being opened as easily. ECS gave Mr. Looknanan an
473 estimate of \$4,066. Chairwoman LaBarbera reported that every time they replace a lock, it costs about \$2,000-\$3,000.

474 Mr. Looknanan reported the security cameras will arrive in the middle of next week for installation, the fountain
475 pumps are all working, and he fixed the light in Waterford but still needs to change the other. The biggest resident concern
476 he gets is tree branches encroaching into homeowner property. Ms. Thibault confirmed she can send Mr. Looknanan a
477 pamphlet. Supervisor Cisternas asked the Board what happens when the branches are from the Conservation.
478 Chairwoman LaBarbera informed her that she can trim straight up from the property line but cannot trim into the
479 conservation.

480 Mr. Looknanan raised a question to the Board. He explained a complaint he received from a resident on Drexel
481 whose neighbors planted a tree on CDD property, outside the line. The base of the tree hasn't grown yet. Mr. Looknanan
482 stated that the resident calls him every day, asking what they're going to do about it. He confirmed that he called the
483 HOA manager, and she spoke to them. The homeowner moved the tree into their yard, but the resident continues to
484 complain that when the tree grows, he won't be able to see the lake. Supervisor Cisternas asked if the tree is in a proper
485 spot in the yard, behind the 6-foot fence or if it's where the fence slopes. Mr. Looknanan informed her that they don't
486 have a fence, but the neighbors do. Supervisor Cisternas asked if the tree is planted where the 6-foot fence is, or where
487 the 4-foot fence is. She stressed that there can't be anything taller than 4 feet by the 4-foot section of the fence, which
488 she knows from winning her own battle with the HOA. She suggested he send the resident to the HOA, and that there is
489 nothing else he can do.

490 **2. Consideration of Proposals:**

491 **Grout Rhino: Clean Tile & Grout - \$1,332.90 or Grout Rhino: Clean Tile & Grout & Color Seal - \$2,517.70**

492 Mr. Looknanan confirmed they would have to get the color seal again.

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On a MOTION by Chairwoman LaBarbera, SECONDED by Supervisor Cisternas, WITH ALL IN FAVOR, the Board Approved the Grout Rhino Proposal for Clean Tile, Grout, and Color Seal for \$2,517.70 for the Concord Station Community Development District.

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Chairwoman LaBarbera noted she did not have a chance to review the minutes. Supervisor Berdeguez noted line 118, the spelling of Steve Valencic was incorrect. Tabled for the next meeting.

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C. Presentation for Ratification – Steadfast Environmental Services for Landscape Maintenance Services Contract

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On a MOTION by Supervisor Cisternas, SECONDED by Supervisor Berdeguez, WITH ALL IN FAVOR, the Board Accepted the Ratification of the Steadfast Environmental Services for Landscape Maintenance Services Contract for the Concord Station Community Development District.

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D. Presentation for Ratification – Duke Energy Authority Release

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Duke Energy recalculated an error on their part that caused \$1.91 in several monthly billings.

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On a MOTION by Chairwoman LaBarbera, SECONDED by Supervisor Berdeguez, WITH ALL IN FAVOR, the Board Accepted the Ratification of the Duke Energy Authority Release for the Concord Station Community Development District.

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E. Audience Comments – New Business – (limited to 3 minutes per individual)

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No audience members were present.

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2. Supervisor Request

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Chairwoman LaBarbera reported on the Steadfast negotiations, noting that Steadfast was happy to accommodate the labor rate they were requesting. Ms. Thibault covered the Thrive Hydration vehicle insurance liability, noting there was a lot of back and forth. Supervisor Cisternas brought up the event to spread awareness about electronic vehicles. Chairwoman LaBarbera reported the police are on board, and waiting for the Board to decide when they want to host an event. Supervisor Cisternas suggested focusing the event for the younger children, noting that she thought they would benefit the most from a safety event. Chairwoman LaBarbera informed Supervisor Cisternas that the police officers she had been speaking to, this time around, were more focused on safety than the last set of officers they spoke to. She reiterated that she is less worried about the safety of the kid on the bike and more worried about the pedestrians around them. The Board reiterated the importance of parents taking responsibility for their kids.

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**AGREEMENT BETWEEN CONCORD STATION COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT DISTRICT AND
SOLITUDE LAKE MANAGEMENT, LLC, FOR POND MAINTENANCE SERVICES**

THIS AGREEMENT (the “**Agreement**”) is made and entered into this ____ day of _____
2026 by and between:

CONCORD STATION COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT DISTRICT, a local unit of special-purpose government established pursuant to Chapter 190, *Florida Statutes*, and whose mailing address is 255 Primera Boulevard, Suite 160, Lake Mary, FL 32746 (“**District**”); and

SOLITUDE LAKE MANAGEMENT, LLC, a Virginia limited liability company, with an address of 1253 Jensen Drive, Suite 103, Virginia Beach, Virginia 23451 (the “**Contractor**,” together with District, the “**Parties**”).

RECITALS

WHEREAS, the District was established pursuant to Chapter 190, *Florida Statutes*, for the purpose of planning, financing, constructing, operating and/or maintaining certain infrastructure improvements, including but not limited to, stormwater management improvements; and

WHEREAS, the District currently owns, operates, and maintains stormwater management facilities within the boundary of the District as shown on **Exhibit A**, attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference (collectively referred to as the “**Ponds**”); and

WHEREAS, the District desires to retain an independent contractor to provide maintenance services for the Ponds, including inspection and treatment for control of nuisance vegetation in and around the Ponds; and

WHEREAS, the Contractor represents that it is capable, willing, and able to provide the pond maintenance services, and desires to contract with the District to do so in accordance with the terms of this Agreement; and

WHEREAS, the District and Contractor warrant and agree that they have all right, power, and authority to enter into and be bound by this Agreement.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the recitals, agreements, and mutual covenants contained herein, and other good and valuable consideration, the receipt and sufficiency of which are hereby acknowledged by the parties, the parties agree as follows:

SECTION 1. RECITALS. The recitals so stated are true and correct and by this reference are incorporated into and form a material part of this Agreement.

SECTION 2. DESCRIPTION OF WORK AND SERVICES.

- A. The Contractor agrees to provide the labor, materials, and services necessary for the provision of the pond maintenance services described in the attached **Exhibit A**, which is incorporated herein by reference (the “**Services**”). **Exhibit A** is attached solely for the purpose of clarifying the scope of Services to be provided to the District; to the extent any of the provisions of this Agreement are in conflict with the provisions of Exhibit A, this Agreement controls.

- B. Contractor shall be solely responsible for the means, manner, and methods by which its duties, obligations and responsibilities are met to the satisfaction of the District and in accordance with this Agreement. Contractor shall use industry best practices and procedures when carrying out the Services. Any additional compensation for additional services shall be paid only as negotiated between the parties and upon the written authorization of the District.

- C. This Agreement grants to Contractor the right to enter the lands that are subject to this Agreement, for those purposes described in this Agreement, and Contractor hereby agrees to comply with all applicable laws, rules, ordinances and regulations affecting the provision of the Services.

- D. The Contractor shall report directly to the District’s Designee who shall be the Community Manager. The District may change its designee by providing notice to the Contractor. Contractor shall use all due care to protect the property of the District, its residents and landowners from damage and shall follow and be responsible for the provision of the Services. Contractor agrees to repair any damage resulting from Contractor’s activities and work within twenty-four (24) hours.

SECTION 3. COMPENSATION; TERM.

- A. As compensation for the completion of the Services, the District agrees to pay the Contractor **Seven Thousand Eight Hundred Thirty Nine Dollars and Fifty-Five Cents (\$7,839.55) per month for a not-to-exceed annual total of Ninety Four Thousand Seventy Four Dollars and Sixty Cents (\$94,074.60)**, which amount includes all labor, materials and services necessary to complete the Services, as more specifically set forth in **Exhibit A**. Compensation for renewal periods after the initial term shall be as set forth in section 3.B.

- B. The initial term of this Agreement shall be from April 1, 2026 through March 31, 2027, unless terminated earlier by either party in accordance with the provisions of this Agreement. Any change in compensation or the scope of services must be approved in writing by the parties.

- C. If the District should desire additional work or services, the Contractor agrees to negotiate in good faith to undertake such additional work or services. Upon successful negotiations, the parties shall agree in writing to a work order, addendum, addenda, or change order to this Agreement.

- D. The District may require, as a condition precedent to making any payment to the Contractor that all material men, suppliers or laborers be paid and require evidence, in the form of Lien Releases or partial Waivers of Lien, to be submitted to the District by those subcontractors, material men, suppliers or laborers, and further require that the Contractor provide an Affidavit relating to the payment of said indebtedness. Further, the District shall have the right to require, as a condition precedent to making any payment, evidence from the Contractor, in a form satisfactory to the District, that any indebtedness of the Contractor, as to services to the District, has been paid and that the Contractor has met all of the obligations with regard to the withholding and payment of taxes, Social Security payments, Workmen’s Compensation, Unemployment Compensation contributions, and similar payroll deductions from the wages of employees.

- E. The Contractor shall maintain records conforming to usual accounting practices. Further, the Contractor agrees to render an invoice to the District, in writing, which shall be delivered or mailed to the District by the fifth (5th) day of the next succeeding month. This invoice is due and payable within thirty (30) days of receipt by the District. The invoice shall include such supporting information as the District may reasonably require the Contractor to provide.

SECTION 4. INSURANCE.

- A. Contractor shall, at its own expense, maintain insurance during the performance of its Services under this Agreement, with limits of liability not less than the following:

- B. The District, its staff, consultants, agents, employees, and supervisors shall be named as an additional insured. The Contractor shall furnish the District with the Certificate of Insurance evidencing compliance with this requirement. No certificate shall be

acceptable to the District unless it provides that any change or termination within the policy periods of the insurance coverages, as certified, shall not be effective within thirty (30) days of prior written notice to the District. Insurance coverage shall be from a reputable insurance carrier, licensed to conduct business in the State of Florida, and such carrier shall have a Best's Insurance Reports rating of at least A-VII.

- C. If the Contractor fails to have secured and maintained the required insurance, the District has the right (without any obligation to do so, however), to secure such required insurance in which event, the Contractor shall pay the cost for that required insurance and shall furnish, upon demand, all information that may be required in connection with the District's obtaining the required insurance.

SECTION 5. INDEPENDENT CONTRACTOR. It is understood and agreed that at all times the relationship of Contractor and its employees, agents, subcontractors or anyone directly or indirectly employed by Contractor to the District is the relationship of an independent contractor and not that of an employee, agent, joint venturer or partner of the District. Nothing in this Agreement shall be interpreted or construed as creating or establishing the relationship of employer and employee between the District and Contractor or any of its employees, agents, subcontractors, or anyone directly or indirectly employed by Contractor. The parties acknowledge that Contractor is not an employee for state or federal tax purposes. Contractor shall hire and pay all of Contractor's employees, agents, subcontractors or anyone directly or indirectly employed by Contractor, all of whom shall be employees of Contractor and not employees of the District and at all times entirely under Contractor's supervision, direction and control.

In particular, District will not: i) Withhold FICA (Social Security) from Contractor's payments; ii) Make state or federal unemployment insurance contributions on Contractor's behalf; iii) Withhold state or federal income tax from payment to Contractor; iv) Make disability insurance contributions on behalf of Contractor; or v) Obtain workers' compensation insurance on behalf of Contractor.

SECTION 6. COMPLIANCE WITH LAWS, ORDINANCES AND REGULATIONS. In performing its obligations under this Agreement, Contractor and each of its employees, agents, subcontractors or anyone directly or indirectly employed by Contractor shall comply with all applicable laws, ordinances, rules, regulations, and orders of any public or governmental authority having appropriate jurisdiction, including all laws, regulations and rules relating to immigration and/or the status of foreign workers. Contractor shall initiate, maintain, and supervise all safety precautions and programs in connection with its obligations herein. Contractor shall ensure that all of Contractor's employees, agents, subcontractors, or anyone directly or indirectly employed by Contractor observe Contractor's rules and regulations of safety and conduct. Contractor shall take all reasonable precautions for the safety of and shall provide all reasonable protection to prevent damage, injury or loss to all of its employees, agents and subcontractors performing its obligations herein and other persons who may be affected, and any material, equipment and other property. Contractor shall remedy all damage or loss to any property caused in whole or in

part by Contractor, its employees, agents, subcontractors, or anyone directly or indirectly employed by Contractor, or by anyone for whose acts Contractor may be liable. Contractor shall indemnify District for all damage or losses it may incur or be exposed to because of Contractor or any of its employees, agents, subcontractors, or anyone directly or indirectly employed by Contractor's failure to comply with the provisions contained herein.

SECTION 7. DEFAULT AND PROTECTION AGAINST THIRD PARTY INTERFERENCE. A default by either party under this Agreement shall entitle the other to all remedies available at law or in equity, which may include, but not be limited to, the right of actual damages and/or specific performance. The District shall be solely responsible for enforcing its rights under this Agreement against any interfering third party. Nothing contained in this Agreement shall limit or impair the District's right to protect its rights from interference by a third party to this Agreement.

SECTION 8. ENFORCEMENT OF AGREEMENT. In the event that either party is required to enforce this Agreement by court proceedings or otherwise, then the parties agree that the prevailing party shall be entitled to recover from the other all fees and costs incurred, including reasonable attorney's fees and costs for trial, alternative dispute resolution, or appellate proceedings.

SECTION 9. AMENDMENTS. Amendments to and waivers of the provisions contained in this Agreement may be made only by an instrument in writing which is executed by both the District and the Contractor.

SECTION 10. AUTHORIZATION. The execution of this Agreement has been duly authorized by the appropriate body or official of the District and the Contractor, both the District and the Contractor have complied with all the requirements of law, and both the District and the Contractor have full power and authority to comply with the terms and provisions of this instrument.

SECTION 11. NOTICES. All notices, requests, consents, and other communications under this Agreement ("**Notices**") shall be in writing and shall be delivered, mailed by First Class Mail, postage prepaid, or overnight delivery service, to the parties, as follows:

Except as otherwise provided in this Agreement, any Notice shall be deemed received only upon actual delivery at the address set forth above. Notices delivered after 5:00 p.m. (at the place of delivery) or on a non-business day, shall be deemed received on the next business day. If any time for giving Notice contained in this Agreement would otherwise expire on a non-business day, the Notice period shall be extended to the next succeeding business day. Saturdays, Sundays, and legal holidays recognized by the United States government shall not be regarded as business days. Counsel for the District and counsel for the Contractor may deliver Notice on behalf of the District and the Contractor. Any party or other person to whom Notices are to be sent or copied may notify the other parties and addressees of any change in name or address to which Notices shall be sent by providing the same on five (5) days written notice to the parties and addressees set forth herein.

SECTION 12. ARM'S LENGTH TRANSACTION. This Agreement has been negotiated fully between the District and the Contractor as an arm's length transaction. Both parties participated fully in the preparation of this Agreement and received the advice of counsel. In the case of a dispute concerning the interpretation of any provision of this Agreement, both parties are deemed to have drafted, chosen, and selected the language, and the doubtful language will not be interpreted or construed against either the District or the Contractor.

SECTION 13. THIRD PARTY BENEFICIARIES. This Agreement is solely for the benefit of the District and the Contractor and no right or cause of action shall accrue upon or by reason, to or for the benefit of any third party not a formal party to this Agreement. Nothing in this Agreement expressed or implied is intended or shall be construed to confer upon any person or corporation other than the District and the Contractor any right, remedy, or claim under or by reason of this Agreement or any of the provisions or conditions of this Agreement; and all of the provisions, representations, covenants, and conditions contained in this Agreement shall inure to the sole benefit of and shall be binding upon the District and the Contractor and their respective representatives, successors, and assigns.

SECTION 14. ASSIGNMENT. Neither the District nor the Contractor may assign this Agreement or any monies to become due hereunder without the prior written approval of the other.

SECTION 15. APPLICABLE LAW AND VENUE. This Agreement and the provisions contained herein shall be construed, interpreted, and controlled according to the laws of the State of Florida. Each party consents that the venue for any litigation arising out of or related to this Agreement shall be in Pasco County, Florida.

SECTION 16. INDEMNIFICATION.

- A. Contractor, its employees, agents and assigns shall defend, hold harmless and indemnify the District and its supervisors, officers, staff, employees, representatives and agents against any claims, damages, liabilities, losses and costs, including, but not limited to, reasonable attorneys' fees, to the extent caused by the acts or omissions of Contractor, and other persons employed or utilized by Contractor in the performance of this Agreement or the Services performed hereunder.
- B. Obligations under this section shall include the payment of all settlements, judgments, damages, penalties, forfeitures, back pay awards, court costs, arbitration and/or mediation costs, litigation expenses, attorney fees, and paralegal fees (incurred in court, out of court, on appeal, or in bankruptcy proceedings) as ordered.
- C. Notwithstanding anything to the contrary in this Agreement, Contractor's liability to the indemnified parties is limited to \$2,000,000 regardless of legal basis of recovery or type of claimed damages.

SECTION 17. LIMITATIONS ON GOVERNMENTAL LIABILITY. Nothing in this Agreement shall be deemed as a waiver of immunity or limits of liability of the District beyond any statutory limited waiver of immunity or limits of liability which may have been adopted by the Florida Legislature in Section 768.28, *Florida Statutes*, or other statute, and nothing in this Agreement shall inure to the benefit of any third party for the purpose of allowing any claim which would otherwise be barred under the Doctrine of Sovereign Immunity or by operation of law.

SECTION 18. TERMINATION. The Parties agree that either party may terminate this Agreement with or without cause by providing thirty (30) days written notice of termination to the other party; provided, however, that the party receiving the termination notice shall be provided a reasonable opportunity to cure a failure under this Agreement, if any. Upon any termination of this Agreement, the Contractor shall be entitled to payment for all services rendered up until the effective termination of this Agreement, subject to whatever claims or off sets the District may have against the Contractor as the sole means of recovery for termination.

SECTION 19. PUBLIC RECORDS. Contractor understands and agrees that all documents of any kind provided to the District in connection with this Agreement may be public records, and, accordingly, Contractor agrees to comply with all applicable provisions of Florida law in handling such records, including but not limited to Section 119.0701, *Florida Statutes*. Contractor acknowledges that the designated public records custodian for the District is **Patricia Thibault** ("**Public Records Custodian**"). Among other requirements and to the extent applicable by law, the Contractor shall 1) keep and maintain public records required by the District to perform the service; 2) upon request by the Public Records Custodian, provide the District with the requested public records or allow the records to be inspected or copied within a reasonable time period at a cost that does not exceed the cost provided in Chapter 119, *Florida Statutes*; 3) ensure that public records which are exempt or confidential, and exempt from public records disclosure

requirements, are not disclosed except as authorized by law for the duration of the contract term and following the contract term if the Contractor does not transfer the records to the Public Records Custodian of the District; and 4) upon completion of the contract, transfer to the District, at no cost, all public records in Contractor's possession or, alternatively, keep, maintain and meet all applicable requirements for retaining public records pursuant to Florida laws. When such public records are transferred by the Contractor, the Contractor shall destroy any duplicate public records that are exempt or confidential and exempt from public records disclosure requirements. All records stored electronically must be provided to the District in a format that is compatible with Microsoft Word or Adobe PDF formats.

IF THE CONTRACTOR HAS QUESTIONS REGARDING THE APPLICATION OF CHAPTER 119, *FLORIDA STATUTES*, TO THE CONTRACTOR'S DUTY TO PROVIDE PUBLIC RECORDS RELATING TO THIS AGREEMENT, CONTACT THE CUSTODIAN OF PUBLIC RECORDS AT (407) 574-3250, PATRICIA@HAVENMGTSOL.COM, OR AT 255 PRIMERA BLVD, SUITE 160, LAKE MARY, FL 32746.

SECTION 20. SEVERABILITY. The invalidity or unenforceability of any one or more provisions of this Agreement shall not affect the validity or enforceability of the remaining portions of this Agreement, or any part of this Agreement not held to be invalid or unenforceable.

SECTION 21. HEADINGS FOR CONVENIENCE ONLY. The descriptive headings in this Agreement are for convenience only and shall not control nor affect the meaning or construction of any of the provisions of this Agreement.

SECTION 22. ENTIRE AGREEMENT. This instrument shall constitute the final and complete expression of the agreement between the parties relating to the subject matter of this Agreement. None of the provisions of Exhibit A shall apply to this Agreement and Exhibit A shall not be incorporated herein, except that Exhibit A is applicable to the extent that it states and clarifies the scope of Services for the labor and materials to be provided under this Agreement.

SECTION 23. E-VERIFY. The Contractor shall comply with and perform all applicable provisions of Section 448.095, *Florida Statutes*. Accordingly, to the extent required by Florida Statute, Contractor shall register with and use the United States Department of Homeland Security's E-Verify system to verify the work authorization status of all newly hired employees. The District may terminate this Agreement immediately for cause if there is a good faith belief that the Contractor has knowingly violated Section 448.09(1), *Florida Statutes*. By entering into this Agreement, the Contractor represents that no public employer has terminated a contract with the Contractor under Section 448.095(2)(c), *Florida Statutes*, within the year immediately preceding the date of this Agreement.

SECTION 24. COMPLIANCE WITH SECTION 20.055, *FLORIDA STATUTES*. The Contractor agrees to comply with Section 20.055(5), *Florida Statutes*, to cooperate with the inspector general in any

investigation, audit, inspection, review, or hearing pursuant to such section and to incorporate in all subcontracts the obligation to comply with Section 20.055(5), *Florida Statutes*.

SECTION 25. STATEMENT REGARDING CHAPTER 287 REQUIREMENTS. Contractor acknowledges that, in addition to all Laws and Regulations that apply to this Agreement, the following provisions of Florida law ("**Public Integrity Laws**") apply to this Agreement:

- A. Section 287.133, *Florida Statutes*, titled *Public entity crime; denial or revocation of the right to transact business with public entities*;
- B. Section 287.134, *Florida Statutes*, titled *Discrimination; denial or revocation of the right to transact business with public entities*;
- C. Section 287.135, *Florida Statutes*, titled *Prohibition against contracting with scrutinized companies*;
- D. Section 287.137, *Florida Statutes*, titled *Antitrust violations; denial or revocation of the right to transact business with public entities; denial of economic benefits*; and
- E. Section 287.138, *Florida Statutes*, titled *Contracting with entities of foreign countries of concern prohibited*.

Contractor acknowledges that the Public Integrity Laws prohibit entities that meet certain criteria from bidding on or entering into or renewing a contract with governmental entities, including with the District ("**Prohibited Criteria**").

Contractor acknowledges that the District may terminate this Agreement if the Contractor is found to have met the Prohibited Criteria or violated the Public Integrity Laws.

Contractor certifies that in entering into this Agreement, neither it nor any of its officers, directors, executives, partners, shareholders, employees, members, or agents who are active in the management of the entity, nor any affiliate of the entity, meets any of the Prohibited Criteria, and in the event such status changes, Contractor shall immediately notify the District. By entering into this Agreement, Contractor agrees that any renewal or extension of this Contract shall be deemed a recertification of such status.

THIS SERVICES AGREEMENT (the "Agreement") is effective as of the date indicated above (the "Effective Date"), by and between SOLitude Lake Management, LLC ("SOLitude" or "Company"), and the customer identified above (the "Customer"), in accordance with the terms and conditions set forth in this Agreement.

1. **SERVICES.** SOLitude will provide services (the "Services") at the Customer's property in accordance with the Scope of Services attached hereto as Schedule A.
2. **MODIFICATIONS.** Any deviation from the requirements and Services outlined in Schedule A involving extra cost of material and labor will result in extra charges. Such additional services will be provided by SOLitude only upon a Change Order mutually approved by the parties in writing (the "Change Order").
3. **PRICING.** The Customer agrees to pay for the Services, as well as any applicable sales or other taxes, in accordance with the Pricing Schedule attached hereto as Schedule B. Prices are subject to annual increases. SOLitude will notify the Customer in writing (which may be by invoice) of such increases.
4. **PAYMENT.** Payment is due within thirty (30) days of the invoice date. Any disputes with an invoice or invoices must be brought to the attention of SOLitude by written notice within one hundred and twenty (120) days from the invoice date, otherwise Company will not be liable for any potential credits or adjustments. The parties agree to use good faith efforts to resolve any disputed invoice amounts within thirty (30) days after written notification of a dispute. Disputed amounts shall not affect payment of all undisputed amounts, and Customer agrees to pay all undisputed amounts owed on any disputed invoice within the applicable due dates. Invoices not paid on or before the invoice due date shall accrue interest charges at a rate of one percent (1%) per month, accruing as of the invoice date, until the time that such amounts are paid in full. Additionally, the Customer is liable for payment of all costs of collection of past due accounts, specifically including, but not limited to, court costs, expenses, and reasonable attorneys' fees. In addition to the compensation paid to SOLitude for performance of the Services, Customer shall reimburse SOLitude for all of the expenses paid or incurred by SOLitude in connection with the Services, including, but not limited to non-routine expenses, administrative fees, compliance fees, or any other similar expense that are incurred as a result of requirements placed on SOLitude by the Customer that are not covered specifically by the written specifications of this Agreement ("Reimbursable Expenses"). Should the work performed be subject to any local, state, or federal jurisdiction, agency, or other organization of authority for sales or other taxes or fees in addition to those expressly covered by this contract, the customer will be invoiced and responsible for paying said additional taxes in addition to the contract price and other fees.
5. **TERM AND EXPIRATION.** This Agreement shall commence on the Effective Date and shall remain in effect for an initial term of one year(s) (the "Initial Term"). SOLitude reserves the right to increase the amount charged for the



Services. Such increase shall be communicated by written notice to the Customer, which notice may be by invoice. Customer may reject any such additional increase by notifying SOLitude in writing within fifteen (15) days of receiving such price increase notice.

6. TERMINATION. SOLitude or Concord Station CDD may terminate this Agreement at any time, with or without cause, upon thirty (30) days' written notice to Customer

7. INSURANCE. SOLitude will maintain general liability and property damage insurance as necessary given the scope and nature of the Services. A certificate of insurance will be issued to Customer, upon request.

8. INDEMNIFICATION; LIMITATION OF LIABILITY. THE CUSTOMER AGREES THAT THE WORK PROVIDED UNDER THIS AGREEMENT IS NOT TO BE CONSTRUED AS INSURANCE, OR AS A COVENANT, GUARANTEE, WARRANTY, OR PROMISE OF ANY KIND THAT THE CUSTOMER IS IN COMPLIANCE WITH ANY LEGAL GUIDELINES OR REQUIREMENTS. COMPANY DISCLAIMS ANY LIABILITY OR RESPONSIBILITY REGARDING THE PRACTICES AND OPERATIONS OF THE CUSTOMER, AND BEARS NO RESPONSIBILITY OR LIABILITY FOR WHETHER THE CUSTOMER CARRIES OUT THE RECOMMENDATIONS MADE BY COMPANY AND IN NO EVENT WILL COMPANY BE LIABLE FOR CONSEQUENTIAL, INDIRECT, OR ECONOMIC DAMAGES. THE CUSTOMER SHALL INDEMNIFY AND HOLD COMPANY HARMLESS FROM AND AGAINST ALL CLAIMS, DEMANDS, LIABILITIES, OBLIGATIONS, AND ATTORNEYS' FEES OR COSTS BROUGHT BY ANY THIRD PARTIES, ARISING OUT OF OR RELATED TO THIS AGREEMENT OR BY FAILURE OF THE CUSTOMER TO ACT IN ACCORDANCE WITH ANY LEGAL REQUIREMENTS IN CONNECTION WITH THE SERVICES DESCRIBED IN SCHEDULE A. COMPANY SHALL NOT BE LIABLE FOR ANY DELAY IN PERFORMING THE SERVICES, NOR LIABLE FOR ANY FAILURE TO PROVIDE THE SERVICES, DUE TO ANY CAUSE BEYOND ITS REASONABLE CONTROL. COMPANY WILL BE RESPONSIBLE FOR ONLY THOSE DAMAGES, CLAIMS, CAUSES OF ACTION, INJURIES, OR LEGAL COSTS CAUSED BY ITS OWN DIRECT NEGLIGENCE OR MISCONDUCT, BUT THEN ONLY TO AN AMOUNT NOT TO EXCEED THE ANNUAL FEES CHARGED UNDER THE AGREEMENT.

9. CONFIDENTIAL INFORMATION. "Confidential Information" means any information disclosed by one party ("Discloser") to the other party ("Recipient"), either directly or indirectly, in writing, orally, or by inspection of tangible objects, other than information that the Recipient can establish (i) was publicly known and made generally available in the public domain prior to the time of disclosure; (ii) becomes publicly known and made generally available after disclosure other than through Recipient's action or inaction; or (iii) is in Recipient's possession, without confidentiality restrictions, at the time of disclosure by Discloser as shown by Recipient's files and records immediately prior to the time of disclosure. Recipient shall not at any time (a) disclose, sell, license, transfer, or otherwise make available to any person or entity any Confidential Information, or (b) use, reproduce, or otherwise copy any Confidential Information, except as necessary in connection with the purpose for which such Confidential Information is disclosed to Recipient or as required by applicable law. Recipient agrees to take all reasonable measures to protect the secrecy of and avoid disclosure and unauthorized use of the Confidential Information. All Confidential Information shall at all times remain the property of Discloser, and all documents, electronic media, and other tangible items containing or relating to any Confidential Information shall be delivered to Discloser immediately upon the request of Discloser.

Notwithstanding the foregoing, if Recipient is required by law, regulation, subpoena, government order, regulatory agency order, judicial order, or other court order to disclose any Confidential Information, Recipient shall give the Disclosing Party timely and lawful written notice of such a requirement prior to such disclosure, and shall reasonably and lawfully cooperate with the Disclosing Party to seek a protective order, confidential treatment, or other appropriate measures for such Confidential Information.



10. FORCE MAJEURE. The Company shall not be liable for any delay in performing the Services, nor liable for any failure to provide the Services, due to any cause beyond its reasonable control.
11. RIGHT TO SUBCONTRACT. The Company, in its sole discretion, may subcontract or delegate to an affiliate or third party any of its duties and obligations hereunder.
12. FUEL/TRANSPORTATION SURCHARGE. Like many other companies that are impacted by the price of gasoline, a rise in gasoline prices may necessitate a fuel surcharge. As such, the Company reserves the right to add a fuel surcharge to Customer's invoice for any increase in the cost of fuel as measured above the same time period in the prior year (by the National U.S. Average Motor Gasoline-Regular Fuel Price per Gallon Index reported by the U.S. Department of Energy). The surcharge may be adjusted monthly (up or down) with the price of gasoline.
13. ANTI-CORRUPTION AND BRIBERY. Each party represents that neither it nor anyone acting on its behalf has offered, given, requested or accepted any undue financial or other advantage of any kind in entering into this Agreement, and that it will comply with all applicable laws and regulations pertaining to corruption, competition and bribery in carrying out the terms and conditions of this Agreement.
14. E-VERIFY. SOLitude utilizes the federal E-Verify program in contracts with public employers as required by Florida State law, and acknowledges all the provisions of Florida Statute 448.095 are incorporated herein by reference and hereby certifies it will comply with the same.
15. GOVERNING LAW. Except for the Mandatory Arbitration Clause in Section 17 of this Agreement, which is governed by and construed in accordance with the Federal Arbitration Act, this Agreement shall be governed by, and construed in accordance with, the laws of the state in which the Services are performed.
16. MANDATORY ARBITRATION. Any claim, dispute or controversy, regarding any contract, tort, statute, or otherwise ("Claim"), arising out of or relating to this Agreement or the relationships among the parties hereto shall be resolved by one arbitrator through binding arbitration administered by the American Arbitration Association ("AAA"), under the AAA Commercial or Consumer, as applicable, Rules in effect at the time the Claim is filed ("AAA Rules"). Copies of the AAA Rules and forms can be located at www.adr.org, or by calling 1-800-778-7879. The arbitrator's decision shall be final, binding, and non-appealable. Judgment upon the award may be entered and enforced in any court having jurisdiction. This clause is made pursuant to a transaction involving interstate commerce and shall be governed by the Federal Arbitration Act. Neither party shall sue the other party other than as provided herein or for enforcement of this clause or of the arbitrator's award; any such suit may be brought only in Federal District Court for the District in which the services were performed or, if any such court lacks jurisdiction, in any state court that has jurisdiction. The arbitrator, and not any federal, state, or local court, shall have exclusive authority to resolve any dispute relating to the interpretation, applicability, unconscionability, arbitrability, enforceability or formation of this Agreement including any claim that all or any part of the Agreement is void or voidable. Venue for arbitration hereunder shall be within the state where the customer's property, that is the subject of the services provided, is located.
17. ASSIGNMENT. The Company may assign this Agreement to a related or affiliated entity upon written notice to the Customer.



18. **NOTICES.** All notices, requests, consents, claims, demands, waivers and other communications hereunder shall be in writing and shall be directed to the individuals and addresses listed in the signature block. Notices sent in accordance with this Section shall be deemed effectively given: (a) when received, if delivered by hand (with written confirmation of receipt); (b) when received, if sent by a nationally recognized overnight courier (receipt requested); or (c) on the third (3rd) business day after the date mailed, by certified or registered mail, return receipt requested, postage prepaid.
19. **DISCLAIMER.** SOLitude is not responsible for the failure of any treatment, equipment installation, or other work that may result from dam or other structural failures, severe weather and storms, flooding, or other acts of God that are outside of the control of SOLitude. Customer understands and acknowledges that there are irrigation restrictions associated with many of the products used to treat lakes and ponds. The Customer is responsible for notifying SOLitude in advance of the contract signing and the start of the Agreement if they utilize any of the water in their lakes or ponds for irrigation purposes. The Customer accepts full responsibility for any issues that may arise from the irrigation of turf, ornamentals, trees, crops, or any other plants as a result of treated water being used by the Customer for irrigation without the consent or knowledge of SOLitude. Although there is rarely direct fish toxicity with the products used for treatment when applied at the labeled rate, or the installation and normal operation of the equipment we install, there is a risk under certain circumstances of significant dissolved oxygen drops. This risk is most severe in times of extremely hot weather and warm water temperatures, as these are the conditions during which dissolved oxygen levels are naturally at their lowest levels. Oftentimes, lakes and ponds will experience natural fish kills under these conditions even if no work is performed. Every effort, to include the method and timing of application, the choice of products and equipment used, and the skill and training of the staff, is made to avoid such problems. However, the Customer understands and accepts that there is always a slight risk of the occurrence of adverse conditions outside the control of SOLitude that will result in the death of some fish and other aquatic life. The Customer also understands and accepts that similar risks would remain even if no work was performed. The Customer agrees to hold SOLitude harmless for any issues with fish or other aquatic life which occur as described above, or are otherwise outside the direct control of SOLitude, unless there is willful negligence on the part of SOLitude.
20. **BINDING.** This Agreement shall inure to the benefit of and be binding upon the legal representatives and successors of the parties.
21. **ENTIRE AGREEMENT.** This Agreement constitutes the entire agreement between the parties with respect to the subject matter and replaces any prior agreements or understandings, whether in writing or otherwise. This Agreement may not be modified or amended except by written agreement executed by both parties. In the event that any provision of this Agreement is determined to be void, invalid, or unenforceable, the validity and enforceability of the remaining provisions of this Agreement shall not be affected.
22. **SEVERABILITY.** If any part of this Agreement is held to be invalid or unenforceable for any reason, the remaining Terms and Conditions of this Agreement shall remain in full force and effect.

SCHEDULE A – SCOPE OF SERVICES

A SOLitude Aquatic Specialist will visit the site and inspect the water bodies on a seven (7) times per month basis during the months of April through March.

A SOLitude Aquatic Specialist will visit the site and inspect the wetland buffers on a four (4) times per month basis during the months of April through March.

Monitoring:

1. A SOLitude Aquatic Specialist will visit the site and inspect the pond(s)/lake(s)/BMP.
2. Observations and data collected during the inspections will be used to inform and guide all activities required to fulfill the requirements of this contract as specified in the description of services below.

Aquatic Weed Control:

1. Any growth of undesirable aquatic weeds and vegetation found in the pond(s)/lake(s)/BMP Area with each inspection shall be treated and controlled through the application of aquatic herbicides and aquatic surfactants as required to control the specific varieties of aquatic weeds and vegetation found at the time of application.
2. Invasive and unwanted submersed and floating vegetation will be treated and controlled preventatively and curatively each spring and early summer through the use of systemic herbicides at the rate appropriate for control of the target species. Application rates will be designed to allow for selective control of unwanted species while allowing for desirable species of submersed and emergent wetland plants to prosper.

Shoreline Weed Control:

1. Shoreline areas will be inspected for any growth of cattails, phragmites, or other unwanted shoreline vegetation found within the pond/lake areas shall be treated and controlled through the application of aquatic herbicides and aquatic surfactants as required for control of the plants present at time of application.
2. Any growth of unwanted plants or weeds growing in areas where stone has been installed for bank stabilization and erosion control shall be treated and controlled through the application of aquatic herbicides and aquatic surfactants as required to control the unwanted growth present at the time of application.

Algae Control:

1. Any algae found in the pond(s)/lake(s) with each inspection shall be treated and controlled through the application of algaecides, aquatic herbicides, and aquatic surfactants as needed for control of the algae present at the time of service.



Pond/Lake Dye:

1. Pond/Lake Dye will be applied to the pond(s)/lake(s) on an as-needed basis. A combination of blue and/or black dye will be used as required to maintain a dark natural water color.

Trash Removal:

1. Trash will be removed from the pond(s)/lake(s)/BMP Area with each service and disposed off site. Any large item or debris that is not easily and reasonably removable by one person during the routine visit will be removed with the Customer's approval for an additional fee. Routine trash and debris removal services are for the pond/lake/BMP areas only, and do not include any trash or debris removal from the surrounding terrestrial (dry land) areas.

Service Reporting:

1. Customer will be provided with a "GoFormz Report" detailing 19 sites each month. This report will include a picture and description of each site. The description will note any recent treatments, relative observations, and any deficiencies or suggestions pertaining to the site.

General Qualifications:

1. Company is a licensed pesticide applicator in the state in which service is to be provided.
2. Individual Applicators are Certified Pesticide Applicators in Aquatics, Public Health, Forestry, Right of Way, and Turf/Ornamental as required in the state in which service is to be provided.
3. Company is a SePRO Preferred Applicator and dedicated Steward of Water. Each individual applicator has been trained and educated in the water quality testing and analysis required for prescriptive site-specific water quality management and utilizes an integrated approach that encompasses all aspects of ecologically balanced management. Each applicator has received extensive training in the proper selection, use, and application of all aquatic herbicides, algacides, adjuvants, and water quality enhancement products necessary to properly treat our Customers' lakes and ponds as part of an overall integrated pest management program.
4. Company guarantees that all products used for treatment are EPA registered and labeled as appropriate and safe for use in lakes, ponds, and other aquatic sites, and are being applied in a manner consistent with their labeling.
5. All pesticide applications made directly to the water or along the shoreline for the control of algae, aquatic weeds, or other aquatic pests as specified in this Agreement will meet or exceed all of the Company's legal regulatory requirements as set forth by the EPA and related state agencies for NPDES and FIFRA. Company will perform treatments that are consistent with NPDES compliance standards as applicable in and determined by the specific state in which treatments are made. All staff will be fully trained to perform all applications in compliance with all federal, state, and local law.
6. Company will furnish the personnel, vehicles, boats, equipment, materials, and other items required to provide the foregoing at its expense. The application method and equipment (boat, ATV, backpack, etc.) used is determined by our technician at the time of the treatment to ensure the most effective method is provided for optimal results.

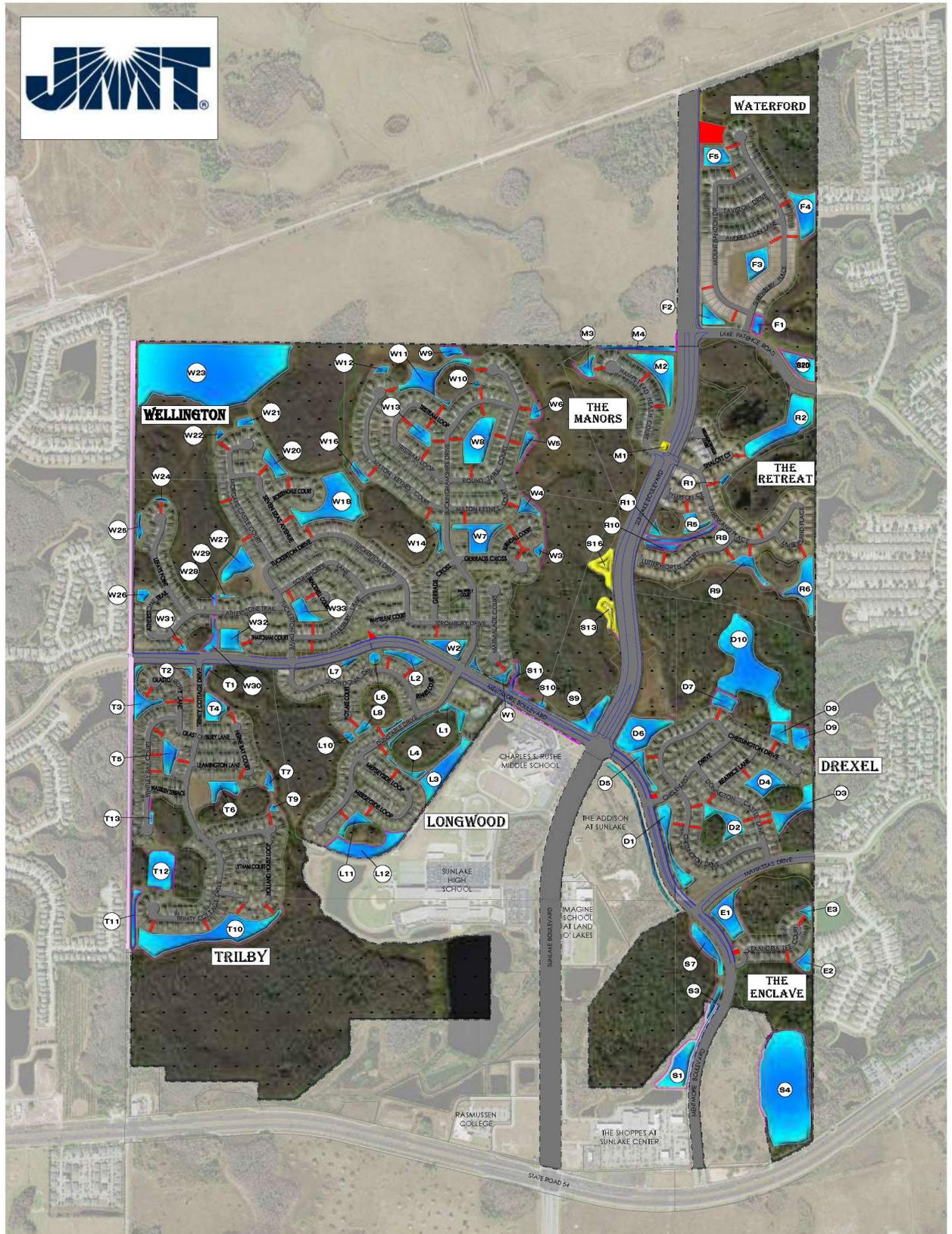
