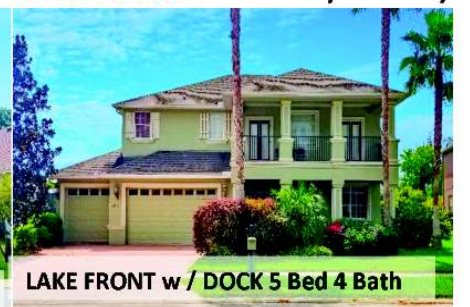

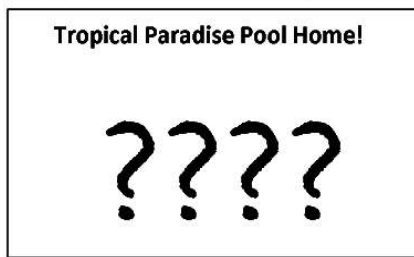

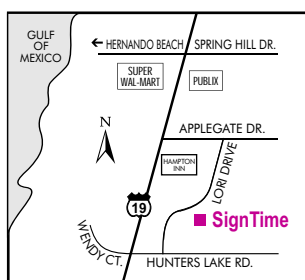

Facts About the Northern Bobwhite



- Also known as Virginia quail or bobwhite quail, the Northern Bobwhite is native to the United States, Mexico, and the Caribbean.
- Northern Bobwhites are year-round residents in open habitats of southeastern North America.
- Populations of Northern Bobwhites plunged between 1966 and 2014, resulting in an overall decline of 85 percent, according to the North American Breeding Bird Survey.
- Habitat loss and the increased use of pesticides are thought to be the culprits behind this steep decline.
- There are 22 subspecies of Northern Bobwhites.
- A subspecies known as the Masked Bobwhite, is federally listed as an endangered species.
- Northern Bobwhite populations are non-migratory, particularly where there is good habitat available.
- Like related New World quail species such as Gorgeted Wood-Quail, the Northern Bobwhite has a short, curved bill; a chunky, roundish body; and a short tail.
- They are ground-dwelling birds, preferring to walk or run, although they are capable of strong, short bursts of flight, particularly when fleeing from predators.
- These quail are more often heard than seen, since they tend to stay within dense low cover where their dappled brown-and-white plumage provides excellent camouflage. But sometimes, especially when calling in spring, male bobwhites will occupy a highly visible location, such as atop a fencepost.
- During snowfalls in the northern part of their range, bobwhites depend on woody cover to prevent snow from reaching the ground and blocking their foraging habitat.
- Northern Bobwhites feed along the ground, consuming a largely plant-based diet of seeds, fruit, stems, and leaves. They add insects, spiders, and snails to the menu during spring and



summer, particularly when providing food to their young.

- In places where bobwhites are common, they may eat bird seed from ground feeders in open backyards with shrub cover.
- Chicks are fed mostly insects until they are 6–8 weeks old.
- Arthropods can make up 5 percent of the male's diet and 20 percent of the female's diet during the breeding season.
- Each fall, Northern Bobwhites form groups, or coveys, of anywhere between three to twenty birds.
- At night, these coveys roost in a close-packed, outward-facing circle with their tails pointing toward the center, probably to conserve heat and stay alert for predators. As a very social species, they stay in coveys until the beginning of nesting season each spring, when they begin to pair off.
- Although seemingly monogamous during the nesting season, each member of a bobwhite pair may mate with several different partners, a strategy which ensures maximum genetic fitness and diversity.
- Both sexes work to build the nest, a simple scrape on the ground lined with leaves and grasses. These birds often weave dry grass or weeds to form an arch around the nest, which hides it from potential predators. Nest building takes about 5 days.
- Female bobwhites lay large clutches of 12 to 16 eggs, which both parents incubate.
- The hatchlings emerge from their eggs covered in down, able to walk and their eyes are open. They will all leave the nest shortly after hatching.
- Young bobwhites are fed and cared for by their parents for several weeks after leaving the nest. In a good nesting season and in suitable habitat, female bobwhites can raise several broods per year.
- Hawks, owls, raccoons, opossums, skunks, foxes, and snakes prey on adult bobwhites and their young. Adults flutter and drag their wings to distract predators from their chicks.



Natural Areas and Environmentally Sensitive Areas



Everyone plays a role in helping to protect and sustain Florida's wetlands and preserves: the government, developers, environmental groups, scientists, and YOU! Here at Wilderness Lake Preserve, Southwest Florida Water Management District (SWFWMD) vested The Preserve at Wilderness Lake CDD with the legal responsibility of protecting and maintaining all conservation land. This includes both CDD owned land and the numerous conservation buffer areas on residents' property. SWFWMD has mandated that the preserves remain untouched so that they will continue to serve their natural purpose, except in special circumstances.

Sometimes there are instances when it makes sense to help the preserve maintain its natural balance. So the CDD, at the request of numerous concerned residents, developed a Conservation Maintenance Policy. To summarize the policy, if you have wooded and/or wetland areas adjacent to your home, PLEASE DO NOT trim or disturb these areas yourself, regardless of whether they are on CDD owned land or YOUR OWN LOT. Instead, notify the Lodge or District Management, who will make an appointment with you. Prior to your meeting, please review our Conservation Maintenance Policy, which is available on the community website, www.wildernesslakecdd.org.

Because our CDD Board takes our environmental responsibilities very seriously, they will strictly enforce the Conservation Maintenance Policy to ensure we are in compliance with all SWFWMD regulations and are in no way damaging our environment. If you feel the wooded and wetland areas surrounding your home need attention, please first review our community's policy and contact the Lodge to arrange for your inspection.

****Please do not dump yard clippings or trimmings in the wooded and/or wetland areas adjacent to your home.**

ASA REMINDER...

The wetlands and wetland setback areas, on both CDD

property **AND** resident property, are part of the SWFWMD CDD wetlands permit. This means that residents may only remove invasive species **AND** must have CDD permission / supervision to do so. Residents must contact the Lodge prior to the removal of any plant material. The CDD wetlands vendor will review the area and provide guidance as to what may and may not be removed or cut back. Residents must receive written permission from the CDD prior to removal / cutback of any plant material on CDD property. The Lodge Manager will provide residents with the proper forms that must be completed prior to any work being done. ***Any non-authorized removal of plant material in areas falling under the SWFWMD CDD permit will be replanted at the offending resident's expense. All legal costs associated with the violation will also be charged to the offending resident.***

reasons: he is frequently driving around properties and not in a position to look up your property or adequately address your issue while he's on the road; and an email trail protects you and your attempt to comply or get clarification. Also keep in mind, neighbors can forward deed restriction problems to the Manager. We've seen some folks get upset because their violation cites evening or weekend issues, but a violation is a violation regardless of evening, weekend, or holiday.

As of the deadline for this publication, the ARC is currently meeting electronically. If you are doing an improvement that requires ARC approval, request and completion forms are on our community's Greenacre website. Governing documents are also located on that website which can be accessed at <https://g360.greenacre.com/Webadmin/Login.aspx> which gets you into the portal. Recipe's of the Month continued



Garlic Butter Capellini Pomodoro with Shrimp

Ingredients

Shrimp:

- 1 lb large shrimp
- Salt, pepper, and olive oil for the pan

Pomodoro Sauce:

- 4 cloves garlic
- 4 cups diced fresh tomatoes or halved cherry tomatoes
- 2 cups chicken or vegetable broth
- 4 tablespoons butter
- 1/2 cup fresh basil leaves, cut or torn into small pieces
- Salt to taste

Pasta:

- 8 oz capellini pasta
- Parmesan cheese for topping

DIRECTIONS:

1. **SHRIMP:** Heat a swish of oil in a large skillet over medium heat. Add the shrimp and season with salt and pepper. Cook until pink, about 2 minutes per side. Remove shrimp from the pan and set aside.
2. **GARLIC BUTTER POMODORO SAUCE:** In the same pan, heat just a tiny bit more oil over medium low heat and toss the garlic in. Sauté for a minute or two until it smells amazing. Add the tomatoes and broth and simmer for 10-ish minutes. The tomatoes will start to become saucy, and gradually the sauce will start to thicken. This is perfect!
3. **CAPELLINI:** Cook according to the package directions. Drain and set aside.
4. **ALL TOGETHER NOW:** Add the butter and basil to the thickened sauce and stir to combine. If it needs thickening, let it hang out on low heat for just a little while longer. Season to taste. When the sauce is ready, add the shrimp back in. Serve the sauce over top of the pasta with a little Parmesan cheese, salt and pepper.



Chicken Enchilada-Stuffed Zucchini Boats

Ingredients

Lime Crème:

- 1/2 cup plain nonfat Greek yogurt
- 1 tbs lime juice
- 1/4 teaspoon salt

Zucchini Boats:

- 1 boneless, skinless chicken breast, sliced into 1/2-inch pieces
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon black pepper
- 1/4 teaspoon chili powder
- 2 teaspoons olive oil
- 1/2 cup salsa
- 1 zucchini, cut in half lengthwise, centers hollowed out
- 2 tbs shredded cheddar cheese
- 1 Roma tomato, diced
- 1/4 avocado, diced
- 2 tbs cilantro, chopped
- 1 lime, cut into wedges

DIRECTIONS:

1. Preheat oven to 375 degrees F.
2. Add the Greek yogurt, lime juice, and salt together in a small bowl and stir to combine.
3. On a cutting board, season the chicken breast with salt, pepper, and chili powder.
4. Heat olive oil in a large pan over medium heat. Once the oil begins to shimmer, add the chicken and cook until browned, about 3 minutes.
5. Remove the chicken from the pan and let cool. Once cooled, shred the chicken with a fork.
6. Add the chicken to a bowl with the salsa and stir to combine.
7. Stuff chicken mixture in hollowed-out zucchini boats, and top with cheddar cheese.
8. Bake until cheese is melted and browned, and zucchini is tender, about 20 minutes.
9. Top with tomato, avocado, cilantro, and lime cremé. Serve with lime wedges.

Summertime Spaghetti

Potato-Crusted Pizza

Ingredients

- 2 lemons
- 12 oz uncooked thin spaghetti noodles
- 2 cans (14.5 oz each) reduced-sodium chicken broth (about 3 ½ cups)
- 1 cup grape tomatoes
- 3 garlic cloves, peeled
- 1 oz fresh Parmesan cheese
- ½ cup fresh parsley
- 3 tablespoons olive oil
- ½ teaspoon ground black pepper
- 2 cups diced cooked chicken breasts
- 1 cup small broccoli florets



DIRECTIONS:

1. Zest lemons using zester to measure 1 tablespoon; set aside. Juice lemons using juicer to measure 1/4 cup.
2. Break noodles in half. Combine noodles, broth and lemon juice in deep covered baking dish.
3. Microwave, covered, on HIGH 11-13 minutes or until most of the liquid is absorbed, stirring once halfway through cooking using tongs.
4. Cut tomatoes in half lengthwise. Grate Parmesan.
5. Process garlic, Parmesan cheese, parsley, zest, oil and pepper in food processor until parsley is finely chopped.
6. Carefully remove baker from microwave using potholders or grips. Add Parmesan mixture to dish; mix well using tongs.
7. Stir in tomatoes, chicken and broccoli. Microwave, covered, on HIGH 2-3 minutes or until broccoli is crisp-tender.

Makes: 6 servings

Ingredients

- 1 tablespoon olive oil
- 1 (30 oz) package frozen seasoned shredded potato rounds
- 1 (28 oz) can diced tomatoes, drained
- 1 (1 oz) package fresh basil, torn
- 2 cups (8 oz) shredded pizza cheese blend



DIRECTIONS:

Preheat oven to 450°. Brush a 15 1/2- x 10 1/2-inch jelly-roll pan with oil, and arrange potatoes in a single layer in pan. Bake 10 minutes. Flatten potatoes, using the back of a wooden spoon until rounds touch and cover entire pan. Bake 20 more minutes or until crisp. Top with remaining ingredients. Bake 5 to 10 more minutes or until cheese melts.


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Harmful Effects of Dumping in the Storm Drains



Think twice about dumping anything into a storm drain! It is a common misconception that storm drains lead to a wastewater treatment plant. In many urban settings such as Wilderness Lakes Preserve, the water entering storm drains goes into a nearby stormwater pond, most likely behind or nearby your house. You can help with the water quality and aesthetics of your stormwater ponds:

- Never dump anything directly into a storm drain.
- Lawn Debris – Materials such as grass and tree clippings should never be swept into a storm drain or onto a street, they provide excess nutrients and promote unnecessary algae growth which, in turn, can cause severe negative impacts to the rest of the ecosystem.
- Pick up After Your Pets – Rain washes parasites and bacteria from pet waste into local waterways and also unbalances nutrient loads. This poses harm and also degrades the aquatic system.
- Sweep Pesticides and Fertilizer off of hard surfaces and onto your lawn – These applications will encourage the growth of algae blooms and/or negatively impact the aquatic system.
- Wash Vehicles on Lawn – Washing vehicles on a grassy surface allows the dirty and soapy water to be absorbed by plants and soil, filtering the water and preventing it from washing into a storm drain.
- Properly Dispose of Chemicals – Some things like motor oil and batteries can be recycled. Other products that should be brought to a facility for proper disposal include paint, herbicides, pesticides, and swimming pool chemicals. Be careful to clean up after any spills and avoid allowing them to enter the storm drains.
