The Deer Families That Surround Us

The deer in the Wilderness community and beyond travel their well-worn paths in herds. Typically, does give birth to 1-3 spotted young, known as fawns, in May or June. After a month or so of furtive nursing in the vegetation, fawns begin following their mothers on foraging journeys.



Once weaned, males, known as bucks, will leave their mothers after a year while females remain close for nearly two years.

Bucks will join breeding herds before their second birthdays, often splitting up to pursue females during mating season. Males compete and spar over females to achieve a dominance hierarchy, with young females often fleeing areas heavily populated with males. In the winter, deer families will gather together and travel paths with established food sources.

Deer communicate with each other with uniquely audible noises. Fawns will release a high-pitched squeal, known as a bleat or a mew, to call out to their mothers. Does and bucks will emit guttural grunts or snorts to signal an imminent threat. They will often audibly communicate to draw attention to their dominance or aggression, and raise their tails to alert others to danger. They process visual images very quickly and can

easily detect motion in low-light conditions; their horizontally-slit pupils allow for good night vision and sharp color vision during the day.

White-tailed deer are herbivores, often dining on twigs, leaves, flowering plants, grasses, acorns, fruits, and corn. Their diets vary by season according to the availability of food sources. They forage constantly, often venturing into roadways and other dangerous zones in their continued pursuit of food. A grown deer can eat around 2,000 pounds of vegetable and organic matter annually. Their four-chambered stomachs allow for digestion of a very wide range of nutrients, including wild mushrooms and poison ivy!



Recipe of the Month



Pineapple Upside Down Cake

Ingredients

- ½ cup firmly packed brown sugar
- ¼ cup butter, melted
- 6 canned pineapple slices, drained
- 6 maraschino cherries
- 2 eggs, separated
- ½ cup sugar
- ¾ cups all purpose flour
- 1/2 teaspoon baking powder
- ¼ teaspoon salt
- ¼ cup pineapple juice
- Whipped cream

Directions

Heat oven to 350F. In a small bowl, combine brown sugar and butter; blend well. Spread in bottom of ungreased 9-inch round cake pan. Arrange pineapple slices and maraschino cherries over brown sugar mixture. Set aside.

In a small bowl, beat egg yolks until thick and lemon colored. Gradually add sugar; beat well. Add flour, baking powder, salt and pineapple juice to egg yolk mixture; stir well. In another small bowl, beat egg whites until stiff peaks form; fold into batter. Pour batter evenly over pineapple slices and cherries.

Bake at 350F for 30-35 minutes or until toothpick inserted in center comes out clean. Cool upright in pan for 2 minutes; invert onto serving plate. Serve warm with whipped cream.

Hurricane Forecast and Preparation



The size and projected path of each tropical storm/hurricane are expertly analyzed by forecasters via huge amounts of computerized data. Computer

models and spaghetti models can usually be accurately calculated 2-3 days in advance of landfall or regional impact. The National Hurricane Center (NHC) has the most up-to-date information of tropical cyclone developments, forecasts, and weather alerts: http://www.nhc.noaa.gov/

Avoid long lines and panic-buying! Prepare your hurricane kit ahead of time. Stock up on:

- Non-perishable food (enough to last 3 days per person)
- Water (1 gallon per day per person)
- First-aid kit and medication
- Hygiene and sanitation items
- Flashlights and extra batteries
- Battery operated radio
- Special needs items (pet and baby supplies)
- Lighter/matches, manual can opener, books, magazines, coolers, ice packs

Have a plan for every scenario. Keep your gas tank full, have extra cash on hand, charge your cell phones, and remain calm and vigilant! The Atlantic storm season ends on November 1.



August 4, 2021 CDD Meeting Highlights

The official minutes will be posted on our website after they have been voted on and approved by the CDD Board.

Audience Comments:

No audience comments.

Board Supervisor Requests and Walk on Items:

No Supervisor requests.

Landscaping Reports:

Mr. Lucadano presented his reports and updated the Board on the current condition of the landscaping.

Tree trimming is on-going. The selection of the fall annual rotation is in progress. Anticipated date of delivery is expected the 2nd or 3rd week of September.

GHS Environmental Report:

Mr. Huber presented the GHS report for the Board's review.

District Engineer's Report:

Mr. Woodcock presented his report to the Board and reviewed a proposal for a clogged downspout and underground pipe that connects the Lodge rain gutters to an existing bubbler yard drain box.

The Board of Supervisors approved the Site Masters proposal in the amount of \$400.00 to replace/repair the clogged downspout and pipe.

Mr. Woodcock recommended a drain box to resolve the drainage issue along the fence line between 21245 Quiet Haven Court and the Tennis Courts. An Environmental Resource Permit will be required by SWFWMD to modify the existing pipe/drainage.

The Board of Supervisors authorized the Chairman and Vice-Chairman to work with Ms. Dobson and the District Engineer at a not-to-exceed \$5,000.00 to modify the existing drainpipe that parallels the observation area of the Tennis Courts.

An assessment of the community drainage is scheduled to ensure the stormwater is draining properly. If an issue is revealed during the assessment, a diver will be brought in to assess any concerns.

District Counsel's Report:

Mr. Vericker reviewed the minimum requirement by the Florida Statute for audience comments. The Board of Supervisors approved to allow audience comments at the beginning and end of the meeting.

Lodge Manager's Report:

Ms. Dobson presented and reviewed her report.

The Board discussed returning to pre-covid levels for room rentals. The Board of Supervisors approved to return to pre-covid levels of attendance for the Activities Center of 75-80, Classroom 30 and Theatre 27.

Mr. Diver discussed the vandalism within the community and how to broadcast to the community. Mr. Sailer suggested ordering a couple of extra plexiglass panels for the Lodge playground equipment.

Ms. Dobson presented an update on the Morning Mist conservation area violations. The District Manager to send letters of violation.

A discussion ensued regarding amenity rental fees for non-residents. The Board of Supervisors approved to raise rates and hold a public hearing on September 1, 2021 at 9:30 a.m.

Ms. Ruhlig discussed the current cost of day passes. The Board of Supervisors approved to raise rates for Adult Day Pass to \$50.00 and Child Day Pass to \$25.00 and hold a public hearing on September 1, 2021 at 9:30 a.m.



Natural Areas and Environmentally Sensitive Areas

Everyone plays a role in helping to protect and sustain Florida's wetlands and preserves: the government, developers, environmental groups, scientists, and YOU! Here at Wilderness Lake Preserve, Southwest Florida Water Management District (SWFWMD) vested The Preserve at Wilderness Lake CDD with the legal responsibility of protecting and maintaining all conservation land. This includes both CDD owned land and the numerous conservation buffer areas on residents' property. SWFWMD has mandated that the preserves remain untouched so that they will continue to serve their natural purpose, except in special circumstances.

Sometimes there are instances when it makes sense to help the preserve maintain its natural balance. So the CDD, at the request of numerous concerned residents, developed a Conservation Maintenance Policy. To summarize the policy, if you have wooded and/or wetland areas adjacent to your home, PLEASE DO NOT trim or disturb these areas yourself, regardless of whether they are on CDD owned land or YOUR OWN LOT. Instead, notify the Lodge or District Management, who will make an appointment with you. Prior to your meeting, please review our Conservation Maintenance Policy, which is available on the community website, www.wildernesslakecdd.org.

Because our CDD Board takes our environmental responsibilities very seriously; they will strictly enforce the Conservation Maintenance Policy to ensure we are in compliance with all SWFWMD regulations and are in no way damaging our environment. If you feel the wooded and wetland areas surrounding your home need attention, please first review our community's policy and contact the Lodge to arrange for your inspection.

**Please do not dump yard clippings or trimmings in the wooded and/or wetland areas adjacent to your home.

The Protected Areas Notification

AS A REMINDER...

The wetlands and wetland setback areas, on both CDD property, AND resident property, are part of the

SWFWMD CDD wetlands permit. This means that residents may only remove invasive species AND must have CDD permission / supervision to do so. Residents must contact the Lodge prior to the removal of any plant material. The CDD wetlands vendor will review the area and provide guidance as to what may and may not be removed or cut back. Residents must receive written permission from the CDD prior to removal / cutback of any plant material on CDD property. The Lodge Manager will provide residents with the proper forms that must be completed prior to any work being done. Any non-authorized removal of plant material in areas falling under the SWFWMD CDD permit will be replanted at the offending resident's expense. All legal costs associated with the violation will also be charged to the offending resident.

Cutting trails, clearing of the underbrush, constructing forts, and dumping are just a few examples of violations that have occurred in 2021. These violations are becoming far too common and will ultimately impact the protected areas and community adversely. Be responsible by enjoying the surrounding areas without disturbing them.

Summer Landscaping Tips

When you garden with wildlife in mind, you're helping to provide a balanced and healthy ecosystem. The payoff? Your garden will benefit from the insect-eating birds, bees, and dragonflies drawn to your yard. This helps control plant damage from harmful pests. Plus, many of these critters aid in the pollination process, helping them to reproduce. Aim for a diverse mix of vines, flowers ground covers, shrubs, trees, and palms. Why? Different plants provide food (think nectar, seeds, or berries), water, and shelter for wildlife. For instance, milkweed attracts butterflies, and the American beauty berry shrub bursts with clusters of purple berries—a perfect snack for cardinals and sparrows.
