

Owl Symbolism

Owls are majestic and mysterious creatures. These nocturnal birds of prey have been the subject of myths and folklore for centuries. There are over 240 species of



owl and they exist on every continent on Earth except Antarctica. Characteristics of the owl spirit animal is recognized in cultures around the world. They are: Wisdom, Keen Insight, Courage, Agility, Independent Thinking, Observant Listening, Powerful Intuition, and Supernatural Powers.

Owls have extraordinarily keen eyesight; at night, they can see objects 2.5 more brightly than we do. Additionally, their heads can turn 270 degrees. Their almost supernatural visual and observational traits speak to their wisdom and insight.

Owls are also blessed with acute hearing; many species have asymmetrical ears, which enables them to pinpoint the location of sounds from multiple directions. At certain frequencies, owls' hearing is 10 time more acute than our own.

Owls have unique and graceful flying skills; they are able to vertically launch from a standstill and fly silently, generating very little turbulence.

Owls are independent hunters, fierce protectors of their young, brave, and extremely cunning in their survival instincts. Symbolically, they "show the light", and help people find their way when they are lost in the darkness.





Never Leave Candles Unattended

Candles are very popular, especially around the holidays. But did you know that candles cause about 20 home fires a day on average in the U.S.?



December is the peak month for home candle fires. If you're decorating with candles this holiday season, consider using the battery-operated kind. If you must use candles, keep them away from anything that could burn, and place them out of reach of pets and children. Never leave burning candles unattended.

The American Red Cross offers these additional steps you can take to deck your halls safely:

- Check all holiday light cords to ensure they aren't frayed or broken. Don't string too many strands of lights together — no more than three per extension cord.
- Turn off all holiday lights when going to bed or leaving the house.

- Ensure outside decorations are for outdoor use and fasten lights securely to your home or trees. If using hooks or nails outside, make sure they are insulated to avoid an electrocution or fire hazard.
- If buying an artificial tree, look for the fire-resistant label. When putting it up, keep it away from fireplaces, radiators and other sources of heat. Never use electric lights on metallic trees.
- If getting a live tree, make sure it's fresh and keep it watered. To test if the tree is fresh, bend the needles up and down to make sure no needles fall off.
- Don't light the fireplace if hanging stockings or other decorations on the mantel.

Natural Areas and Environmentally Sensitive Areas

If you modify or use CDD owned property and/or Conservation/Natural Areas without permission, you will be legally required to pay for remediation. Everyone plays a role in helping to protect and sustain Florida's wetlands and preserves: the government, developers, environmental groups, scientists, and YOU! Here at Wilderness Lake Preserve, Southwest Florida Water Management District (SWFWMD) vested The Preserve at Wilderness Lake CDD with the legal responsibility of protecting and maintaining all conservation land. This includes both CDD owned land and the numerous conservation buffer areas on residents' property. SWFWMD has mandated that the preserves remain untouched so that they will continue to serve their natural purpose, except in special circumstances.

Sometimes there are instances when it makes sense to help the preserve maintain its natural balance. So the CDD, at the request of numerous concerned residents, developed a Conservation Maintenance Policy. To summarize the policy, if you have wooded and/or wetland areas adjacent to your home, PLEASE DO NOT trim or disturb these areas yourself, regardless of whether they are on CDD owned land or YOUR OWN LOT. Instead, notify the Lodge or District Management, who will make an appointment with you. Prior to your meeting, please review our Conservation Maintenance Policy, which is available on the community website, www.wildernesslakecdd.org.

Because our CDD Board takes our environmental responsibilities very seriously; they will strictly enforce the Conservation Maintenance Policy to ensure we are in compliance with all SWFWMD regulations and are in no way damaging our environment. If you feel the wooded and wetland areas surrounding your home need attention, please first review our community's policy and contact the Lodge to arrange for your inspection.

**Please do not dump yard clippings or trimmings in the wooded and/or wetland areas adjacent to your home.

The Protected Areas Notification

AS A REMINDER...

The wetlands and wetland setback areas,

on both CDD property AND resident property, are part of the SWFWMD CDD wetlands permit. This means that residents may only remove invasive species AND must have CDD permission / supervision to do so. Residents must contact the Lodge prior to the removal of any plant material. The CDD wetlands vendor will review the area and provide guidance as to what may and may not be removed or cut back. Residents must receive written permission from the CDD prior to removal / cutback of any plant material on CDD property. The Lodge Manager will provide residents with the proper forms that must be completed prior to any work being done. Any non-authorized removal of plant material in areas falling under the SWFWMD CDD permit will be replanted at the offending resident's expense. All legal costs associated with the violation will also be charged to the offending resident.

Cutting trails, clearing of the underbrush, constructing forts, and dumping are just a few examples of violations that have occurred in 2021. These violations are becoming far too common and will ultimately impact the protected areas and community adversely. Be responsible by enjoying the surrounding areas without disturbing them.

Florida Friendly Landscape Tips

Mulch

Mulching is recommended to protect against soil erosion, maintain soil moisture, inhibit weed growth,



improve soil structure and aeration, and reduce pesticide use.

Recycle

Florida-Friendly Landscape recycles yard waste generated by activities like mowing, pruning, and raking. Use these leftovers as mulch or compost, returning valuable nutrients to your landscape. Save money and enrich your soil by composting grass clippings, weeds, and plant trimmings and utilizing the compost.
