#### Resolution 2026-01

#### Policy on Contacting Legal Counsel without Board approval

Pursuant to Chapter 190, *Florida Statutes*, while the Board of Supervisors ("**Board**") of the Meadow Pointe II Community Development District ("**District**") encourages efficient use of legal resources, the following circumstances permit individual Board members to contact District legal counsel without prior Board approval:

- Illegal or criminal activity; or
- Suspected violations of Florida ethics laws or District policies; or
- Threats of physical harm, harassment, or potential legal action against District officials, employees, or Board members; or
- Matters requiring immediate legal attention that either: (a) cannot be adequately addressed by the District Manager, (b) directly involve the District Manager, or (c) require action before the next scheduled Board meeting to preserve District interests; and
- A Board member situation that is legally time sensitive and cannot wait for the next meeting.

Notwithstanding the above, Board members specifically authorized by Board vote to communicate with legal counsel on particular matters may do so without limitation. Additionally, Board members shall respond to direct requests from legal counsel. While Board members are encouraged to exercise discretion and, when practical, address non-urgent matters at regular Board meetings, nothing in this policy shall be construed to limit a Board member's statutory rights to seek legal counsel on District matters. Questions regarding this policy's application and any questions in the purview of the District Manager should first be directed to the District Manager.

#### ENGINEERS REPORT FOR OCTOBER 1st, 2025 BOARD MEETING

#### **Discussion items:**

- **Building Construction on County Line Rd & Mansfield Blvd:** Renker Eich Parks has provided us with the final preliminary concepts including site plans, floor plans, renderings, facilities listed and space planning sketches.
- Warning Gate at Wrencrest Drive: We received a denial letter from the County in response to our application for the Wrencrest Gate. Our council is currently working on the appeal that will be made in front of the Planning Commission. The Planning Commission Appeal Meeting was scheduled for October 2<sup>nd</sup> at 1:30pm, but it has been continued to November 6, 2025, 1:30 pm.
- Lap Pool: The Borelli Group has begun working on design plans and Martin Aquatics has been contacted to communicate to us what support consultants they will need in addition to the architects and to begin the process of bringing those consultants on board, this could include landscape architect, testing services and civil engineering and design services. The SWFWMD permit modification application is listed in the pending review status. We have contacted SWFWMD to discuss and are expecting feedback from their engineer Brandee Alexander who is handling the modification. As of this writing we do not have a response to the application from SWFWMD. Our last request for information to them was 09/30.
- Deer Run & Morningside County Conveyances: The District's Counsel is working this
  item at this time. We have a draft agreement from the County. BDi and The Kilinski
  Group have conducted a meeting to discuss the agreement and what we need to
  provide in response to their draft agreement.



• **Dog Park at Iverson:** We have completed an exploration meeting with the County. They provided comments during the meeting and over the following days on the updated plans. We are working to update the plans and gather supporting specification sheets requested prior to Board direction and formal submission.

### **Halloween Safety**

Halloween is almost upon us! This year Halloween falls awkwardly on a Friday. In a large community like ours, Halloween is always a pretty big deal and we should all expect a flurry of activity that night. Hopefully despite the fun holiday hitting on a weekday, we can all do our part to ensure that it is a fantastic, but more importantly, a *safe*, evening.

Trick or treaters: be patient with houses that mistakenly leave their lights on and understand that many people are not participating for any number of reasons. Kids should be supervised by adults if they're young or should stay in groups if they're older. Remember to look both ways before crossing the street. Please be extra cautious if your costume restricts your peripheral vision! If you will be out past sunset, have a flashlight with you.

If you plan on giving out candy, please do several things. First, please use your porch light and try to decorate your home some, so you *appear* to be participating. Or even better, set up outside, wear costumes, and have a great evening interacting with your

friends and neighbors. Please use prepackaged items as treats.

If you are able to offer non-consumable treats as an option, please put out a teal pumpkin. The Teal Pumpkin Project is for kids that can't eat most (or any) candy treats due to allergies or other reasons. Also, please remember that some kids may come to your door in underwhelming costumes. Smile, say "Happy Halloween!" and give them a treat anyway. There could be lots of reasons why they are not in a "proper costume" – they could have a skin condition or allergy that only allows them to wear certain clothes; they could have any number of special needs that make masks, makeup, or face paint extremely uncomfortable or impossible. They could also have budgetary reasons.

### **Breast Cancer Awareness**

October is Breast Cancer Awareness month, and according to the American Cancer Society, 1 in 8 women will be diagnosed with breast cancer at some point in their lives. Also, about 1% of breast cancer cases are in men, so this information is not just for MPII's female residents.

Breast Cancer Awareness month is much more than pink ribbons, pink NFL uniforms, and fundraisers – though all those things are

important if they increase awareness or funding for research! More importantly, however, it's a call to action for every woman to prioritize

her health. Early detection saves lives and taking just a few minutes to self-check or schedule a screening can make all the difference.

Breast cancer is the most common cancer among women worldwide. While that 1 in 8 statistic may sound scary, there is good news: when detected early, breast cancer has a 99% five-year survival rate. That's why awareness—and action—are key.

Monthly self-breast exams are a simple and effective way to detect

changes early. Get to know the look and feel of your breasts so you can notice anything unusual. Here's what to look for:

- Lumps or hard knots
- Changes in size or shape
- Dimpling or puckering of the skin
- Nipple discharge or inversion
- Redness, swelling, or pain that doesn't go away



Pick a consistent day each month, maybe on the first day of your cycle or the first of the month—and make it a routine. It only takes a

few minutes, and it could save your life.

If you're over 40, or have a family history of breast cancer, talk to your doctor about scheduling a mammogram. Mammograms can detect cancer long before physical symptoms appear. They're quick, relatively painless, and incredibly effective. If you're under 40 and have risk factors, your healthcare provider may recommend earlier or...



### **PCSO Deputy Update**

While the MPII News reported last month that MPII would be hiring a full-time Pasco County Sheriff Office (PCSO) deputy, either jointly with MPI or on our own, circumstances changed after our newsletter went to print. We apologize for the unintended inaccuracies, but deadlines passed before new information was made available to our MPII CDD Board of Supervisors.

What changed? First, MPI's CDD Board decided that they definitely did not want to participate, which would have split the cost of hiring our own deputy. Secondly, a Corporal with PCSO made us aware of a previously not considered option. The PCSO offers a program where the CDD can hire otherwise off-duty

deputies on a per-hour basis.

So, with MPI not participating, our CDD Board has opted to pursue this program on our own. The good news is, the PCSO deputies that we hire (one at a time) can do more than the current Florida Highway Patrol officers can do (MPII has been hiring them for several years now). Plus, the hourly rate for the PCSO program is lower than the FHP rate.

The result is that we will spend less money than we would have even if MPI had split the cost with us. Plus, the deputy will be able to enforce traffic laws (speeding, etc.), as well as handle illegal parking, and can even patrol within the gated villages. Additionally, they will be present within MPII far more often than PCSO deputies currently are.

And, since we are not doing this in conjunction with MPI, when the deputy is on duty, they will only be in our community.

So, it is a different plan than we reported last month, but it will still greatly increase safety within MPII by enforcing traffic laws, being a community presence, and enforcing parking issues. All this will be accomplished while spending less money than we would have with the previous plan.

As always, if you have any questions or concerns, attending CDD meetings (held the first and third Wednesday of each month at 6:30 pm in the Clubhouse) is the best way to stay informed about the goings on in your community and have your voice heard by the Board of Supervisors.

### **Agronomy Report Meadow Point II Sept. 2025**

Throughout last month and during this month our agronomy team has reported several positive changes in the landscape. However, Turf weeds and fungus remain our concern as outbursts due to recent high humidity and rainfall have affected application windows and added growth favoring conditions. Understand that as we transition into fall and rainfall totals recede, we will be able to be more aggressive with turf weed treatments. During this process it may cause localized areas of temporary phototoxicity but will flush out with healthy new growth.

#### **Services Completed:**

- Pro-active Turf Fungicide treatments of any St. Augustine that is beginning to show signs of root rot. (Primarily on Beardsley Rd.) This area is a prime candidate for aeration services.
- Ornamentals treated for Fungus such as root-rot and leaf spot/scorch.
- Turf weed treatments as needed focusing on Nut sedge and grassy weeds
- Blanket granular slow release fert for all Ornamentals and palms

#### **Future Services:**

- Continued spot treatments of turf and ornamental insect/disease
- More frequent and aggressive turf weed treatments
- Blanket granular slow-release fert application for all Turf
- Blanket granular pre-emergent for all turf
- Routine treatments for all Annuals fert/fungicide/insecticide.
