

Important Information About Your Drinking Water

Riverwood Community Development District Drinking Water System

SITUATION

The Riverwood Community Development District public drinking water system failed to perform quarterly compliance monitoring for the Disinfection Byproducts of Total Trihalomethanes (TTHMs) and Haloacetic Acids (HAA5s), during the second week (between days 8-14) of November 2020, in accordance with Rule 62-550.514, Florida Administrative Code, and our current, Department approved, Stage 2 sampling plan.

HEALTH EFFECTS

We are required to monitor your drinking water for specific contaminants on a regular basis. Results of regular monitoring are an indicator of whether or not your drinking water meets health standards. During the second week of November 2020, we did not perform monitoring for Total Trihalomethanes or Haloacetic Acids, and therefore cannot be sure of the quality of your drinking water (with respect to these contaminants) during that time.

WHAT SHOULD CUSTOMERS DO?

Our water system did not perform appropriate monitoring for TTHMs or HAA5s during the second week of November 2020. However, we did perform appropriate monitoring for TTHMs and HAA5s on August 12, 2020, and the laboratory analyses results for these samples indicated that the Locational Running Annual Average concentrations of TTHMs and HAA5s were both well below the Maximum Contaminant Levels.

Therefore, at this time, customers need not take any action or seek an alternate water supply.

WHAT IS BEING DONE ?

In order to return to compliance, our water system will be required to notify the public of the monitoring violations by no later than April 8, 2021, via this notice, and then return to quarterly monitoring for TTHMs and HAA5s during the second week (between days 8-14) of February 2021.
