Curriculum Map: Comprehensive I English Cochranton Junior-Senior High School English

Course Description: This course is the first of a series of courses designed for students who are not planning a four-year college career after high school, but who may be considering a two-year program or a technical school. Students will cover the aspects of reading, writing, listening, and speaking. *Romeo and Juliet* will be read as an introduction to Shakespeare. American and World Literature will be examined. Technology will be incorporated with the research project.

<u>Unit Title:</u> Short story
