In the fall of 2019, the Illinois State Board of Education (ISBE) released the school report cards. Schools in Illinois can receive a rating of exemplary, commendable, underperforming, or lowest-performing on the report card. The ISBE looks at several indicators that are weighted to determine a school's rating. The academic indicators are proficiency and growth in English Language Arts and math, English learner proficiency, and graduation rates. The student quality/student success indicators are chronic absenteeism, 9th grade on

target to graduate, climate survey, and college and career readiness.

CUSD 201 is excited to report that Westmont High School has achieved the highest rating and has been designated as exemplary for the second year in a row. Manning, Miller, and Westmont Junior High were all designated as commendable for the second year in a row. Overall, CUSD 201 schools outperform most schools in the State.

In addition, Westmont High School was named as one of three finalists for the DuFour Award. The DuFour Award is given annually to one school in the country. In order to be considered for this honor, schools need to demonstrate a commitment to building a successful professional learning community and have an unwavering commitment to helping students achieve at high levels. School will find out at the end of January if it is this year's Dufour Award winner.

Community Unit School District 201 is in the process of updating and modifying its strategic plan. Stakeholders will have input on the focus and direction of the District. Preschool Screening

f you reside in the attendance boundaries of Community Unit School District 201, and you have a child who is between the ages of three and five, we encourage you to call the Office of Student Services to register your child for preschool screening. Our next screening event for the 2020-2021 school year is March 19, 2020.

While screening is not a requirement for admission into kindergarten, the screening process can provide information to families regarding early development and school readiness. On the day of the screening, children are asked to participate in various age-appropriate activities related to readiness concepts, speech and language, and motor skills. As the children are engaged in the screening

components, parents have the opportunity to meet with members of the preschool staff for individualized interviews and to address any questions or concerns.

"A Night with Temple Grandin" fosters student growth

hroughout the school year, the Student Services team participates in a variety of professional development activities designed to facilitate student growth. Support staff, including social workers, speech therapists, and resource teachers, had the extreme pleasure of attending "A Night with Temple Grandin" as part of the Clare Woods Academy's 50th Anniversary Celebration. Temple Grandin is a professor of animal science and a pioneer in improving the handling and welfare of farm animals. At two years of age, Temple had no speech and signs of severe autism. Speech therapy intervention and hard work enabled Temple to produce speech.

We had the unique opportunity to listen to Temple describe her own experiences growing up and how she was able to develop the skills needed to be an independent adult. Members of the audience shared difficult experiences about themselves or client cases. This not only provided exceptional insight into the autistic



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mind, but allowed us to think about alternative strategies and interventions to use. This was a fantastic professional growth experience for all involved.

Kindergarten Registration

Registration in CUSD 201 for incoming kindergarten students for the 2020-2021 school year will take place at both J.T. Manning Elementary School and C.E. Miller Elementary School beginning Tuesday, March 10, through Friday, March 13, Monday, March 16,

and Tuesday, March 17, 2020, 9:00 a.m. to 11:00 a.m. and 1:00 p.m. to 3:00 p.m. CUSD 201 offers a full-day Kindergarten



program at both Manning and Miller, as well as a full day Bilingual Kindergarten program (housed at Miller Elementary for all district kindergarten students). State law requires that the child must be five years of age on or before September 1, 2020. In order to be

> admitted to kindergarten, we must have a notarized copy of your child's birth certificate with the embossed seal. Hospital birth certificates are not acceptable.

As our district and individual schools continue to respond to a growing need to embed social and emotional learning into our school days, teachers have tried new ideas. Manning and Miller adopted the 2nd Step Curriculum two years ago. This curriculum provides weekly lessons that focus on kindness, empathy, problem-solving, etc. In addition to this curriculum, teachers have tried different approaches to have students reflect on their emotional growth. For some, they do a quick check-in with their emotions; for others, they participate in class meetings and discussions. Classrooms are becoming equipped with tools and strategies to help students regulate their emotions throughout the day. As educators, we strive to be responsive to our students' needs and proactive in helping them to reach their potential.

The disability that Melody and I have affects our bodies, but not necessarily our minds. Just because people are in wheelchairs or cannot talk doesn't mean they are not intelligent." rom kindergarten to fifth grade, each dual language classroom was alive with activity, and the walls were adorned with student work in both English and Spanish, as well as an American flag next to a picture of Frida Kahlo in one room. Picture books in English and Spanish fill the bookshelves of the younger grades, and the students take deep pride in showing off their language skills. From spending time in the Dual Language Program at Miller Elementary in Westmont, it is clear that the teachers and leaders of the school are engaging their students in much more than just curriculum.

Ms. Moller, the Assistant Principal, who is also bilingual, stated that the Dual Language Program has grown into a program at the forefront of other programs. "We are raising the banner of biliteracy and bilingualism, and as a new administrator, I am excited to see all that has already happened in six years. We are already rolling out programs to the junior high."

As an administrator, Ms. Moller hopes to create a vision about the great things students can do with their bilingual education, to help teachers grow professionally in the teaching of Spanish, and to help more parents and students see the value and assets of bilingualism. "The district has a goal to graduate students from high school with the "seal of biliteracy," so that they can get college credit for language competency. This will set them apart from monolingual students."

Students were eager to share why they love being a part of the Dual Language Program. Third grader Maxwell said, "I think it is so cool because we go to Mexico for summer break, and now I can talk to the people there." Fourth grader Zohanna shared, "What I like most about dual language is learning to write in Spanish!"

Emelia, another fourth grader, added, "Plus, we get to make Spanish projects!" Giovanni said, "I really like learning to speak more than one language."

Third grader Robin said, "I think it is really important to learn other languages to be able to help someone if they need something." Abigail, a fourth grader, added, "I like to translate!"

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WJHS: Learning from the power of story in 7th Grade Literacy Class

Seventh graders in Mrs. Poloncsik's classes at Westmont Junior High School have been immersing themselves in the narratives of refugees from different periods in history through reading the book "Refugee" by Alan Gratz.

As the students read the novel, they wrestled with trying to understand the varying historical contexts and what it would mean to leave home. Students learned about the UNHCR and the process for gaining "refugee status," as well as several historical changes to the laws since the Refugee Act of 1980 that allowed for a systemic process by which persons with refugee designations are admitted to a country

Westmont H.S. Receives Biggest Honor in its History

Westmont High School has received the biggest honor in our history, and on January 30 in Phoenix, Arizona, there may be even better news. Westmont has been chosen as one of three schools in the country as a finalist for the DuFour Award that recognizes the best Professional Learning Community in the United States. This award brings with it the largest cash prize for a school in the country (\$25,000), but more importantly, this honor clearly states that we have one of the best schools in the nation.

The selection process was most rigorous and involved several stages. There are approximately 132,000 schools in America and it is estimated that over 30,000 call themselves Professional Learning Communities. Of these schools, 278 have earned the distinction of being named a National Model PLC. Westmont was required to submit years of student achievement data to be named a National Model PLC. Only the 278 schools that have been named a National Model PLC can be considered for the award that recognizes the best in the nation. We have been selected as one of three finalists. A panel of 10 of the best educational leaders in the nation selected the finalists and the winner after reviewing the extensive applications and significant student achievement and performance information.

For the National PLC Summit/Conference on January 30, close to 2,000 educational leaders from all over the United States and the world will be present. At this conference we will be recognized as a finalist, and then they will name the winner as the Best Professional Learning Community in the United States. *Continued*

After we were selected as a National Model School, we were required to submit 27 500-word essays explaining how we made real progress, as well as explain all of our successful programs and procedures to improve student learning and achievement. We were also asked to submit years of student performance information and create a five-minute video that provided an overview of our work.
