How can a parent review these materials?</p>	<p>North Carolina details the standards for each course of study for which students must learn and be responsible for demonstrating proficiency. Teachers are responsible for including these standards in lesson plans each day and to provide ongoing assessment to determine student achievement related to the standards. <p>How will a parent learn about my child’s progress in school or with a class?</p>	<p>The McDowell County School System communicates students' progress through various channels, including quarterly report cards, progress reports, and feedback on assignments/tests, including conducting evaluations. Information regarding assessments and the evaluation of student progress in McDowell County Schools is available through the following links:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ● Evaluation of Student Progress ● Students At-Risk of Academic Failure ● Testing and Assessment Program <p>Local Assessments: Quarterly report cards detailing grades and attendance are distributed, with specific quarter-end dates outlined in the school calendar. Parents can access attendance, grades, and testing information through the Infinite Campus Parent Portal using their login credentials. For assistance with Infinite Campus access, parents can contact the school data manager.</p> <p>State Assessments: Individual Student Reports for end-of-grade/course tests and state assessments (including the English language proficiency assessment) are accessible in Infinite Campus.</p> <p>In North Carolina, students undergo end-of-grade assessments in reading and math in grades 3-8, and in science in grades 5 and 8. High school students take end-of-course assessments in English II,</p>

	<p>Biology, NC Math 1, and NC Math 3. Grade 10 students take the Pre-ACT, grade 11 students take the ACT, and grade 12 CTE Concentrators take ACT WorkKeys, with results shared by ACT.</p> <p>For kindergarten through third-grade students experiencing reading difficulties, an Individual Reading Plan (IRP) is developed that features specific home-use strategies. The plans are shared through North Carolina’s Department of Public Instruction (NCDPI)-selected mCLASS DIBELS® 8th Edition, a literacy assessment aligned with the Science of Reading. mCLASS results are included with the report card three times a year, corresponding with the first, second, and fourth marking periods.</p>
<p>What are the qualifications of my child’s teachers?</p>	<p>Parents/guardians may look up a teacher’s licensure status through the NC Public Schools licensure site, found at this link. Please note this site does not provide personal information about teachers.</p> <p>Parents/guardians are encouraged to contact their child’s principal if they have additional questions about teacher qualifications.</p> <p>In Title I schools, a staff qualifications letter is a federal requirement for Title I schools, and is sent at the beginning of the school year regarding parents' rights to request and be provided with the information regarding the qualifications of their child’s classroom teacher and paraprofessionals. This letter is a federal requirement for Title I schools. The letter includes:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ● Whether the teacher has met the state qualifications for the grade levels and subject areas in which the teacher provides instruction; ● Whether the teacher is teaching under an emergency or other provisional status through which the state qualifications have been waived; ● What baccalaureate degrees have been earned by the teacher, along with the field of study and any other certifications; ● Whether your child is provided services by paraprofessionals and, if so, their qualifications; and ● Whether your child has received four weeks or more of instruction by a non highly qualified teacher. <p>Please contact the Office of Human Resources at 828-652-4535 with any questions regarding an educator’s licensure status.</p>

<p>How can a parent help their child learn and make progress?</p>	<p>Active involvement in your child's education is crucial for their learning journey. Regularly ask your child about their school day, discussing the topics and assignments they are currently working on.</p> <p>Connect with their teachers to gain insights into your child's progress and inquire about ways to support their learning. Attend various school events to stay connected and learn more about how to assist your child.</p> <p>If possible, create a dedicated home space for homework and studying, and encourage a reading culture by modeling reading behavior. Discuss your child's progress and efforts, being an engaged participant in their education. Maintain open communication with your child's teacher and keep a diverse range of books at home to encourage reading at different levels.</p> <p>Utilize local resources such as homework assistance and refer to parent guides for academic standards. <p>What services are available for parents and their children?</p>	<p>Family Literacy Services: Literacy at Home: The Digital Children’s Reading Initiative, developed by NCDPI, presents literacy activities tailored to each grade level, spanning from pre-kindergarten through fifth grade. Mentoring: Mentoring services are accessible at specific schools. Parents can get in touch with their child’s school to learn more about these services.</p> <p>Tutoring: NCVPS EdVantage Tutoring offers virtual statewide wraparound support to middle and high school students in NC public schools. Tutoring is available in Math, Science, and ELA and is offered via a personalized partnership with district/school leadership to best meet the needs of selected students each semester.</p> <p>College Planning: We partner with the College Foundation of North Carolina (CFNC) to help students and families prepare for life after high school. CFNC provides college planning workshops at our high schools that cover topics such as exploring college options, completing college applications, and understanding financial aid.</p> <p>Families also receive support and information about completing the FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid), which is an important step in applying for grants, scholarships, work-study programs, and student loans.</p> <p>In addition, students and families learn about NC College Connect, a program that helps eligible seniors connect with participating North Carolina colleges and universities and explore opportunities for admission.</p> <p>Our goal is to ensure that every student and family has the information and resources needed to make informed decisions about college and career pathways.</p>

Career Development Plan for Students

A Career Development Plan (CDP) helps students focus on and shape their career goals. It starts in middle school and grows with them through high school. Each year, students review and update their CDP to keep it valid. A CDP is helpful because it gives students a clear plan and helps them make informed choices about their future. In our district, there are the following programs available that are more rigorous and challenging than the standard content for students:

Academically and/or Intellectually Gifted (AIG):

In NC, school districts must identify and serve academically or intellectually gifted (AIG) K-12 students. These are students who are performing or have the potential of performing at high levels of accomplishment in intellectual and/or specific academic areas, such as reading and/or math, compared with other students of their age or in their grade level, experience, or environment. The McDowell County Schools Local AIG Plan outlines specific opportunities for differentiated, rigorous instruction and accelerated programs. You can find the plan by clicking

In McDowell County Schools, students are often provided the following services:
(*adapt as needed*)

- Differentiated curriculum and instruction with flexible student groups;
- Accelerated opportunities (subject and/or grade acceleration, credit by demonstrated mastery (CDM), AP, and dual enrollment courses);
- Enrichment experiences, which may be during the school day or beyond, and maybe within the regular calendar year or may include summer opportunities; and
- Other opportunities for extension of the content standard.

AIG personnel may provide AIG students services or within the regular classroom by teachers trained to meet the needs of gifted students.

Honors Level Courses:

In McDowell County Schools, students have access to a variety of honors-level courses in high school. These courses are available in the course catalog located at your child's school.

Honors-level courses typically have a faster pace than standard-level courses. They offer additional rigor, complexity, and creativity than standard-level courses.

Career and College Promise (CCP):

McDowell County Schools partners with McDowell Technical Community College to offer dual enrollment opportunities through the CCP program. If your high school student qualifies, students may earn high school credit by completing community college coursework.

CCP courses may be taken in the College Transfer or Career and Technical Education pathway. These courses count for both high school and college credit. Tuition is free for families.

CIHS/Early College:

McDowell County Schools also partners with McDowell Technical Community College to offer

McDowell Academy for Innovation and McDowell Early College.

McDowell Academy for Innovation and McDowell Early College are choice schools for students and families. It is an opportunity for the students to earn both a high school diploma and an associate's degree and/or CTE credentials at the same time. Students can stay for an additional fifth year to complete their credentials before graduating from high school.

Advanced Placement (AP) Courses:

Advanced Placement (AP) is a program developed by the College Board to offer college-level curricula and examinations to high school students.

In NC, 40 Advanced Placement courses are offered in public high schools. McDowell High School offers 13 AP courses.

As stated in [State Board policy](#), several AP courses satisfy NC students' graduation requirements.

AP exams are free for NC public high school students enrolled in these courses. If a student registers for an exam late, a late fee will apply.

Colleges and universities may likely offer college credit for these courses if your child scores a 3 or above on the exam. All of the colleges in the UNC System offer credit.

	<p>in 2007 with a strong commitment to ensuring quality education for all students, regardless of location, NCVPS has over 16 years of experience serving diverse learners.</p> <p>Students may enroll in NCVPS courses for a variety of reasons. Work with your school counselor if you are interested in taking NCVPS courses.</p> <p>Credit by Demonstrated Mastery (CDM): McDowell County Schools offers opportunities for students to earn credit for a high school course without enrolling in the course. All high school courses, with a few exceptions noted by the state, are available for students to try CDM. State and local tax dollars are the primary funding sources for charter schools, which have open enrollment and cannot discriminate in admissions, associate with any religion or religious group, or charge tuition. Influenza can cause fever, sore throat, chills, coughs, headache, and muscle aches. A yearly vaccination is available.</p> <p>Meningococcal disease is a serious illness caused by bacteria. It is an infection of the brain and spinal cord coverings that can cause blood infections. The vaccine is required for individuals entering 7th grade or by the age of 12.</p>

Service Fees

Mental health agencies provide outpatient therapy and bill the student's insurance for all services rendered. Providers will verify insurance benefits and review all projected fees with the guardian before any services occur.
