Research shows that when families and schools form a strong team, kids are the real winners. They learn more and do better in school.

School has been underway for a couple months, so it's time to make sure you are doing all you can to build a homeschool team. Answer yes or no to the questions below:

The Basics of Title I Schools

This program, which is now the pillar of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act (ESEA), is the oldest and largest federally funded education program, according to the U.S. Department of Education. It dates from 1965 and its main purpose has been to help children meet challenging state academic standards

The purpose:

- Provide students with extra instructional support beyond the regular classroom to help children meet state standards in core academic subjects.
- Coordinate and integrate resources and services from federal, state, and local sources. To be considered for title I school funds, at least 40% of the students must be considered low-income.
- Students do NOT have to be from low-income families.
- Measure student progress to determine the success of the Title I program.

LITERACY CORNER

Howdy Friends,

Last month, Reader reminded us to look for books and reminded us of the importance of having books in our home library.

I am excited to share another great literacy habit.

Letter \mathbb{I} of LITERACY is for "Interact".

From the ages of 0 to 5, children naturally start interacting with adults through babbling, gesturing, and facial expressions. This develops vital language, cognitive, and social skills.

Interactions between a child and an adult can be like playing a game of tennis in which one player serves the ball and the other returns. In tennis, the players become better with more practice. You are helping your child grow and develop the more you practice providing positive responses to his "serve".

When adults do not respond to a child or if a child spends too much time watching to shows or videos, this can interrupt literacy and language development. Children need frequent face-to-face interactions with you.

More Fun Ways to Interact through Serve and Return:

- · Read a book: Stop and Talk about the story
- Board Games like Candy Land or Chutes and Ladders
- Knock Knock Jokes or Riddles
- Tic-Tac-Toe or "taking turns" games



- 3. What is your favorite color?



Baby Signs: Sign Language for hearing babies and toddlers

Give Hearing Babies and toddlers a way to communicate before they can talk.

Learn sings to use with your child in daily routines to help you child express needs, thoughts, and feelings. Strengthen your parent-child bond. Reduce frustration for you and your child. Increase your child's verbal skills by connecting sings with words. Baby sings is based on American Sign Language with 'baby friendly' modifications. This program is backed by two decades of research.

Book Studies:

We offer various book studies by esteemed authors. Some of the books are The Anxious Generation, What Happened to you, It's their world, teens, screens, and the science of adolescence, The Whole-Brain Child, Positive Discipline, and more. Each book offers an insight into parenting and child-rearing.

Parents Forever:

Whether you are married and seeking a divorce or never married and separating, the impact on your child(ren) can be significant. Parents want to do their best to minimize the negative impact and keep their children from conflict between adults. This class covers three main topics; taking care of yourself, taking care of your children, and being successful with coparenting. Parents will discover how all three work together to strengthen family well-being.

Basic Beginnings:

Are you a new or expecting parent?
This class will provide activities,
demonstrations, discussions, and
instruction on the basics of baby care.
Topics include loving and nurturing your
baby, safety and health, play, reading,
sleeping and feeding, and calming and
comforting your child. In addition, learn
about managing stress and building a
support system for parents and babies.

Love and Logic:

Love and logic offers three different classes. Parenting the love and logic, Adults supporting youth with challenging pasts (trauma informed-care), and supporting youth with special needs. Each offers a way of parenting that uses nurture, care, and logical consequences.

Positive Discipline:

This interactive class offers discussion and practical activities that will help you discover what children are really thinking, feeling, and deciding based on your parenting methods. Discover how using firmness and kindness increases mutual respect. Learn how effective communication, problem solving skills, and a focus on solutions over consequences can build self-esteem and empower families.
