


Madison's Positivity Project: Building Strengths and Community

Last year, Madison piloted the Positivity Project (P2), a program that teaches students the *Other People Matter Mindset* and 24 character strengths such as creativity, gratitude, curiosity, kindness, and teamwork. The pilot was a success, leading the District to adopt P2 school-wide this year.

Over the summer, a P2 Leadership Committee (right) planned monthly pep rallies, school-wide service projects and supports for teachers. With full implementation now underway, students are showing stronger relationships, improved social-emotional skills, increased confidence and better academic engagement. Staff report a shared language and unified culture, increased positivity and morale, stronger relationships with students and meaningful professional growth.



PreK–12 lessons include stories, quotes and activities related to the character strength of the week. “These lessons lend themselves to thoughtful conversations and often connect naturally within our ELA or math lessons. For example, students may recognize character strengths in a book’s character or notice that they need to use perseverance to work through a challenging math problem. These strengths become part of their everyday vocabulary and a source of growth as learners,” said Amanda Rotach, Coordinator of Curriculum. Key strengths that stand out this year include self-control, teamwork and kindness, all of which are showing up in classroom discussions and academic work. “The most rewarding part of this journey has been watching students discover their own strengths and use them to overcome challenges. The Positivity Project is truly helping

our school grow—and reminding us every day that *Other People Matter*,” said Project Coordinator and fourth-grade teacher Sabrina Denton.



Elementary Students Shine with Colgate Reads!



Thanks to the Colgate Reads program, Madison's second- and third-grade students receive weekly one-on-one reading support from Colgate University mentors. Run through Colgate's COVE and based on the America Reads model, the program has grown from a pilot into a lasting tradition that builds reading skills, confidence and a love of learning. Teachers say students view their tutors as mentors and role models, helping them take risks and grow as readers.

"Our students look up to their Colgate tutors as big brothers, sisters and mentors — someone they're excited to spend time with," said second-grade teacher Tina

Bergeron. "The program builds confidence so that readers are more willing to take risks when reading and decoding multisyllabic words."

This partnership not only boosts literacy but also fosters meaningful connections between Madison's elementary students and their college mentors — a true example of the power of community and collaboration.

Several Madison educators had a meaningful impact on my life. Mr. Carvell recognized how I learned best and helped me build confidence. Mr. DelMedico gave me the accountability I needed my senior year and Mr. Moses had a way of reminding me—often with humor—that I could do better. Their belief in me made a lasting difference.

Some of my favorite memories include Mrs. McCredy's imaginative fourth grade "trip to Florida," traveling with band and FFA and the unforgettable pep rally when we learned the proposed merger with Stockbridge had been voted down. The pride of being Blue Devils filled the gym.

SKILLS OR HABITS THAT HELPED YOU SUCCEED

I was always a go getter. Even though I may have had some hurdles that others did not have, I did not let that stop me. There may have been times that I took the long way around, but I always got to where I wanted to get. Being from Madison helped me recognize the importance of my community and sticking together when you needed to. When you can't do it alone, ask someone for support. That's how I survived! Oh, and I can back up a boat down a ramp in 10 seconds. My husband can't even do that! Thanks to Mr. Osterhout and our FFA tractor driving backwards lessons.

ADVICE FOR STUDENTS WHO ARE UNSURE OF NEXT STEPS

High School can be very hard. It's a time in life when you are measuring yourself up against your peers and no one else may even understand what's going on in your life at home. Hang in there and believe in yourself. You do not need to have all the answers about life yet. Start with things you enjoy. There IS something that YOU are really good at even when you struggle in other areas. Start with the win. Feel great and then start to test yourself in the areas you'd like to improve. Don't worry about how long your process takes to get to where you want to be. All that matters is that you're on your way. I never, ever imagined that I would be where I am now. But here I am. A lawyer with a business on the side. It took me a non-traditional path to get here but my seat at the table is as good as anyone else's. I wish that kind of success for you. Oh, and take time with your mentors. Once you find yourself in a place you are enjoying, pay attention to who seems really, really good at it. Hang with them! Challenge yourself by paying attention to the greats. Not the ones who "talk" about being great. The ones who are out there getting their hands dirty in the work you're trying to learn. Those will be the most important people in your career. Know about them and care about them.

I was active in soccer, softball, basketball, cheerleading my senior year, band, marching band, chamber music, jazz band, FFA, SADD (Students Against Drunk Driving) and ski club.

When I returned, I attended Mohawk Valley Community College, where I earned an associate's degree in Human Services. My journey then took me just outside Oslo, Norway, where I lived for two years before eventually returning to Utica.

In 2012, I completed my bachelor's degree at SUNY IT (now SUNY Poly) in Interdisciplinary Studies with concentrations in History, Technology and Globalization. In December 2024, I fulfilled a lifelong dream by earning my Juris Doctorate from Albany Law School—officially adding "lawyer" to my toolbox.

CHALLENGES THAT SHAPED ME

High school was a very challenging time for me. I really struggled with ADHD in standardized education. I grew up in a single-parent household. I was truly raised by a village—friends, teammates' families and educators who stepped in when I needed support. A few teachers took the time to hold me accountable while also reminding me of my potential, and those moments stayed with me long after graduation.

CAREER & ACCOMPLISHMENTS

Today, I wear two hats. In 2017, I created Unstoppable You LLC, where I work as an emotional intelligence coach supporting individuals, families and corporate teams across the country. After graduating law school, I accepted a position with the Oneida County Public Defender's Office as a law associate while awaiting admission to the New York State Bar.

One of my proudest accomplishments was commuting 90 miles each way to Albany Law School for three years while balancing family life. Walking across that stage was a moment I'll never forget. I'm also incredibly proud of the people my children are becoming and the values of service and community we share.
