From the Pastor's Desk

As the brilliant autumn leaves fall to the ground and turn to brown, this is naturally a season to reflect on life, on our human mortality, and oftentimes revisit the grief of loved ones who have passed. It can also be a time to receive the consolation of the truth of the Gospel by going deeper in our understanding of Church teaching, especially regarding the "four last things": death, judgment, hell, and heaven.

In the Catholic liturgical year the month of November is dedicated to the Holy Souls. This past week we celebrated the feast of All Souls; likely an experience in which we confront the pain of physical separation from our loved ones that comes with death. This pain gives rise to grief, which can manifest in sadness, anger, or fear. All very natural. As Christians, there is also a supernatural dimension to everything, including grief. Saint Paul reminds us of this in the second reading this Sunday from his first letter to the Thessalonians: "We do not want you to be unaware, brothers and sisters, about those who have fallen asleep, so that you may not grieve like the rest, who have no hope."

Following Saint Paul, a number of saints and Christian writers have expounded upon this reality. Among them, Granger Westberg in his book *Good Grief*. I first read this book while doing a summer internship in the chaplain's office of Twin Towers Senior Living Community. It was also the first summer after I lost my Mom to cancer. Needless to say, the Lord led me to the place I needed to be to walk more fruitfully and faithfully with Him and others through the grief journey. As Catholics we might see such moments as our more personal participation in the Way of the Cross.

In Good Grief, the author reflects on the quoted passage from Saint Paul, to "not grieve like the rest, who have no hope." Westberg notes that sometimes in Christianity we can get the impression or be told outright that since Jesus is Risen then we shouldn't grieve. This is not what Saint Paul says. We still experience grief. As human beings, in fact, we must experience it. Grief is still part of a Christian's life. However, since we know the Risen Lord, there is a dimension for Christians not found in worldly ways of grief. Simply put, the promise of the Resurrection gives us hope!

"Hope is the theological virtue by which we desire the kingdom of heaven and eternal life as our happiness, placing our trust in Christ's promises and relying not on our own strength, but on the help of the grace of the Holy Spirit" (Catechism #1817). Hope comes from God, a fruit of the Holy Spirit. If in our grief we do not feel hopeful, we turn to God and ask for hope. We plunge into prayer to place ourselves in a position to be filled with this hope from God. We pray the Stations of the Cross or the Rosary or the Divine Mercy chaplet to connect with the life and promises of Jesus. We take frequent refuge in the sacraments, especially the Real Presence of Jesus in the Eucharist.

Mindful participation in Mass immerses us in the great reservoir of Christian hope. Through this intentional entrance into the paschal mystery we are opened more to the hope of forgiveness and reconciliation, the hope of the resurrection of the dead, and the unseen glory of eternal life with those we love gathered around the throne, singing Holy, Holy, Holy Lord God of hosts. We die to self so as to come alive in Christ, through whom we may be reunited one day with those who have gone before us. Jesus, you are our hope!



"Building Our Community" 2020-2021 Nativity Annual Fund kicks off this week:

The "Building Our Community" 2020-2021 Annual Fund kicks off this week with the goal of raising \$100,000 to establish a COVID Relief Fund to provide for unexpected expenses in the school due to the pandemic; to install technology in

the church to allow for live-streaming of Mass and other sacramental celebrations; and to install a fire detection system in the parish office building. In addition, \$10,000 will be added to the School Education Fund, which helps provide tuition aid to families in need. Also, \$5,000 will be allocated to be shared between our St. Vincent de Paul and The Caring Place, a first-time annual fund priority to help our neighbors in the community. Within a few days, all Nativity families should receive a mailing regarding the specifics of the 2020-2021 campaign. Calling on Compassionate Co-workers in

Bereavement: "Blessed are those who mourn, for they will be comforted." In the Beatitudes from his Sermon on the Mount, Jesus invites his disciples to accompany those who are grieving. To pray for the living and the dead is a spiritual work of mercy. To bury the dead is a corporal work of mercy. If you desire to extend the mercy of Jesus into the world, consider becoming part of the Bereavement Team at Nativity of Our Lord parish.

There are three parts to this ministry in the parish:

- 1. Assist families in preparing the funeral liturgy;
- 2. Be present during the liturgy to walk with the family in whatever might be needed (e.g., bringing up the gifts, finding the place in the lectionary for the reading, etc.);
- 3. Help with the optional luncheon afterward. Due to COVID, Nativity is not hosting luncheons at the moment. The more immediate need is for generous disciples to offer their time and talent to help families prepare for and walk together through the funeral liturgy.

A good fit for this volunteer opportunity is someone with a flexible schedule, a gentle presence, and a prayerful spirit during Mass. The parish provides booklets and training to equip volunteers to help the family prepare the funeral liturgy. Contact Sr. Janet for more information.
