The annual awards are presented to the best and brightest high school students in the northeastern Ohio region, with the top three students receiving cash awards and the top

ten students receiving a personalized copy of the Handbook of Chemistry and Physics.

Sponsored by the Lubrizol Corporation, the contest is open to all high school students in Lake County. Applicants must be a full time student in grades 9-12, submit a letter of recommendation from their science teacher or Science Olympiad coach, and write an essay about their chemistry education and their science-based career path. Cash prizes are awarded for the three best applicants as decided by the NEOACS Executive Committee:

- \$600 for first place
- \$300 for second place
- \$200 for third place

Next. prescribed training program is implemented, which can be of varying lengths depending upon the student's needs. After the employability skills training the student is ready and prepared for participation in the internship knowledge experience. Career and skills have been strategically imbedded into the training program to prepare students for a successful career experience. A shadowing experience is a short term observation of a career of interest, while an internship is a longer term (3, 6, 9, or 12 week) learning experience

for preparation for a professional career. An apprenticeship is also a longer term learning experience to prepare for a trade or vocational job.

A brochure about work-based learning experiences options is available on the Perry Schools website (www.perry-lake.org); however, students can also arrange or get assistance to arrange other options as well. Students can obtain high school credit for their participation by completing a credit flex application available in the guidance office.

The goal of Perry Local Schools' work-based learning program is to advance college and career-bound students' academic, intellectual, technical, and personal skills. SUMMER STRETCH 2014!

Research shows that engaging the brain throughout summer leads to less regression in learning for the coming fall. Perry instructors will return this summer to provide irresistibly engaging courses for students during Summer STRETCH 2014. Thanks to 21st Century Community Learning Centers (CCLC) federal grant awarded at PMS and PHS, we are able to host summer enrichment and academic intervention on campus during summer 2014, at greatly reduced fees to our families.

Perry High School Summer STRETCH offerings include: Game Design, Perry TLC – Teens Leading Change, OGT (Ohio Graduation Test) Prep, and Credit Recovery.

Perry Middle School Summer STRETCH offerings include: iArt, 100 Book Reading Challenge, Mathematics, Place-based Science, Social Studies Problem-Based Learning, Let's Move (Personal fitness, water safety), and Pinterest from Recyclables.

Perry Elementary Summer STRETCH offerings include: TGRG – Third Grade Reading Guarantee,

Pre K-Pre 4th math/literacy camps, Let's Move (Personal fitness, water safety), and Pinterest from Recyclables.

Ohio's Next Generation Assessments

Beginning 2014-15 in grades 3-8, Ohio assessments will be largely computer-based. Perry continues to use teacher, district and state achievement results as part of our measures for identifying each student for optimal learning.

Computer-based assessment items include:

Evidence Based Responses (ESBR)
- multiple choice with more than
one possible correct answer paired
with "evidence" in a constructed
written response

Technology Enhanced Constructed Response (TECR) - students select words or phrases in reading passages that is evidence to develop a text based argument or extended response. Students drag and drop words or data, make a model, run simulations to develop a larger answer.

Prose Constructed Response (PCR) - response is based on multiple text passages (synthesize thoughts across several passages); requires students to go back in the text to analyze, synthesize, argue and enter responses using keyboarding as well as demonstrate other interactivity with technology.



1:1 Computing – In April, the BOE gave the Perry MS Technology Committee the green light to move forward with a proposal for 1:1 computing at PMS. This group has

worked very hard to collect parent insight, student opinions, research to make this decision for our students. Our proposal – branded #1:WorldLearning (because our students will have access to worldwide learning opportunities) is the capstone to the district's technology plan for the future. Each student will be provided with training access to a Google Chrome Book for their duration at Perry Middle School. Teaching staff will also be provided guided professional development in the integration of these devices into their classroom instructional strategies.

We believe, that as time progresses, our students, through these devices, will improve their literacy skillscontinued on page 7

FINDING BALANCE

Technology is an integral part of a student's life and learning. The goal of a course that I recently completed at Lake Erie College, The Emotional Impact of Technology on Students and their Significant Others, was to explore the effect of technology on face to face communication. In an attempt to find balance in methods of communication including text, e-mail, cell phone, land line telephone, Skype, and face to face, we research current trends related to technology. It cannot be an all or nothing proposition. As stated in the book Raising Generation Tech by Jim Taylor (2012), "To bury our heads in the sand would be irresponsible at best and catastrophic



at worst. We must recognize there are heightened dangers and heightened opportunities this crazy new world has to offer" (pg. 19, Taylor J. 2012). Technology is neither bad nor good. Taylor states, "We cannot easily label this influence as 'good' or 'bad', 'healthy' or 'unhealthy'.

There are, however, four questions to help determine the degree of influence that the popular culture and technology have on children and whether that influence is constructive or detrimental:

- 1. How often are your children exposed to popular culture and immersed in technology?
- 2. What is the quality of content to which they are exposed?
- 3. To what degree do you provide limits and guidance in your children's interaction in popular culture and technology?
- 4. How much counterbalancing exposure do your children get from positive influences and experiences?" (pg. 10, Taylor, J. 2012)

Balance really is the key. As a parent, you have a great deal of

In most cases, but not all, parents pay for the cell phone, high speed internet, and cable television. Therefore, you "do" have the final say when it comes to technology.

In my research I found the vast majority of those under the age of 35 prefer to communicate via text. By all means use that as one method of communication, but it is unreasonable and unhealthy to constantly text your children. When they need to work out a non-life threatening problem, allow them to work it out, and yes...fail from time to time. We learn from small failures. The one really pleasant finding was that almost all people, regardless of age, will respond to a call either by text or voice. Almost all will not avoid a call altogether. Another fairly obvious finding was, the younger you are, the more time you spend in front of a screen.

We, as parents, have a great influence on our children. Our main role is to help them find "Balance".

PERRY ROBOTICS TEAM COMPETES AT WORLDS

The Perry High School Robotics teams have been very successful this year.

The VEX Team qualified for a trip to the 2014 VEX Robotics World Championship in Anaheim, CA. this past April. The VEX World Championship brought together 760 teams from every state and over 26 countries. The Perry Robotics Team was in the Arts Division and placed 60th in their division.

Teams score points in a game called VEX Toss UP, by moving balls around a 12'x12' field during an autonomous period followed by driver-controlled play.

In Dayton, last month, the Lego Teams took first, second, best in show and best presentation, in the Regional Mini-Urban Challenge, earning a paid trip to the Nationals in June.

The Mini-Urban Challenge is a national competition that challenges high school students to design and operate an autonomous "car" using a LEGO® Mindstorms® kit, to successfully navigate through a model city.

The teams are now focused on building their robots for next year, in hopes of making it back to the World Championship!

(reading and writing), increase their achievement, and become more independent in their learning. Specific communication regarding this initiative will be sent out in our summer "News & Notes".

Fifth Grade Orientation to PMS: later in May, 4th grade students from Perry Elementary School will be visiting us as part 1 of their orientation to the middle school. Students will be visited by PMS students in their homerooms for a short presentation on middle school
