Helping students develop socialemotional skills goes a long way toward ensuring success in career and LIFE. Practicing self-regulation, navigating peer relationships, dealing with stress, managing emotions when disappointments happen, and persisting in the face of setbacks are all necessary life skills. They also contribute to academic success. The short- and long-term benefits of nurturing social-emotional learning have been well-researched and the

evidence continues to build at a time when we are identifying and responding to the mental health needs of our youth. One of two main instructional priorities at Perry is culture with a focus on social-emotional learning (SEL). This year we have worked to make the focus on SEL more strategic and intentional districtwide by not only modeling and teaching a foundation and common language for self-management through the Perry Culture Playbook, but also identifying early warning signs in our youth so needs can be more readily addressed. Through surveying our students on their social-emotional competencies, we can gain a good understanding of each student's sense of belonging, relationships, and self-management skills. This information and actionable reports help educators support students' wellbeing.

COMING SOON: During the week of March 9 - 13, 2020, Perry students in grades 3-12 will survey their SEL competencies and perceptions of school culture by taking a 15 minute, research-based survey by Panorama Ed. Should you have any questions or need additional information, please don't hesitate to contact me or your school's assistant principal. Our response as a district to better understand and serve the identified social-emotional needs of our students generally falls into three levels of support:

	Tier I Support	Foundational social-emotional teaching and learning for all students (e.g., Perry Culture Playbook, school guidance plan)
	Tier II Support	Targeted interventions based on student needs (e.g., small group development, restorative circles, adult mentors, personalized scheduling)
	Tier III Support	Targeted intervention with greater frequency, duration, and progress monitoring (counseling, greater access to community resources and a cross-team response)

Supporting student social-emotional learning calls on many adults—from teachers to lunchroom staff to after school partners. For these reasons, it's critically important that school-wide SEL intentionally nurtures a work environment in which staff feel supported and empowered to make positive connections with students and personalized learning a school-wide priority.

Lake County Joint Financing District Levy

While Perry Schools has not had an operating levy since 1976, we are a member of the Joint Financing District which does have a renewal levy on the March 17th ballot. Formed back in 1990, the Joint Financing District is made up of the Madison, Painesville City, Perry, and Riverside schools allowing neighboring districts to benefit from the high property wealth of the Perry Nuclear Power Plant. To accomplish this, a levy that generates approximately \$6.7 million was first passed in November of 1990 and has been renewed every five years since. The local revenue that is generated from residents stays with each district. This ensures that Perry schools will always retain 100% of the revenue that



our resident taxpayers generate. The tax revenue received from the power plant has always been distributed out to all the joint financing district schools on a per pupil basis, but due to the devaluation of the plant and the changing economic conditions, the revenue will now be distributed based on each member district's proportionate share of tax valuation. If renewed, Perry Schools will receive approximately \$1.1 million annually for the next five years, which is an increase from the \$843,158 collected last year, and the levy will NOT increase taxes.

It is also important to understand that, since this levy originated before 2013, it does qualify for rollbacks from the state of Ohio. The rollbacks include a 10% non-business credit and a 2.5% owner occupied credit. In short, to pass a new levy or a replacement levy at the same millage rate in 2020, a homeowner would be required to pay 12.5% more to generate the same revenue.

The levy was first approved at 4.9 mills and is now collecting at 2.28 mills. Currently, it costs residential taxpayers \$69.74/year per \$100,000 of valuation according to the Lake County Auditor's office. The ESC of the Western Reserve, previously known as the Lake



County Educational Service Center, serves as the fiscal agent and distributes the proceeds from the levy to each school district. The proceeds received from this levy are used for operations of instructional programs related to English, Math, Science, Social Studies, and other instructional areas.

I hope this information offers clarity, helping you feel confident as you cast your ballot. Also watch for a levy mailer being sent out soon by the Joint Financing District. Please be sure to vote on March 17th.

- 4/1 Letter of Intent due to Guidance Office
- 4/7 CCP Lakeland Community College New Student Orientation at PHS
- 4/15 Deadline to apply for classes on Lake Erie College Campus
- 5/1 Deadline to apply for KSU Ashtabula for Fall 2020
- Register for and take Accuplacer. ACT score of 18 in English and 21 in Math replaces the requirement to take the Accuplacer.

• 6/1 - After acceptance, students must make an appointment with a college advisor to register. (Courses fill up and you can be shut out)

*If you fail a course or drop after the drop date, you are responsible for the cost of the course.

A new course option at Perry High School is a personalization of learning through the Design Learning process. It is vital for high school students to build communication, collaboration, creative problem solving, and critical thinking skills.

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Derry Elementary School is taking a new, research-validated approach to spelling and word study this school year. We are teaching and guiding students to study, notice, and grow theories about how words are constructed. This approach aims to remove the isolation of spelling instruction by embedding and connecting it to authentic reading and writing purposes. After all, learning about the spelling and make-up of words is a tool for readers and writers; therefore, we want to move away from isolated memorization and embed this work in relevant and meaningful ways. Through discovery and practice, students will develop and grow theories about the encoding (spelling) of words, as well as grow a large bank of strategies for use. Our ultimate goal is for students to grow in their expertise and understanding of how words work and to build a repertoire of word-solving strategies that students can pull on with independence when reading and writing for a variety of purposes.

Our teachers spend quality professional learning time focusing on this new approach, working closely with our literacy specialist to

create lessons and teach new strategies to our students. Since implementation of this new approach, we have observed

our students become inquisitive about words, holding discussions about what they notice, and talking more in depth about the patterns they see and use in their reading and writing. As part of our professional development, we have enjoyed observing one another teach and having our literacy specialist alongside us to provide feedback and next steps for future instructional applications.

To support our work at home, please encourage your child to be curious about words as they read (reading through the lens of phonics) and share with you what patterns and theories they are growing about words in school. Students should pull on their growing expertise as they tackle words in their writing – thinking about what they know and trying the spelling of words based on this.

We look forward to continuing our study around this new, research-validated approach and having our students become true word experts.
