Student and Staff Safety #1 Priority

Warmest greetings to all of you. Current events remind us that the safety of students and staff needs to continue to be our number 1 priority. We remain perplexed as to why horrific occurrences such as school shootings continue to happen at what seems to be an ever-increasing rate. For this reason and others, school safety is always at the forefront of our thinking. Even so, when senseless acts



of violence take place, new levels of apprehension and fear are still triggered. As a result, we struggle even more with thoughts of whether we are doing enough to protect our students. Truth be told, we can never do enough. While we have taken numerous steps to ensure our school remains a safe place to learn and grow, we will never be satisfied and will forever strive to improve. Despite these efforts, we understand the safety of our students cannot be 100% guaranteed. This fact weighs heavily on all of us.

I am so appreciative of the work of our staff and Safety Committee who do all they can to ensure the safety of students and staff. Comprised of first responders, board members, safety forces, and other stakeholders, the Safety Committee has been meeting regularly for years to review safety protocols, help plan training, schedule events, and relentlessly look for opportunities to get better. Below are just a few of the measures we have put in place over the years.

- Identification badges are worn by all adults in the building
- Increased the number of full-time resource officers on campus
- Acquisition of Captain, our narcotic/service dog, and training for the handler
- Expanded regular drills to include a weeklong training in September to prepare for a variety of different evacuation and lockdown levels
- Inside and outside surveillance present throughout the district (will be updated in 2023)
- Blue lights installed on the outside of all buildings that flash during lockdowns to inform the public
- Supplemental door locking devices installed in classrooms for shelter in place
- A Mobile Crisis Manager App implemented/downloaded on cell phones for quick access
- Installation of access control system at all main entrances with cameras and buzz-in system
- Staff participation in multiple ALICE (Alert Lockdown Inform Counter Evacuate) trainings
- Implementation of the Safer Ohio School Tip Line
- Go Guardian internet filter, monitoring, and notification system used on school-issued devices

This past school year, simulations were added to our ALICE staff training. While going through scenarios was difficult at times, this additional step did much to improve our preparedness. Safety forces trainers did a fantastic job providing us with useful tools in the event an active shooter emerges on campus; tools we pray we never have to utilize. As a result of feedback from this training, more than 70 of our classrooms will have a designated evacuation window. On September 12th Officer Patti, who led our ALICE training this past year, will return and begin our safety week by presenting to the PHS and PMS students and staff.

Every school year provides an copportunity for our students to take part in a journey from August through May that is both uniquely

individualized yet supported by the school and local community in Perry. We are fortunate to have many great partners to provide opportunities for exploration for our students in an area of potential future careers.

One of the unique individualized opportunities comes from our Learning Through Internship course. Students spend two days a week in class developing specific career focused skills that will be vital to their future. The lessons in the classroom are geared towards communication, teamwork, and problem solving as

interns process their internship experience. The other three days are spent on site diving into the work and learning more about the specific career the student is interested in.

This past year, 38 juniors and seniors registered for this class which took them beyond the walls of Perry High School. These students were willing to take a risk and try something new. They received individual guidance from our instructor, Rita Soeder, as they explored their YouScience results and considered their aptitudes and interest. These intake conversations led to personalized internship experiences with business partners ranging from University Hospitals to the Western Lake County Chamber of Commerce.

Our students begin their internship experience long before the bell rings through interviews,

intake, assessments, and conversation. Each experience is unique and designed to be transformational. According to Mrs. Soeder, "Students should transform and gain personal insights as a result of their experiences. Even if a student leaves the class knowing exactly what they do not want to do when they graduate from high school, that's valuable learning."

Our interns logged nearly 2,000 hours this year. Collectively they worked through a self-discovery module where they began to answer the questions "who am I" and "what do I do well." Students have the opportunity to explore college and career options with time that is set aside to do this research. Additionally, students develop resumes that are ready to use for summer jobs and college applications. They participate in the Mock Interview Day where they really put their interview skills to the test.

During those 2,000 hours, interns have:

- Collaborated in a design process for new homes being built by Jemm Construction
- Sanitized dental equipment at Macy Family Dentistry
- Stocked patient rooms on the Same Day Surgery floor at TriPoint
- Observed court cases at the Painesville Municipal Courthouse
- Achieved specific industry credentials and are now licensed State Testing Nursing Assistants (STNA) or Ground Drone Pilots.

Initially, it's not easy to be the only teenager in the room, but our interns are intentionally taught to build relationships and earn the trust of their supervisors which leads to a greater level of

engagement. Our interns have a voice at the table and are part of the team.

As we look to the 22-23 school year, we have close to 60 interns representing a wide variety of interests and potential career fields. While leaving campus, traveling to a business site, and stepping outside of one's comfort zone isn't easy, our interns overwhelmingly say it's worth it! They finish the class with a clearer vision for their futures and the start of a professional network they can turn to in the future.

to our students. We are committed to ensuring that the CAL environment will be available in all four of our grade levels in a variety of core content areas. Our team will be not only working collaboratively with each other to implement and improve their practice this year, they will also be coordinating with staff experts for college/career readiness and instructional literacy. We are also excited about the relationship forged this spring with the Institute for Personalized Learning and the resources they can provide. We were able to take two of our team members



to Wisconsin in April to attend a workshop that included visits to schools that are excelling at this work.

Authentic Learning will also become a focus for our work as a school this upcoming school year. Our students will have the ability to take classes where CAL drives the learning






Schools Align to the Needs of Tomorrow - the Perry Experience

District and school leadership have never been more important than today.

Of the career readiness skills employers deemed as essential (source: National Association of Colleges and Employers, Dec. 2021), the four most essential employability skills for US students upon graduation are described as follows:

Ask most students. Students say learning is most powerful when it's solving real issues alongside community experts and coached by teachers. Equally important is that adults in our schools are "champions" for each learner, understanding how school is working for individuals and when to redesign instruction and personalize opportunities.

Student employability skills soar when opportunities are in place to frequently hear from community experts and teachers find opportunity to "posture the learning" around the needs of today's learners. Our community's voice and aspirations for real-world learning was evident when over 152 Perry community members attended the Construction House Flip Ribbon Cutting on June 8 - a project in which 100% of all supplies and services for this house were funded by federal/state grant awards instead of using the district's general fund.

Perry Elementary, Middle, and High School remain on a path to intentionally design classroom spaces, learning, pacing, and

access so students acquire key life and employability skills as well as develop civic, intellectual, and financially ready lives. In essence, we want to ensure each student becomes the BEST VERSION of themselves through the Perry experience. Parents and families, this means we need your engagement, questions, and partnership to build the Perry Experience for your child. Help us make it extraordinary by seeking opportunities for your child(ren) to include:

- Ask: What type of classroom environment fits your child best? Review the scheduling options for students at each school. If you cannot locate the registration options, call a principal or guidance counselor or me.

The most important action any of us can take to keep us safe is to alert a person in charge if you ever see or hear something that is unsettling or doesn't seem quite right. We are now registered with The Ohio School Safety Center (OSSC) to utilize the Safer Ohio School Tip Line, a free resource available to Ohio schools. This system allows students and adults to anonymously share information via phone and text with school officials and law enforcement about threats to student safety. The system is available 24/7/365 by text and phone at 844-SaferOH (844-723-3764) and is answered by analysts within Ohio Homeland Security who immediately forward the information to school officials, law enforcement agencies, and the OSSC. The OSSC partners with the Ohio Department of Education to ensure the incident is investigated, action is taken, and resources/supports are provided when necessary.

As our work to become better every day continues, I wish you a relaxing and fun rest of the summer.
