School Attendance Makes a Difference

Your high expectations make a positive difference in your child's academic success. Another basic yet important way to make a difference in your child's education is to make sure he or she attends school regularly and on time.

Children don't do as well in school when they frequently miss part of or an entire school day. You can help your child succeed in school by understanding how schools define absences. You can also help by learning ways to support your child's school attendance.

Unexcused Absences

An unexcused absence is when children miss school for reasons not accepted by the school. Some reasons for an unexcused absence are:

- Vacation
- Staying home to take care of or visit with family members
- Missing the school bus
- Sleeping too late

Please note that your child is not exempt from any missed work when they have an unexcused absence. It is his/her responsibility to get any work missed from their teacher.

Late Arrival

All students are expected to be seated in homeroom at 8:05 a.m. A doctor's appointment or a bus problem are acceptable excused tardies. All other reasons will be considered unexcused. Exceptions must be approved by the principal. To assist students and parents in correcting this problem, a sequence of escalating interventions is followed after three unexcused tardies. These range from calls home, parent letters and conferences at school, detentions, tardy contracts, and possible legal action against the parents.

Excused Absences

Schools know children have valid reasons to be absent. This is called an excused absence. Parents must tell the school when their child is going to be absent. This makes it an excused absence. Some reasons for an excused absence are:

- Child's illness or injury
- Family emergency
- Death of a family member
- Doctor or dental appointments that cannot be scheduled before or after school hours
- Religious holidays

When your child is absent with a valid reason:

- Contact the school office or the attendance line on the day of the absence at **847-318-4215**. Contact the school as early as possible. Give your child's name, homeroom, date of the absence and reason for the absence. Tell the school when you think your child will return.
- Contact the school to request homework before 8:30 a.m. after your child has been sick for two or more days. Please call the front office when making a homework request or leave your request on the attendance line.

Just a reminder that P.E. classes will be outside until the end of October.


Students are welcome to bring sweatshirts and sweatpants to wear over their gym uniforms. Students can store them in their PE locker for the chilly days ahead.
