

School Closing Guidelines Winter 2016-17

Wind-chill is a key factor in our closing guidelines.

District 64 coordinates guidelines with other elementary and high school districts in our community (62, 63, 79 and 207). The Superintendents work together on closing decisions for severe weather-related conditions or other emergency situations.

Safety is our priority

Our first priority is the safety of students and staff. At the same time, we know that closings create child care and work schedule problems for families. Districts understand that individual views of weather-related closings vary, and that not everyone will always agree with district decisions. For many reasons, we prefer to keep schools open. In deciding, Superintendents consult with local municipal departments and use National Weather Service data. Some factors we consider include:

- safety of students and staff
- severity of weather (extreme cold, flooding, etc.)
- timing of the weather
- ability of vehicles to travel safely and ability of students to walk to and from school safely
- operable condition of our buildings and ability to maintain safe conditions around the buildings, sidewalks and parking lots



Wind-chill is a key factor

Wind-chill notices from the National Weather Service are the primary meteorological source to determine and declare weather conditions, such as snow forecasts, wind-chill advisory, or wind-chill warning.


- Advisory Schools will be <u>in session</u> when a wind-chill advisory is issued. A wind-chill advisory is typically issued when the wind chill is -20 degrees F or colder. The weather during a wind-chill advisory is not life threatening, but presents conditions that may result in inconvenience or pose moderate risk to safety.
- Warning In contrast, schools will be <u>closed</u> under the condition of a wind-chill warning, which indicates life-threatening conditions and a risk to safety exists. Measures should be taken to safeguard life and property immediately. A wind-chill warning is typically issued when the wind-chill will be -30 degrees F or colder OR the actual temperature is -15 degrees F or colder.

How we inform parents and staff of closings

When a decision is made to cancel school, parents and staff can expect to receive an automated phone call and email. It is the parent's responsibility to provide up-to-date contact information and/or preferences to the school office. School closing decisions will usually be made by 6:00 a.m. This allows Superintendents to monitor weather overnight and avoid unnecessary closures. Weather closing information also is available through: District 64 and school websites; recorded on District and school phone messages; www.emergencyclosingcenter.com; and broadcast on TV and radio stations.

Your family situation. . .

Any decision to cancel school or alter the school day is based on general safety conditions for all students and staff. Districts know that conditions may vary for each student or family. If, in the event of severe weather when schools are open, you feel it is unsafe to send your student to school, please contact the school office.

Are you an aspiring young author ready to share your work with others? The Young Authors Contest is an <u>independent</u>, <u>voluntary</u> at-home project for students interested in writing and publishing their work for others to read. One winner from each grade level will be selected to represent District 64 at the <u>Illinois State Young Authors Conference</u> in May 2017! See below for details.

- Maximum of <u>two authors/illustrators</u> per manuscript (must be in same grade & school). Students can only collaborate on one manuscript.
- Written piece must be an <u>original fiction short story</u>—maximum 20 pages, no poetry, no graphic novels, no nonfiction/informational text.
- <u>Illustrations</u> may be used to enhance the story.
- Content must be <u>appropriate</u> for peer audience.
- K-2 students may hand in a <u>handwritten</u> story.
 - Dictated books may be typed or handwritten by an adult, but the story must remain in the student's own language.
- $\bullet \quad 3^{\rm rd}$ $8^{\rm th}$ grade students must hand in a <code>typewritten</code> manuscript.
- Students must complete their manuscripts <u>without any teacher input</u>.
- Manuscript must have a <u>substantial cover (like a report cover)</u> with $8 \% \times 11$ paper securely attached.
- <u>Cover Page</u> must include: Title, author's name, grade level, school, homeroom number, optional: illustration.

Manuscripts that do not meet these requirements will be <u>returned to the</u> author.

December 22, 2016--Guidelines shared in School Newsletters! It's not to early to start writing!

Friday, February 10–All manuscripts collected at the buildings.

Friday, March 3—Winning building manuscripts (1 per grade level) delivered to district level coordinator.

Week of March 13 — District winners are announced and invited to State Young Authors Conference & May School Board meeting.



(It is clear what this piece is about; writing fully communicates ideas and shows sustained thought)

(Writing shows individual expression and/or creativity)

Ideas fully communicated

(One idea flows logically into the next)

Length is appropriate to the piece (not too long, not too short)—maximum 20 pages
