Springing into third trimester!

Our third trimester is already underway and we are heading to Daylight Saving Time on the 13th -- spring must be near! This month, I want to update you on the first projects coming forward from the Health/Life Safety survey and new <u>Master Facilities</u> <u>Plan</u> completed in late spring 2015. Providing safe, secure learning spaces that support 21st century learners is one of the six objectives within our new <u>2020 Vision Strategic</u> <u>Plan</u>, and has been a major focus of our Board of Education agendas since August.

► First facilities projects OK'd - The Board approved contracts on March 3 for \$2.2 million in roofing work to be completed at six schools and the District office this summer. Roofs at Field and Emerson are not in need of immediate repair, allowing the schools to host our Worlds of Wonder summer program. In addition, the Board rejected bids to replace windows at Lincoln Middle School, as

recommended by our construction managers. The bids were judged not a good value at this time, as window manufacturers are backlogged and demand for summer projects drives prices up making the bid environment less competitive. We are working with our construction managers/architect team to determine how soon the project can be rebid; window replacement could begin in the fall.

▶ More facilities decisions on March 21 - The Board also thoroughly reviewed construction bids for other summer work, including creating secured vestibules at all buildings and completing critical infrastructure repairs. The Board will further discuss and take action on the recommended projects at the regular Monday, March 21 Board meeting (7:00 p.m., Lincoln gym). Base bids were organized by school, which will give the Board flexibility in its decision-making to consider approving work at one or more buildings in 2016 or in future years. This approach also allows the District to select the combination of low bidders for each base bid to yield the lowest possible project cost and best value. The Board has discussed a wide range of options that it could approve, such as: moving forward with secured vestibules and infrastructure work at all schools in summer 2016 or in stages; doing vestibules at some schools and only infrastructure work at others this summer; or doing only critical infrastructure work in 2016. The total project cost to complete all work in 2016 would be \$12.9 million, which includes the \$2.2 million of approved roofing.

Lincoln Middle School on track to surpass \$200,000 with 3rd event

Students at Lincoln are in the midst of their third, record-setting drive to help the St. Baldrick's Foundation end childhood cancers. Lincoln's previous drives raised a combined \$135,000,

and students are already over \$61,000 in pledges toward their \$75,000 goal for 2016 -- pushing them close to the \$200,000 mark! The school schedules the event on a three-year cycle, so every Lincoln student can experience it once. Their efforts will culminate in a "head-shaving frenzy" on Friday, March 18! More than 500 Lincoln and Emerson students came together on a cold Friday evening at Emerson for this year's intensive, engaging POWER workshop, which develops leadership skills and promotes healthy choices for 8th graders as they prepare to head into high school. Bringing together middle school youth, community members, middle school staff, and high school student leaders, students develop trusting relationships and develop a framework to understand themselves and

others. POWER also promotes responsible decision-making by helping students develop skills to build healthy peer relationships and resist negative peer pressure. As their T-shirts proclaim, POWER is a "high voltage" experience!

Carpenter School's "dig-a-well" fundraiser springs from unique sibling link

Coinciding with *Read Across America* Week, Carpenter students gathered pledges for their at home read-a-thon with a goal of raising \$15,000 to dig a well in Ethiopia. The project was inspired by 5th grade teacher Becky Keenan and her brother, Dr. Jeremy Keenan, who is the lead researcher in a study of the eyesight disease, trachoma, in Ethiopia. Carpenter students learned that clean water is one of the simplest ways to save the eyesight of children in developing countries. <u>Carpenter's 5th graders prepared a video</u> to share their findings with the school. Donations are still being accepted toward their ambitious goal! Providing clean water to children and families in Africa is also the focus of in-depth service learning units at our two middle schools each spring, helping expand their understanding as global citizens.


"Walk & Talk" visits show students are thriving



research and displays. Students also began this week using new stainless steel flatware in their lunchroom. Lincoln's *"Don't Pitch It - Wash It"* green initiative will reduce waste by replacing disposable utensils. The school's student Green Team is masterminding the effort, which is funded by a \$2,500 competitive grant awarded by the Solid Waste Agency of Northern Cook County (SWANCC).

District Happenings

PARCC testing will be conducted April 11-22

District 64 students in grades 3-8 will take the PARCC tests in April in English Language Arts and Math. The state assessments have been revised, and total time for most students will be reduced by 90 minutes. In preparation, students are being given an opportunity to learn how to navigate the tools within the computer-based test environment. They also



will be taking at least one practice ELA assessment and one practice Math assessment, so they feel comfortable with the test procedure and timing. As always, the best preparation for the PARCC has been the quality instruction our teachers have provided this school year. However, there are things you can also do to promote your child's success, such as making sure your child gets a good night's sleep and eats a healthy breakfast before each day of testing, and that your child comes to school with a fully charged Chromebook.

Elementary school survey on hot lunch program coming soon!

District 64 has been working with the elementary school PTO/As to consider a proposal to bring a daily hot lunch program to all five schools beginning with the 2016-17 school year. A link to a survey about your interest in purchasing hot lunch for your student will be emailed to elementary families shortly. Please let us know your thoughts on whether this service would be valuable to your family. Currently, only District 64 middle school students have a daily hot lunch program.



Resident priority registration for summer

program ends April 15 Resident priority registration for the 2016 Worlds of Wonder summer program will extend through Friday, April 15. Tuition of \$125 per class program will extend through Friday, April 15. Tuition of \$125 per class per session will increase after that date. Register via the summer school page of

the District 64 website. Our popular summer program offers students a unique opportunity for summer learning and fun. Worlds of Wonder classes emphasize creativity and critical thinking in a challenging and rewarding environment. Students in grades K-3 will attend at Field School, while students in grades 4-7 will be at Emerson Middle School. The program will include two, 14-day sessions: Tuesday, June 7 -Friday, June 24 and Monday, June 27 - Friday, July 15 (no school July 4).

Consider leaving "smart" watches at home

District 64 policy requires students to keep cell phones and other electronic devices powered off and put away in their lockers during the school day. This is a reminder that "smart" watches, such as the Apple watch, are included within this Policy 7:190, and therefore, students will be asked to remove and store the watch in their locker during the school day. Please consider having your child leave this expensive valuable at home, rather than keeping it in their locker during school hours. Also keep in mind that elementary lockers are never locked.

2016-17 REGISTRATION NEWS:

Kindergarten/new students now underway - Registration for new kindergarten and transfer students entering in August 2016 is now underway, with pre-enrollment through the District 64 website Registration page. > New Kindergarten "Roundup" nights added - New this year, all five elementary schools are planning special Kindergarten Roundup evenings in mid-April for parents and incoming kindergarten students to visit the school and bring in remaining required documents. Roosevelt and Washington will be on Monday, April 18; Carpenter on Tuesday, April 19; and Field and Franklin on Thursday, April 21. The office will be open from 5:30-6 p.m. for parents with questions or who need assistance with the registration process, or to drop off a birth certificate and complete the Home Language Survey. The roundup will be from 6:00-7:00 p.m. for parents and students, and will include an orientation with the principal and teachers and a kindergarten classroom visit. Franklin's evening will begin and end a half-hour earlier. Parents are strongly encouraged to complete the pre-enrollment process before attending a Roundup. > Returning student registration begins April 25 - All returning students will again be required to provide proof of residency within District 64. New this year, families will be able to upload scans of their residency documents (in PDF form) during the annual Infosnap registration process, which will get underway on April 25. More information will be provided in coming weeks.

Services staff will custom-fit your new helmet to each child or adult. Helmets are certified by the Consumer Product Safety Commission and designed to meet or exceed safety standards. Remember, District 64 policy requires students to wear helmets while riding and/or using bicycles, roller blades, scooters, skate boards and similar devices while going from home to school, while on school property, and while going from school back home/their destination.
