Our teachers had the opportunity at our August Institute Day to hear from a protege of Dr. Carol Dweck, a leading researcher in this field, on how to incorporate this growth mindset in their classrooms. Her work explores the impact that *focusing on a child's effort* in solving difficult challenges yields a far more positive response than praising them on how smart they are for having solved a difficult challenge. New parent resources from Stanford University offer a series of mini-lessons and activities for you to explore what a growth mindset is, why it's important, and how you can support your child at home in developing this mindset, too. # District Happenings

#### Safe, Warm and Dry is the priority

#### Board to vote Nov. 16 on secured entries, facility projects for summer 2016

As you know, we have been working to prioritize the needs identified in the recently completed 10-year Health Life Safety (HLS) survey and Master Facilities Plan (MFP) prepared by FGM Architects. Focusing first on proposed projects for summer 2016, our Board of Education this fall has spent many hours reviewing suggested designs, and analyzing budgets and financing options. Two proposals are being considered that would impact the daily home of our almost 5,000 students and staff members.

#### Secured entries for <u>all</u> schools: \$5.1 million

The proposal is to add secured entries and renovate adjacent offices at all eight of our schools and the District's administrative office. The design provides layers of security to delay intruders from entering or to keep other types of unauthorized visitors from gaining access to staff or students. The design includes recommendations from the U.S. Department of Homeland Security, the Illinois Emergency Management Agency, and input and review by Park Ridge First Responders. Although the design at each school varies, all schools would have consistent features. Small entry additions are planned for the District's three oldest schools dating to 1928 -- Lincoln, Roosevelt and Field. Offices will be modified at the other schools to provide better access to the existing main entries. Secure entries are intended not just to provide a layer of security for violent "shooter" incidents, but also for the ongoing, daily needs at our buildings with the steady influx of parents and visitors. Our principals shared examples with the Board on November 5 of challenging experiences that occur routinely, which secured entries would better contain and manage. Secured entries have become very commonplace in schools across the country and are already installed at schools throughout our north suburban area. Our educational program also would benefit from this **work:** Improved conference space for teachers to meet with parents or for



teams of teachers to work collaboratively to plan instruction. Direct access for sick children to the health office. Efficient access to teacher work room/copy center. Restoring grade level clusters (at some schools, because of where the office is relocating) to improve the educational environment for students and teachers. All school building entries will be ADA accessible.

#### Critical Health Life Safety/Infrastructure Projects: \$8.1 million

The new HLS/MFP identified many other projects needed to keep the schools safe, warm and dry. Urgent work recommended for summer 2016 includes: ► **Roofing** totaling \$5.7 million for all schools except Emerson and Field, which are conducting summer school in 2016. ► **Restoring the "envelope" of the schools** totaling almost \$2.4 million primarily for replacing or sealing windows, repairing crumbling brick, and adding exterior security lighting.

#### Funding options for summer 2016 and future years being reviewed

We have been working with the Board this fall to identify funding options for facility needs, including spending some of the District's existing fund balance possibly in combination with bonds. Funding options for future HLS/MFP work in 2017 and beyond also are being reviewed. Further information about the <u>Master Facilities Plan and funding options</u> is available on the website. Guided by the Master Facilities Plan, we believe these proposed investments for *Safe, Warm and Dry* infrastructure work will offer a thoughtful, long-term solution to meet the needs of our students and staff. ► The November 16 **Board meeting is at 7:00 p.m. at Franklin School (gym), 2401 Manor Lane, Park Ridge.** Board meetings are open to the public; an opportunity for public comment is always included. <u>Meeting reports and videos also are available on our website</u>.

# Out & About in Our Schools

**Lincoln granted \$2,500 for "Don't Pitch It - Wash It" green initiative** Lincoln Middle School has won a \$2,500 grant from the Solid Waste Agency of Northern Cook County

(SWANCC) to reduce waste in the lunchroom by replacing disposable utensils with stainless steel flatware. The grant will fund Lincoln's "*Don't Pitch It -- Wash It*" initiative to purchase reusable silverware, storage/ display holders for the lunch line, and related items. Lincoln's Green Team student club members will be the leaders in the lunchroom, working with the lunchroom staff and staff supervisors to encourage all

students to not "pitch it," but "wash it." The school is planning to have specific places at each table to put the used silverware to make it easy to collect, and also is streamlining the way students will be dismissed to recycle and dispose of their lunch waste before heading outside to recess. Lincoln expects to reduce lunch waste considerably by this school-wide campaign.

#### **MUSICAL NOTES: Students selected as region's best musicians**

The top band, orchestra and jazz musicians from our middle schools have been selected to participate at two 2015 regional events sponsored annually by the Illinois Music Educators Association (ILMEA). #### **TECH TALK:** Students pioneer Google "Expeditions" virtual field trips

Students at four of our schools had the opportunity this fall to take virtual reality field trips via Google's <u>"Expeditions"</u> <u>Pioneer Program</u>. Elementary students at Carpenter, Franklin and Roosevelt as well as Emerson's middle schoolers enjoyed the 20-minute virtual reality trips guided by their teachers. Teachers and our Instructional Technology Coaches selected the destinations best aligned with our curriculum from among Google's offerings. Whether visiting Mars and the moon, seeing the Gettysburg battlefield, diving

#### "Walk & Talk" visits find students invested in their learning

My visits in October/November found motivated students learning new things in all areas of our curriculum:



**Carpenter** - It was my pleasure to deliver a special certificate to Mrs. Farrell's 1st grade class, who won the *Masters of Masterpiece* weekly award as part of their "One School, One Book" program. Trivia questions from the chapters of *Masterpiece* being read each week are announced over the loudspeaker. Students bring their answers to the office, and one is selected lottery style. If their answers are correct, that classroom becomes the winner!



**Field** - Kindergartners were working on their reading stamina. Stamina is defined by how many sustained minutes students are able to read. (*Left*) Mrs. Moon's 2nd graders shared stories they wrote. Fourth graders were studying the levels of government.

**Franklin** - (*Right*) A senior volunteer was helping students work individually on *compare* and *contrast*. **Roosevelt** - First graders were reading different versions of the same genre and sharing the differences





they discovered with their reading buddy. (*Left*) Grade 5 was hard at work presenting learning on the American Colonies. **Washington** - Joining with schools across District 64 and the nation, students celebrated Red Ribbon Week in October with the theme: "Respect Yourself. Be Drug Free." Daily activities planned with the PTO's help encouraged students to demonstrate healthy behaviors and celebrate the good choices they make. The students also enjoyed a visit from mascot *Roary* who congratulated students who were rocking their good ROARS behaviors!

**Emerson -** Guitar with Mr. Kennedy had students practicing self-selected songs. *Stairway to Heaven* and *Sweet Caroline* were among a few pieces that students were rehearsing to later play for their classmates.

Lincoln - Student Government is in full swing at Lincoln! I enjoyed participating in an executive board meeting with the four student representatives and both Drs. McLean and Murray. Students brought forth concerns shared by fellow Lions and a lively conversation took place.
Jefferson - Our youngest learners enjoyed their first field trip to The Grove to explore the fall forest and visit the interpretative center to view local wildlife up close.

#### Franklin fall tradition: "literary" pumpkins

Franklin's seventh annual "literary" pumpkin contest received an amazing 67 entries this year (view them all here), which were displayed in the Learning Resource Center. Families worked together at home to decorate a pumpkin based on their favorite book or character. ### Curriculum Corner

#### What do teachers do on Institute Day? They learn and grow!

November 3 was District 64's second Staff Development Day Engaged in the Core of the school year. Quality teachers are critical to student success, and District 64 invests in important professional development opportunities for all staff as part of our continuous improvement philosophy.

We serve a range of learners in our classrooms and our greatest challenge is to customize our instruction so ALL students grow to the next level. Our Staff Development Day sessions helped teachers identify strategies for managing instruction for different learners. With the new Strategic Plan as our road map, here are some of the ways our teachers came together to continue their learning:

#### Our math curriculum is in its third year and we continue to support teachers with this transition. K-5

classroom teachers explored a new model for designing differentiated instruction for students in math. Our middle school teachers focused on the eight standards for "mathematical practice" that describe habits of mind for proficient math students. Understanding and implementing these practices is key to student mastery of the Common Core State Standards. > Science teachers focused on preparing for the new Next Generation Science Standards.

Middle school science teachers deepened their

understanding of the state's new learning goals for science.

### Keeping Kids Active & Classroom

#### Sharing our math teaching strategies nationally

We are very proud that District 64's Middle School Math Department Chairperson Christine Thielen, an 8th grade teacher at Lincoln, presented for the fourth time at the Association for Middle Level Education National Conference this fall. Mrs. Thielen shared some of the classroom activities she and our other math teachers use to fully engage students, such as reminder chants for common math formulas, Matho (a math bingo game), scavenger hunts to find and complete math problems, and interactive Smartboard activities.

The session focused on "scientific practices" as well as and science and engineering tasks. > Social Studies reviewed a new framework. Middle school social studies teachers used the College, Career and Civic Life (C3) Social Studies Framework to broaden their understanding of the new Illinois Learning Standards. **Technology is a continuing focus.** Teachers learned new ways to harness Chromebook technology to support collaborative teacher/student feedback, student work stations, and student selfmonitoring. > Other sessions focused on designing assessments around six quality indicators; working with at-risk learners; and ways to support students with significant behavioral needs.

### State Report Cards on website, Illinois Report Card but test results delayed

In keeping with tradition, the Illinois State Board of Education has released the 2014-15 School Report Cards. However, data from the PARCC assessments data (which replaced the ISAT in spring 2015) is not available yet. The report does present other information about student characteristics, our school programs, and learning conditions. PARCC data is expected to be available later this year.

#### Calendar for 2016-17

The Board is expected to approve a school calendar for the 2016-17 school year on November 16. The adopted version will appear on the <u>Calendar Overview page</u> of the District 64 website.
