

Transition Planning Guide

As you begin to think about your child's future, you want to ask yourself what you see them doing in the next few years. Where will they live? Can they live independently? Where will they work? Where will they make friends and what will they do for fun? There are a number of agencies who can help you plan for their future needs.

- **Contact your local PAS Agency (Pre- Admission Screening) and complete the PUNS questionnaire**

PUNS (Priority Utilization of Needed Services) is the Illinois database of individuals with developmental disabilities and their service needs. Completing the PUNS registers the student as a person potentially in need of services. This does not guarantee funding, but you *must* complete it to be eligible. It is also important that the state know the needs that exist in the community. You can complete the PUNS at any time. The disabilities generally considered for eligibility are Cognitive Disability (Full Scale IQ below 70), Autism, Asperger Disorder, Pervasive Developmental Disability, Cerebral Palsy, Seizure Disorder. Inability to independently complete certain life functions, such as self care and independent living are also considered. The above disabilities need to be established prior to 18 years of age.

- **Apply for Supplemental Security Income (SSI) at age 18:**

SSI is a financial disability benefit your child may be eligible for based on his or her developmental disability. To be eligible for SSI, an individual cannot have more than \$2,000 in personal assets. Though this generally cannot be received before age 18, it is wise to begin accumulating documents in advance. In certain cases SSI can be applied for and benefits received at an earlier age.

- **Apply for Medicaid (once you are approved for SSI):**

Medicaid is used to fund group homes, individual family support services like respite care, and vocational services. An individual can have private insurance and Medicaid.

- **Explore Guardianship Options:**

Many parents feel that they will have to retain guardianship of their children past age 18.

Some agencies that serve the disabled population, such as Seguin, can assist in completing the documents necessary to be filed in court. In this case all the family must cover is a variety of filing fees.

These agencies can also assist in applying for social security, Medicaid, etc.

Many attorneys handle guardianship cases and there are a few attorneys who specialize in guardianship for individuals with developmental disabilities. Though the district does not endorse any particular attorney, a list is available if you request it.

You may also get forms and instructions on applying for guardianship of an adult in the binders located at the Office of the Probate Court Clerk, Room 1202 of the Richard Daley Center at Dearborn and Washington

- **Apply for ADA Paratransit Service:**

Paratransit provides bus services for individuals whose disability prevents them from using regular mass transit.
