# HIGH QUALITY PUBLIC EDUCATION

## Kimberly Area School District is High Achieving and Low-Spending

The Kimberly Area School District (KASD) strives to provide a high-quality education to students while being responsible stewards of taxpayer funds. The community's investment in public education helps the next generation prepare for life after graduation and it also positively impacts property values. Here are a few highlights of how the District is providing the community a strong return on their investment:

- The property tax rate (mill rate) was reduced seven consecutive years.
- Due to being a low-spending district, the state allowed KASD to increase per pupil spending to bring it closer to the state average. The district is now back to the 2010-2011 revenue per pupil.
- Home values remain strong and the real estate market is very competitive in the District.
- Over one million square feet across 21 District facilities is maintained and improved through a 10-year capital improvement plan.
- Due to school closures in the 2019-2020 school year the district reduced costs in the areas of bussing, daily cleaning, and utilities.
- About \$72,000 in the 2019-2020 Budget was spent on various Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) supplies, preparing for the 2020-2021 school year.

We remain hopeful that we can continue to provide innovative opportunities for students through strong enrollment and the changes in state funds that would allow low-spending districts like ours to get closer to the state average.

# **SPRING 2020 - STILL MUCH TO BE PROUD OF**

#### **Successful Moments Amid a Pandemic**

The end of the 2019-2020 school year was anything but routine. In March, Governor Evers ordered the closure of all K-12 Wisconsin schools due to the Coronavirus Disease (COVID-19). Despite the closures, students' needs did not change and in three days the KASD educational program was transformed. Beyond the academic changes, adjustments were also made to mental and behavioral health services in addition to meal services.

Undoubtedly there were challenges, but there is also much to be celebrated. The 2019-2020 accomplishments span from our KASD families, District employees and community members to the students. Although we cannot list each and every standout moment below, are a few notable feats:

#### SENSATIONAL SUCCESSES

#### **Due to COVID Closures**



Transition to virtual learning made in only three days.



Every student and staff member was provided access to necessary technology for virtual learning.



An estimated 1.7 million district emails were sent within the first 30 days of closure, up 83%.



23,332 video meetings held within the first 28 days.



78,000 free meals served.



KHS students took 873 Advanced Placement (AP) Exams and had the District's highest pass rate, earning over \$1 million potential savings for college credit.


## Kimberly High Theatre Program Prepares for Rare Year

As Todd Wegner enters his 17th year of teaching Theatre Arts at Kimberly High School (KHS), he's preparing for a year unlike any other. Since last spring he's become quite familiar with "COVID" related changes. The KHS theatre department has had to grapple with a number of schedule adjustments and cancellations

including the highly anticipated production of Chicago. Nonetheless, the old adage "the show must go on," rings true.

Preparations to return to the stage are already underway. Three cocurricular mainstage productions are scheduled for the 2020-2021 school year. "We had to revise our original show selection to allow for a range of flexibility, '' said Wegner. "The shows selected are written in a way that maximizes social distancing for the actors and allows for separated staging."

All is not solved with the selection of material alone. Planning and considerations will be carefully shaped in every aspect of the production. Auditions, rehearsals, set design, costumes, and opening night will need to be refigured based on current health and safety standards. "Although this year will be unlike any other, students are excited to get back on stage."


