The College Mentor Program is now accepting applications for next year!

Planning on going to college?

The College Mentor Program provides students with one-on-one assistance from a volunteer program mentor who will help seniors navigate the college admissions and financial aid process throughout their senior year.

Students are eligible for the program if:

- They are the first in their immediate family to go to college (besides siblings).
- They will NOT be enrolled in AVID during their senior year.
- They have a cumulative GPA of at least 2.0 and are on track to graduate.

College Mentor Program applications are available in the Counseling Office or in Mrs. Johnson's office in the Career Center.

Attention sophomores and juniors:

In an effort to increase our attendance rates, we are rewarding students who have excellent attendance with the privilege to leave campus during the 2017-2018 school year.

Your eligibility for open campus during the 1st quarter of next year will be based upon your attendance during the 4th quarter of this school year.

Eligibility requirements for open campus for the 2017-2018 school year:

- 1. Must be a junior or senior.***
- 2. Must have 12 or fewer total periods marked as "unexcused" and/or "tardy/late" during the 4th quarter of the 2016-2017 school year.***

Key points to remember:

- 1. If you are more than 10 minutes late to a class, it is marked as an unexcused absence.***
- 2. If you have an excuse for being tardy, you must either show the excuse note to the teacher when entering class or show the attendance office who will give you an "excused" admit slip.***
- 3. If you believe a teacher made a mistake in marking you absent or tardy, you are responsible for talking with the teacher to get a signed note, which you take to the attendance office for clearance.***

Wenatchee High School will be offering summer school for students to retrieve credits. Summer school will run from June 19th to July 7th and will be hosted at Wenatchee High School. The times for summer school are Monday through Friday, 8:30 to 11:30 AM. Applications are located in the counseling office, main office, and Mr. Joya's room (207).
