Teaching and Learning Curriculum Updates

K-5 English Language Arts

We will begin the adoption process for a new English Language Arts program next year. Our new Curriculum Director, Sarah Hanchey will facilitate this process. We also plan to develop English Language Arts assessments that mimic the Smarter Balanced tests and performance tasks for use next year.

K-2 Reading Foundations

K-2 teachers report the Fountas and Pinnell Phonics Lessons is a difficult resource to use due to its organization. In response, the district will compensate K-2 teachers who choose to attend a workshop on June 16, 8:00-3:00, at WHS Commons, to better organize and prepare these materials. If time permits, participants will be given the opportunity to discuss ways to effectively use this instructional resource.

K-2 Writing Curriculum

Implementation of Writing Fundamentals at K-2 has been postponed for a variety of reasons, including several years of a budget crisis, along with competing initiatives. For K-2 grade level teams at each building who would like to access this resource next year, the district will provide materials and training on June 17th.

K-5 Mathematics

There is growing concern the current Bridges adoption does not align to the CCSS in math. In response, elementary staff will implement an interim solution, engage New York, a program that has earned high marks for alignment.

Principals identified teacher representatives from each school to participate on a K-5 Math Steering Committee. These teachers met with coaches recently to identify the modules of engage New York grade levels will implement next year. Most teams agreed to add the new edition of Number Corner as a supplement because it includes games and hands-on activities, while covering some of the standards missing from the selected modules. Training on the interim curriculum will begin during our August 25-26 professional development days and continue throughout next year. The teacher reps on the Steering Committee agreed to assist with the August training.

Middle School Core

Core teachers will be implementing the Springboard revision, which is aligned to the Common Core State Standards in English Language Arts.

Middle School Reading Intervention

Middle schools plan to implement Read 180 as a replacement curriculum for our lowest readers in grades 6 and 7 next year. This well-researched intervention program includes computer adaptive support for students along with teacher instruction.

Middle School Mathematics

Middle school mathematics teachers will also employ engage New York as an interim solution in regular math classes for the first quarter of school next year. Following the first benchmark assessment, teachers will convene to analyze test data and plan next steps. Curriculum in the LAP math classes will vary in different schools until a systemic approach has been identified, researched, and approved.

Our web based career exploration system blends online learning and personalized instruction with innovative tools and real world experiential learning activities that motivate students to explore career pathways.

Wenatchee Learns Connect (WLC) Resources & Services Coming FALL 2014

1. Online Partner portal wenatcheelearns.com

Partner (Volunteer) application system

WLC helps partners/volunteers apply online, maintains the partner/volunteer database and background checking process Available list of partnership opportunities

WLC maintains a list of available partnership/volunteer categories

Partner (Volunteer) database for school staff to post needs and find partners.

WLC provides technical support and portal training for school staff by posting partner/volunteer needs and search for available partners/volunteers.

Business and organization profiles and experiential learning opportunities

WLC helps businesses create detailed profiles about their businesses and offer experiential learning activities (job shadows, internships, project based learning etc.) to share with students and staff.

WLC has a 7-person (tech ready) and 12-person (bring your own tech) conference room available for District use.

Development and cultivation of business partnerships

WLC nurtures existing District relationships and establishes new ones with our business community.

3. Student Career Exploration System - Career Cruising

Training and support for students and staff

WLC is the primary administrator of Career Cruising and manages all staff and student accounts. WLC creates training documents and video tutorials for students and staff to use the system.

Student access to experiential learning opportunities

WLC ensures students have access to experiential learning opportunities in the Career Cruising system.

4. School Sign In – iPad Guest/Partner Check In System

System Oversight and Training

WLC provides system oversight and technical support of the School Sign In application for school staff. WLC creates simple user "how to" documents in English and Spanish for partners.

Partner/Guest (Volunteer/Visitor) sign in and tracking system

WLC provides 17 school sites with iPads, stands, and Sign In applications.

Real time reporting of volunteer hours

WLC provides school staff with on-site access to volunteer hour tracking reports on their designated iPads.

WLC coordinates District level programs and communication such as parent conferences, parent education and trainings and Spanish Radio Station

Remembering

Robert C. "Bob" King

February 9, 1952 ~ April 28, 2014

Bob King was called to heaven after a short, but valiant, battle with pancreatic

cancer on April 28, 2014. After graduating from Wenatchee High School in 1971, Bob joined the U.S. Army, during which time he trained with Special Forces. He was honorably discharged from active duty in 1975. He was stationed at Lawton, OK at the end of his service, and it was there, that he met



and married Charolette Watts in 1975. In 1976, Bob became a police officer for the Lawton Police Department and during the next ten years, worked as a master officer, detective, firearms instructor, sniper and explosive ordnance disposal technician. In the late 1980's, Bob ventured into the world of private security, first with his own security company in Oklahoma, then working for Vance International providing tactical security and executive protection. He later did similar work for SecurCorp.

Bob returned to Wenatchee in the early 1990's and began working for the Wenatchee School District in 1995. He began his time with the District as a school bus driver and, for the last ten years, had been Director of Safety and Security.

Bob was author of "Spooky 8: The Final Mission" published by St. Martins Press. King was also co-author with Jeri Betz (Freimuth) of "Guardians of the Black Sand," and co-founder with Friemuth of Timberwolf Publishing, LLC.

Bob is survived by his wife, Becky of Wenatchee; one son, Brian King of Fremont, CA; his furry kids, Lilly, Luke and Minnie; two brothers, Randy King of Wenatchee, and Dick King and his wife, Jeannie of Wenatchee; one sister, Donna and her husband, Mike of Wenatchee; and six nieces and nephews. He was preceded in death by his parents; and a niece, Nicole Dick.



Michael A. Houston

October 3, 1953 - May 20, 2014.

Michael A. Houston died May 20, 2014 of melanoma cancer. Michael was

born on October 3, 1953 at St. Anthony's Hospital in Pendleton, Oregon. His family moved repeatedly between the time he was 6 and 12. Many good childhood memories were made living in Touchet, Washington for several years, but the family finally settled in Chelan in 1966. Michael lived in Chelan for the next 6 years, graduating from Chelan High School in 1972.



He joined the Army National Guard in September of the same year, specializing in both Wheeled and Tracked Vehicle Maintenance. Michael did his active duty training from January to the end of June 1973; and he continued with the Guard until 1994 when he retired with 22 years of service. Upon his return from active duty in 1973, while working half-time as a custodian, he began attending Wenatchee Valley College. He graduated in 1976 with an Associate of Applied Arts in Automotive Mechanics and 2 years of German language study. Michael attended Bethesda Christian College from 1976 until 1980, studying towards a Bachelor's degree in Theology.

On May 22nd 1981, He married the love of his life, Renee M. Blackman. He began working as a custodian full-time, ending up at Lincoln Elementary in 1983 in Wenatchee. After receiving encouragement from teachers in this school, Michael and his family moved to Ellensburg in 1986, from which they returned in 1989 with a B.A. in Elementary Ed. and a minor in Spanish. He was immediately hired at Lincoln Elementary and continued working there as a 5th grade teacher until his medical leave to fight his cancer.

He is survived by his wife Renee, his five children, and their spouses, Michelle & Zak, Aaron & Sarah, Rebekah, Emilee & Clinton and David, his 9 grandchildren, his sister Pat and brother-in-law Les Lamkin their children, and his brother Tim.
