From The Principal's Desk

All of us at Washington are extremely grateful for each of you who make certain that students are coming to school on time ready to learn.

On December 9th we will be sending report cards home with your child. It is our hope this proves to be meaningful communication about your child's progress. The report card should provide a clear picture about the specific knowledge, skills and dispositions your child is expected to acquire in each subject area and where your child is in relationship to Common Core State Standards.

As a school community, we are very much aware of the complexities of the 21st century family. Due to a variety of reasons, time is often at a premium, which does not allow as much communication with the school as you would like and therefore you trust the school to keep your child safe and ensure that they are learning. I can assure you that student safety and learning is at the forefront of my responsibility.

The question before us is: How can we increase the regular, meaningful two-way communication between home and school? When this exists you become more aware of your child's progress, have a stronger belief in your ability to influence your child's learning and become more involved in that learning.

There are four critical questions that parents should be asking our school:

- 1. What is it that you want my child to learn?
- 2. How do you know if my child is learning what you want them to learn?
- 3. How are you responding if my child is not learning?
- 4. How are you responding if my child already has the knowledge and skills?

When you receive your child's report card, I hope you look deeply into its contents and be sure to ask your child's teacher any question you may have. You can call to set an appointment or email questions. Washington Elementary School is working to ensure that we have the answers you need to work in partnership with us to help each student to achieve at high levels.

When to Keep Your Child Home

In order to control communicable disease in school, it is important to keep your child home for the following reasons:

- Fever of 100.0 or higher.
- Sore throat, swollen glands, or rash.
- Vomiting
- If your child has a moist, productive cough, chest congestion, shortness of breath or difficulty breathing.

In general, children should stay home when they don't feel well enough to participate in the normal activities in a school day. Please make sure that your phone numbers and emergency contacts are up to date in the office. We need to be able to contact you should the need arise.

Dress Warm

We go outside for recess twice a day unless the weather is below 20 degrees. It is important that your child wear a coat to school and gloves, hat, and boots if necessary. The expectation is that students will wear their coats to recess.
