- 2. Know the historical aspects behind human sexuality research.
- 3. Know the relationship between human sexuality and religious movements.
- 4. Describe the various cultural views of sexual behavior.

SECTION 3

UNDERSTAND THE VARIOUS PSYCHOLOGICAL ATTITUDES TOWARD SEXUALITY

- 1. Know the various forms of psychological expression that human sexual behavior can take.
- 2. Know what are considered to be various acts of sexual behavior.

SECTION 4

UNDERSTAND THE VARIOUS THEORIES TOWARD SEXUAL ORIENTATION

- 1. Know what sexual orientation means and the different forms it may take.
- 2. Be able to explain the nature of the evidence suggesting a biological basis of sexual orientation.
- 3. Understand the nature of the differing views and changes that have taken place in listing homosexuality as a mental disorder.
- 4. Understand the role various religions have played in defining and understanding sexual orientation.

SECTION 5

UNDERSTAND THE VARIETIES, SIMILARITIES AND DIFFERENCES IN SEXUAL BEHAVIOR

- 1. Know the various expression of human sexuality.
- 2. Understand the various cultural aspects of human sexuality.

3. Understand the various theories describing the differences between males and females and sexual behavior.

SECTION 6

UNDERSTAND THE ASPECTS OF DEVIANT SEXUAL BEHAVIOR

- 1. Be able to understand the motivation behind rape and sexual assault.
- 2. Be able to describe the different types of rape and rapists.
- 3. Be able to describe the symptoms experienced by rape victims.
- 4. Be able to describe the effects of incest.

SECTION 7

UNDERSTAND THE PSYCHOPATHOLOGY IN HUMAN SEXUALITY

- 1. Identify the various cultural expectations of sexual behavior.
- 2. Be able to explain the nature, causes, and treatment of male and female sexual dysfunction.
- 3. Be able to identify the role the DSM IV plays in the treatment of sexuality.

SECTION 8

UNDERSTAND THE PSYCHOLOGY INVOLVED IN SEXUAL HARASSMENT

- 1. Know what actions can constitute sexual harassment, as well as what actions are being taken in the workplace to deal with it.
- 2. Know the motivation behind sexual harassment.
- 3. Understand the historical context that sexuality has taken in the workplace.
- 4. Explain the differing views of what constitutes sexual harassment.

SECTION 9

UNDERSTAND THE ASPECTS INVOLVED IN SEXUAL DISEASES

- 1. Know the historical perspectives of sexually transmitted diseases.
- 2. Know what AIDS is and the various ways by which it can be transmitted.
- 3. Know the symptoms of AIDS and what actions should be taken if diagnosed with the disease.
- 4. Know what actions can be taken to prevent contracting sexually transmitted diseases.
