Dear Families,

Summer provides a wonderful opportunity for students to find time to read! The goal of our summer reading program is to *foster a love of reading*. Reading over the summer can also help students maintain or even improve their reading skills. In order to meet the needs of each students' reading skills and interests, the *Oak Grove Summer Recommended Reading Lists* (grades 4-8) contain a variety of genres at various reading levels. Students are encouraged to read at least one book from their grade level list. Some students might prefer to listen to the audiobook version, but we suggest they also follow along with the text. Students could also choose to read the same title as a friend or family member and engage in ongoing discussions about the book.

Cook Memorial Library in Libertyville (as well as Aspen Library in Vernon Hills) has multiple copies of all of these books and allows patrons with library cards from other local libraries (ex. Waukegan, Lake Bluff, North Chicago) to check out books once they've registered at Cook. Additionally, Oak Grove students can log into the Sora app and read eBook (and some audiobook) versions of many of these titles.




The Unforgettable Logan Foster by Shawn Peters


The List of Things That Will Not Change by Rebecca Stead

Really sick. Reha, who dreams of becoming a doctor even though she can't stomach the sight of blood, is determined to make her Amma well again. She'll be the perfect daughter, if it means saving her Amma's life.




Daughter of the Deep by Rick Riordan




Alone by Megan E. Freeman

As months pass, she escapes natural disasters, looters, and wild animals. But Maddie's most formidable enemy is the crushing loneliness she faces every day.




Frankie and Bug by Gayle Forman





Which was the same night that Ophie learned she can see ghosts. Now Ophie and her mother are living in Pittsburgh with relatives they barely know. In the hopes of earning enough money to get their own place, Mama has gotten Ophie a job as a maid in the same old manor house where she works. Daffodil Manor, like the wealthy Caruthers family who owns it, is haunted by memories and prejudices of the past—and, as Ophie discovers, ghosts as well. Ghosts who have their own loves and hatreds and desires, ghosts who have wronged others and ghosts who have themselves been wronged. And as Ophie forms a friendship with one spirit whose life ended suddenly and unjustly, she wonders if she might be able to help—even as she comes to realize that Daffodil Manor may hold more secrets than she bargained for.

The more Maizy discovers, the more questions she has. Like, why are her mom and her grandmother always fighting? Who are the people in the photographs on the office wall? And when she discovers that a beloved family treasure has gone missing—and someone has left a racist note—Maizy decides it's time to find the answers.



2. Select **Oak Grove School** when prompted for your school name




3. **Student ID:** use your seven-digit OGS student ID number (ex. 202---)
 - a. you can find this on Powerschool or email Mrs. Osterman for help osterman@ogschool.org




How to add Cook Memorial Library to your Sora account:

This adds their entire collection of ebooks and audiobooks!


1. In the Sora app, click the 3-bar menu (top-right) and click “Add a public library”.
2. Enter Cook Memorial PL to locate the public library.




3. Find a public library title and click on “Borrow” and then “Sign in”.



4. Select your own **school district** (not the library) from the drop down.



5. Instead of a “card number”, enter the same credentials used to sign into Sora.
